#### By Laws of the

#### **Apostolic Faith Bible College**

Article VII—Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians) and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's.The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

\*Triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit

\*Creation and Formation

\*Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation

\*Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life.

\*Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, a Second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ

\*Baptism of the Holy Spirit, evidenced by the speaking in other languages

\*Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit

\*Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

\*Washing of Feet

\*Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers

\*Do not condone divorce and remarriage

\*Destruction of the Wicked

\*Conditional Immortality

\*Rapture of the Man child Class

\*Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly

\*A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above basic doctrines.



Rev. Amos Harris, one of God's faithful servants, was called home on Monday, Sept. 16,2019 at Heritage Estates in Gering, Nebraska. Amos was born on April 29,1932 to Amos (Sr.) and Vema (King) Harris near Pampa, TX. Amos grew up on the farm and always had a love of the land, gardening and livestock. Amos was raised in a strong Christian home and accepted Christ as his savior at an early age. He soon made it his life's passion to study the Word and share Jesus with others. Amos attended high school in Pampa, TX and then attended and graduated from the Apostolic Faith Bible College in Baxter Springs, KS in 1951. After graduating from Bible College he traveled by train to his first church calling in Bayard, Nebraska. Amos met his wife Violet

(Kildow) in Bayard and they were married December 22, 1954. Later he relocated his family to Hardesty, Ok to become a dairy farmer for a few years. It was then that Truman started working for the US Postal Service by becoming Hardesty's postmaster. After a couple of years, he transferred to Hinton, OK to be postmaster. While living there, Truman and Diana had their third child, a daughter, Kimberly. In 1977, they made their home in Sayre, OK, where Truman became the postmaster for 20 years. During his time with the US Postal Service, Truman served in many capacities in The National League of Postmasters. When he retired from the Postal Service, Truman and Diana moved back to Hardesty, OK. Even though he was retired, that certainly did not change his work ethic. He continued work-



ing in many different roles while he was still able. During those years, Truman served as city clerk for the town of Hardesty but one of his favorite roles was to help Buford and David Stump during harvest time. He loved to drive the combine for them.

Truman not only worked hard to provide for his family during his life, he also worked hard for his community by serving in the Kiwanis Club and volunteering to video record all Sayre High School football and basketball games. Truman was very patriotic and loved America's symbol, the Bald Eagle. Truman also loved serving with the Gideon's International and handing out Bibles. One of the activities Truman enjoyed was taking his grandkids for rides on his GoldWing motorcycle While he owned his motorcycle, he was a member of a motorcycle club that he thoroughly enjoyed.
