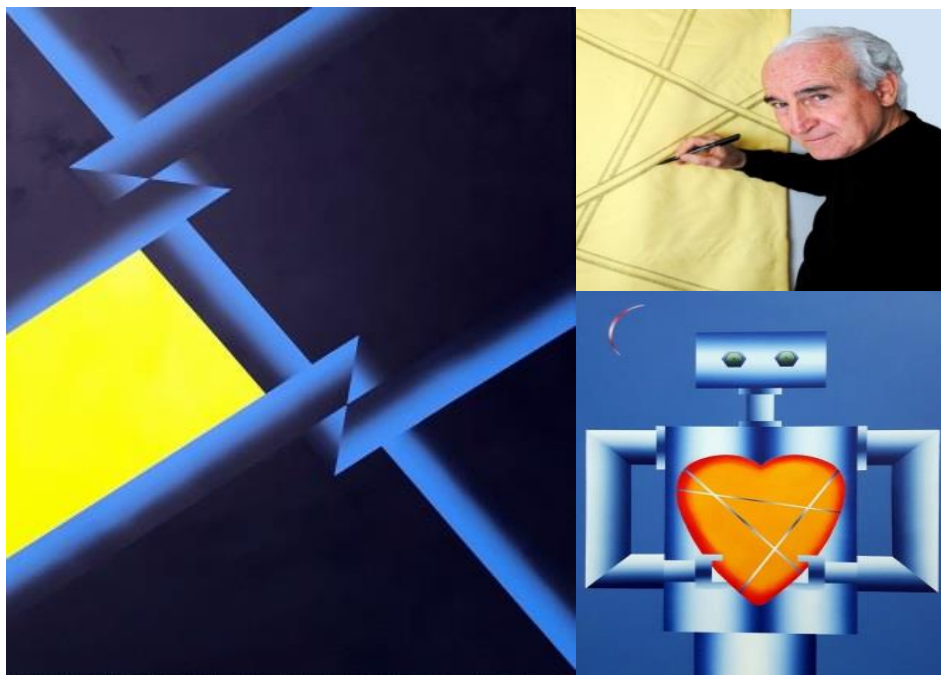




## FABRIZIO BRESCHI EXHIBITION

OPENING RECEPTION - OCTOBER 7, 5:30 - 8:30 PM



TUSCANY ARIST FABRIZIO BRESCHI WILL BE EXHIBITING HIS WORK AT FRG OBJECTS & DESIGN/ART, 217 WARREN ST, 2ND FLOOR, HUDSON, NY, OCTOBER 7 - NOVEMBER 30. OPENING RECEPTION IS SATURDAY, OCTOBER 7, FROM 5:30 - 8:30 PM. GALLERY HOURS: THURSDAY - MONDAY 12 PM - 6 PM.

Breschi was born in Livorno, an industrial port near Florence and Pisa. Inspired by technological imagery as a child, he expressed reality through architectural-geometric shapes transformed into industrial landscapes, surreal seascapes and robots. "I amused myself depicting the human race in the guise of robots, adding a surreal note to observed daily activities. I sought to glimpse the ultimate destiny of a technological society."

Breschi layers matte acrylic paints to resemble polished chrome, creating gleaming tubes that course between canvases like elaborate mechanical systems - a 3-dimensional sculpted-effect that is a technique of his own. "My pleasure derives from the difficulty involved with obtaining those hues with a brush, a process where I challenge the technological means so developed in our time." At the age of 23 Breschi was a professor at Florence's Academy of Fine Arts and at 35, he was the youngest professor-lecturer in the history of the prestigious Accademia di Belle Arti (Brera), Milan to hold the painting chair.

He has exhibited in Italy, France, Spain, Germany, Switzerland, Greece and the United States. His multimedia sculpture, *Cycladic Today* is on the facade of the Museum of Cycladic Art, Athens. His latest 25-foot metal sculpture, *Grande V* was installed in Piazza della Victoria, Livorno in August 2017.

Breschi was recently honored by his hometown city with an exhibition of his work at the Museo Civico G. Fattori: *Breschi: 1976 - 2016*, a 40-year retrospective for an artist truly 40-years ahead of his time.
