Conditional Immortality

Rom. 2: 1-11 "Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosoever thou art that judgest: for wherein thou judgest another, thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things.

But we are sure that the judgment of God is according to truth against them which commit such things.

And thinkest thou this, O man that judgest them which do such things, and doest the same, that thou shalt excape the judgment of God?

Or despisest thou the riches of his goodness and forbearance and longsuffering; not knowing that the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance?

But after thy hardness and impotent heart treasurest up unto thyself wrath against the day of wrath and revelation of the righteous judgment of God;

Who will render to every man according to his deeds:

To them who by patient continuance in well doing seek for glory and honour and immortality, eternal life:

But unto them that are contentious, and do not obey the truth, but obey unrighteousness, indignation and wrath,

Tribulation and anguish, upon every soul of man that doeth evil, of the Jew first, and also of the Gentile;

But glory, honour, and peace, to every man that worketh good, to the Jew first and also to the Gentile:

For there is no respect of persons with God."

The first thing I want to establish is that God's judgment is just. There is no respect of persons with God. Also He will render to every man ac ording to his deeds. We must stand before a just God all by ourselves. On top of this we will know just where we stand. There will be no need of a lie detector test. God will look right through us and we'll know that He is looking through us. There will be no covering up there. This will be at the white throne judgment. This will also be true when God, through Christ, gives the rewards. Each one will receive a just recompense of reward.

Try as best they may, there still remains a certain amount of injustice in our judicial system and I think we have the best judicial system in the world. God's judicial system has no injustice.

The next thing I want to establish is we do not have immortality. Our soul is a living soul: mortal. The soul that sinneth shall die: known as the second death. Fear not him that can kill the body but fear him that can destroy both soul and body in hell: the second death. Our body goes back to the dust: it is not mortal. God loans us the breath of life. He can recall it at any time so we don't own that. It belongs to God. Therefore we seek for immortality. This is what I want to deal with: Conditional Immortality.

Consider I Tim. 6:15-16. "Now unto the King eternal, immortal, invisible, the only wise God, be honour and glory forever and ever. Amen."

"Which in his times he shall shew, who is the blessed and only Potentate, the King of kings, and Lord of lords;

Who only hath immortality, dwelling in the light which no man can approach unto; who no man hath seen, nor can see: to whom be honour and power everlasting. Amen."

This takes immortality from us humans. It belongs to God and I add; it will not be given randomly. It is a precious commodity. A reward to be cherished. There must be some special qualities to merit this reward. Paul told the Romans, Chapter 2, verses 5, 6, 7, "----the righteous judgment of God: who will render to every man according to his deeds: to them who by patient continuance in well doing seek for glory and honour and immortality, eternal life." It is available to them who by patient continuance in well doing. You will note this 7th verse speaks of glory and honour and immortality, eternal life. The gift of God is eternal life though Jesus Christ. Glory and honour and immortality are rewards above eternal life merited by patient continuance in well doing. It is possible to obtain eternal life and not obtain glory and honour and immortality.

Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection: on such the second death hath no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ and shall reign with him a thousand years. The verse to this Rev. 20:5. "but the rest of the dead lived not again until the thousand years were finished. This is the first resurrection." This plainly tells us there is more than one resurrection. It also tells us there are greater rewards added to eternal life. All who repent and are forgiven of their sins will receive eternal life, There are rewards added for faithfulness: patient continuance in well doing. After conversion there is a consecration to do the will of God. A setting apart. An acceptance of living sacrifice or sanctification. A born again process whereby the Adamic nature: the old man; is put down and the new man; directed by the Holy Spirit, in our lives, becomes paramount. We serve the Lord through love not because of a fire excape from hell, We humans cannot qualify for sonship until the old man has been subdued by the spirit --- I speak of the Spirit of God -- because there is a spirit of the Devil that will lead us to destruction. When led by the Spirit, we produce fruit of the spirit; Love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance. Gal. 5:22-23. When we follow the Adamic nature:

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the old man; we produce the works of the flesh: Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings and such like. Gal. 5:19-21.

Jesus has made a plan whereby we can have our sins forgiven, and have our Adamic nature subdued through sanctification: become a son of God and work toward: seek for glory and honour and immortality. These rewards are conditional. We qualify for them by patient continuance in well doing. Eternal life is obtained through repentance and accepting Jesus as your personal saviour. Immortality is obtained by consecration and patiently doing His will.

I Cor. 15:10-58, is Paul's explaination of the first resurrection and being changed. I'll quote some portions of this wonderful reading. Verse 23, but every man in his own order: Christ the firstfruits; afterwards they that are Christ's at his coming."The first resurrection was Christ. He arose for the grave, The first resurrection for we humans is at Christ's coming. The glory of the blessing of the first resurrection is: the blessed and holy dead shall rise first. Incorruption and immortality are the same as Christ was when He arose from the grave. Not the glorification of the soul but the body.

Verse 50, "Now this I say, brethren, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God. Neither doth corruption inherit incorruption." Jesus came forth flesh and spirit. He shed his blood on Calvary. Those who qualify, in the grave, shall come forth incorruptible: flesh and spirit. Those that are alive, and qualify, shall be changed to flesh and spirit. One is called incorruptible. The other immortality. Verse 53, "This corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality."

Not every one that dies will obtain the first resurrection. Not every one that is alive will obtain immortality. There is a qualifying process. Note this happens when Christ returns. I work, toil, carry the burden of souls, try to encourage the saints, to obtain more than eternal life. I want immortality or incorruption. The toils of the road will seem nothing when I stand in his likeness body and spirit. Which ever way Jesus sees fit will suit me. Let me live until He comes or let me die and await the resurrection: first resurrection, I'll be pleased if I can qualify for incorruption or immortality.

I want to quote some sayings about immortality :

Without a belief in personal immortality, religion is like an arch resting on one pillar, or like a bridge ending in an abyss. --Max Muller.

Our dissatisfaction with any other solution is the blazing evidence of immortality. -- Emerson. We do not believe in immortality because we have proved it, but, we forever try to prove it because we believe it. -- James Martineau.


Immortality is the glorious discovery of christianity, -- Channing.

I believe in immortality, through Christ, on the condition I qualify for it. Remember I qualify them the same: incorruption and immortality. Incorruption through the grave: corruption. 
ed in death by her parents, her husband, four children, four grandsons, two great-grandsons, three sisters, and three brothers.

Greetings From Hebron Bible College!




As we think of the months of 1992 our hearts are filled with gratitude and praise. After our General Convention here in January we were busy with Conventions in different areas and souls have been saved.

Who was on trial that night before the passover feast?

On Trial

The Bible reads in part from John 13: 1-2 "Now before the feast of the passover, when Jesus knew that His hour was come that He should depart out of this world.....and supper being ended, the devil having now put into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray Him." Judas was on trail before God and found himself, as was King Belshazzar, when he saw the hand writing on the wall, which read "Thou art weighed in the balances and found wanting." Daniel 5:37.

Next let us read a little farther and I copy in part again, from John 13:21-22, "Jesus.....was troubled in spirit, and testified, and said, verily, I say unto you, that one of you shall betray Me." And Matthew wrote in chapter 26: 21-22, And as they did eat, He said, "Verily I say unto you, that one of you shall betray Me. And they were exceeding sorrowful, and began every one of them to say unto Him :Lord is it I?"

These men were on trial but they went directly to the One before whom they were on trial and each asked if he was doing to be guilty? We stand on trial each day with what we are doing with our lives. If we are more concerned with our own way than "What can I do for my Lord today?"We are falling short of the mark. The story is told of two men who were trying to escape from an erupting volcano. As the molten rock gushed out of the crater they fled in the only direction open to them. Every thing went well until they came to a wide stream of the hot, smoking lava. Sizing up their situation, they realized their only hope was to get over this stream of about thirty feet. One of the men was old and arthritic while the other was young and athletic. He was a track star who could easily broad jump 25 feet. With a running start they each tried to leap to safety. The older man went only a few feet through the air before falling into the hot bubbling mass. The younger, with his greater strength and skill, catapulted much farther. Though he almost made it, he still missed the bank on the other side. It didn't matter that he did better than his companion, for he too perished in the molten lava.

Whether or not this story actually happened it does bring the thought that our own accomplishments, a fine reputation, good works or great abilities, everyone falls short unless hidden with Christ, in God. Colossians 3:3 Paul wrote in Romans 3:23 For all have sinned and come short of the Glory of God." Then David said, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee." Psalm 119:11. Judas tried to right his mistakes in his own strength while the other men sought the approval of their Savior.

There were others before the tribunal of God's standard at the same time of Jesus being tried by the Sanhedrin. But just as the hand writing on the wall told of Belshazzar not passing the test this trial also showed the bankruptcy of others. The Jewish spiritual leaders were short of the mark because they failed to recognize the Messiah, even though His words were backed by His deeds. He tried many times to tell, also to show them He was sent from God but they were too complacent with their own station in life, therefore, they rejected Him. I wonder, how many of us are going straight into trouble because we insist in doing it our own way.

Pilate stood before God's judgement seat two times when he could have taken his stand. Pilate, it is said, was a merciless, cruel Roman who was noted for his brutality and was the hard hearted Govenor over Jerusalem and Judea at the time of Jesus ministry. He enjoyed the tortured death of a man. Whether it was Jesus countenance of Divinity or the way He stood erect and fearless or just some inner communication Pilate did not really want to crucify Him. Certainly it was not the robes Jesus wore or the crown of thorns which was placed on His head by unbelievers and probably made the blood to trickle down His face that made Pilate to deviate from His usual pattern of glee. Instead Pilate sought help from Herod, but as usual people cannot help us when we must stand in God's judgement hall so Herod left Pilate to settle his own affairs before God. When he _____Pilate feared more about the opinion of the people than the voice of his conscience. First he feared for his position_a govenor for Rome ____more than he feared the God he did not know. It was thought his wife was a Christian so he probably, through her, knew some of the teachings but that was not enough. Second, he feared the Jewish leaders. He was afraid they might make him appear weak to Rome. Oh, the web we do weave with our deeds! To try his own way for deliverance Pilate called for a bowl of water and washed his hands. He stood condemned for his failure to do what he knew was right. He washed his hands but his heart needed cleansing by Jesus blood. For want of that one act Pilate lost everything. It is said he committed suicide in exile.

The Jewish crowds stood condemned along with the rest because they just followed along.

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The supposedly Spiritual Leaders stood condemned because they refused to believe in the True Messiah.

Herod sent Jesus back to Pilate but Herod, himself was on trial that day. He was a son of Herod the Great and had already killed John the Baptist. This day probably seemed to him to be another time to mock God but his mockery was empty. Herod wished to see some miracle but Jesus does not perform miracles just for proof of His Deity or to please man especially because one who lives in sin desires to see one. So Herod"s unrelenting heart stood condemned as he faced the dissapproval of God.

Dear reader, let us all take an inventory of our own motives and deeds because we, too, stand before the tribunal of God. Do we serve Christ with good deeds because we belong to a leading Church? Do we fail to do as we know we should because we enjoy popularity? Are we afraid to take a stand against wrong doings because of the fear of popular opinion? Joshua said, "---As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Joshua 24:5

Pilate did not want to crucify Jesus but in his willingness to save Jesus asked the Chief Priests, "What will ye then that I shall do unto Him whom ye call the King of the Jew?" Mark 15:9b

Today we think of those people in the roles they lived in the past they had in the events surrounding that terrible time but I'm wondering if we were confronted with similar events would we do any differently? Those Spiritual leaders were so self assured and satisfied they did not want to hear Jesus words, Today, when we look around there is a great percentage of people who pride themselves as being Christians but note the number of that same percentage who do not hear Jesus today. Years ago a very prominent minister was talking of some people who had stepped out by faith to be led by God to the place God wanted them and the Minister was heard to say, " I wish I had the courage to do that." Friends, do doubts and fears hinder us from the complete service God has called us to render? When Jesus passed where Peter and Andrew were fishing He told them, "Follow Me and I will bake you fishers of Men." Matthew 4:19. The disciples left everything to follow Jesus, We read from Luke 18:28 where Peter said, "Lo we have left all, and followed Thee." And again I copy in part from Revelation !4:4 " These are they which follow the Lamb whither so ever He goeth."

We are all on trial before God. The Rulers of the Jews failed that day because they were too busy defending their own theories. How many of us hold to theories and traditions? They deviated from the Mosaic Law to follow and impose upon others their own traditions. They turned their faces from the True God with their pursuit of serving idols because this was the popular thing to do. Today we do not have {in general} so many people who have images set up to worship but an idol can be any object of passionate devotion. This could be a home, money,, games of sports, pleasures, families or any number of things which keep us from serving our Living God.

Herod was on trial and failed because he had been warned of his sins by John the Baptist. Instead of leaving his life of sin and turning to a life of service to God he tried to silence the accusing voice by beheading John the Baptist and thought he could do as he pleased. Today people do not often copy Herod's method to silence the voice of their conscience but many go deeper into sin as did Herod.

We must individually come to Christ through His Blood which was shed on the cross. We read in Matthew 26:28 from words which Jesus spoke when He instituted the first communion service after the last supper with His disciples, "----This is My blood of the New Testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." And in Luke 22:20 we read also in Jesus words, :This cup is the New Testament in My Blood, which is shed for you." We sing from the song, "What can wash away my sin? Nothing but the blood of Jesus."

Another example of people on trial before God is found in the story Jesus told of the Pharisee and the Publican, found in Luke 18:10-14. The two men went to the temple. One went to show he had done his duty and to brag to God how good he was. The Publican was a person despised by the Jews because of his occupation. humbly bowed before his Maker saying, "God be merciful to me a sinner." [a part of verse 13]Luke tells us God heard the humble man and he went to his home justified. The self righteous man had exalted himself and felt no need of God. Friend, why do we go to Church? We should go with an humble attitude remembering with the Palmist when he wrote, "He bought me up also out of an horrible pit, out of the miry clay, and set my feet upon a Rock. " [a part of Psalm 4:2] Why do we go to Church? The Pharisee was on trial and his pride kept him in disbelief of God's saving grace. The Publican, though an outcast by the self righteous, in humility, asked for and received God"s mercy. He won his trial because he saw his need of help and was not willing to try to clothe himself in his own feeble efforts.

Adam and Eve were both on trial for just on sin of disobedience and tried to cover their guilt by trying to hide from God. They didn"t succeed and had to leave their beautiful garden homeland.

The rich young Ruler was on trial when he came running to Jesus asking for some good thing he could do to win eternal life. Luke 18:22 When Jesus gave him that one good thing to do he didn't want to do it. We can hear him now as he argues, "But Lord, that is my life savings."Lord I've worked hard for this money." "But, Master what can I live

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ARTICLE VII

Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers in the saving grace of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ who have accepted his as their personal Saviour. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this live and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows:

Triune God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Creation and Formation..

Man is basically sinful and in need of Salvation . Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Saviour,

which is the conception of Spiritual Life. Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body. A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ.

Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.

Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Bather, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Washing of Feet.

Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers. Do not condone divorce and remarriage, Matt. 19:8-9. Destruction of the Wicked.

Conditional Immortality.

Rapture of the Man Child Class.

Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly. A Ministry supported by tithes and offerings.

These basic doctrines shall be adhered to in the teaching of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not in consistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

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
