

#### Bio by JAMES MALCOLM

Joseph Hancock is my 4<sup>th</sup> Great Grandfather on my mother's grandmother's side. He was born September 10, 1740 in Wrentham, Massachusetts, the son of Samuel Hancock and Elizabeth Ware. Wrentham is located in the southern part of Massachusetts where it meets Connecticut and Rhode Island. He married Jerusha Whiting on May 17, 1764 and they had 11 children.

On April 19, 1775, as a private in Captain Lemuel Kolloch's Company of Colonel John Smith's Regiment of Minutemen, he with his son Joseph, then 17 years old, answered the alarm and marched 38.5 miles to Concord to meet the British. He served two days in the engagement.

Joseph served as a Sergeant in Captain Kolloch's Company Colonel Wheelock's Regiment when the company marched from Wrentham to Warwick, Rhode Island on the alarm of December 8, 1776. They marched 36 miles, he served 23 days during the engagement, which was the invasion of Rhode Island by the British.

On April 21, 1777, he marched to the alarm in Rhode Island with Captain Samuel Fisher's Company, Colonel Wheelock's Suffolk County Regiment, serving 18 days during the engagement.

He served in Captain Samuel Cowell's Company, Colonel Benjamin Hawes's Regiment from September 25, 1777 to October 30, 1777, 35 days, on a secret expedition. The mission was to attack and capture the British garrison at Aquindneck Island, near Newport. Repeated attempts by boat to attack the island were repelled by the British by heavy cannon fire. It was later discovered the British had prior knowledge of the attack.

He was with Captain Samuel Cowell's Company, 4<sup>th</sup> Suffolk County Regiment, commanded by Major Seth Bullard, from July 28, 1780 to July 30, 1780 when they responded to the alarm in Rhode Island.

Joseph later served in the Revolutionary War enlisting from Wrentham as a Lieutenant in Captain John Lincoln's Company, Colonel John Webb's Regiment. They marched to camp August 1, 1781 and were later discharged on November 29, 1781. He traveled 210 miles during this tour of duty serving for 3 months and 26 days.

After the war he was an early settler of Otisfield, Maine with his two sons Joseph Jr. and Thomas, settling at the head of Parker, now called Pleasant, Pond. He was once found guilty of pitching quoits, a game similar to horseshoes, on Fast Day. (A ring of iron, rope, or rubber thrown in a game to encircle or land as near as possible to an upright peg).

Fast Day was a day of public fasting and prayer, traditionally observed in the New England states. It had its origin in days of prayer and repentance proclaimed in the early days of the American colonies by Royal Governors, often before the spring planting. It was observed by church attendance, fasting, and abstinence from secular activities.

This caused somewhat of a scandal and there was talk of his being charged for this "offense" on a Christian holy day. The subject finally "died out". He died on October 21, 1815 in Otisfield, Cumberland County, Maine at the age of 75 years and 1 month. **JAMES MALCOLM SAR**
