May 3, 2020 Fourth Sunday of Easter Jn 10:1-10

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

In today's first reading, Peter delivers his Pentecost Sermon about Jesus' death and resurrection and calls everyone to repentance and baptism in Christ. Acts 2:37 says about the crowd, "When they heard this, they were cut to the heart, and they asked Peter and the other apostles, "What are we to do, my brothers?" If Peter was looking for a response, he surely got it! This verse demonstrates the power of a word, or the power of the voice! Of course, we do not want to become fixated on any craftiness of Peter's voice with his sermon construction (that's too manipulative). Rather, as with every preacher, it is the Holy Spirit of God working in them that convinces, persuades and motivates any listeners. Jesus had said, "When you are brought before synagogues, rulers, and authorities, do not worry about how to defend yourselves or what to say. For, at that time the Holy Spirit will teach you what you should say" (Luke 12:11-12). And in Luke 10:16, Jesus called his preachers to trust in Him to provide what is needed in any proclamation, when he told them, "The one who listens to you listens to me". Of course this means, <u>IF</u>, they are listening. What I suggest is that Jesus is not recommending that preachers wait until the last minute to prepare (thinking 'Oh, the Holy Spirit will provide the words'), or for preachers to be lazy about not doing the background work of praying and studying the word (thinking 'Oh, if it is not God's Word, it won't matter anyway'). No, Jesus is saying that 'spiritual people hear spiritual things'. We should be listening always (in everything) for Him. Disciples of Jesus are attuned to the voice of the Shepherd. They are discerners of Shepherd's Word (His Voice). Mostly due to the Word itself, as Hebrews 4:12 teaches, "The word of God is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword, penetrating even between soul and spirit, joints and marrow, and able to discern reflections and thoughts of the heart." It 'cuts to the heart'! If you want to dive a little deeper into this spiritual gift of discernment, check out Hebrews 5:12-14, or 1 Corinthians 3:1-3. As Jesus tells us in Mark 4:23 "Let the one with ears, hear!" The Master Jesus is speaking. As disciples, we need to listen!

Which brings us to the gospel today! Jesus is the Good shepherd (John 10:11) and so for sheep to stay alive and thrive, they must keep their ears perked-tilted toward Him! Sheep have to know where their Shepherd is, either directly looking at their shepherd, resting/walking by the Shepherd's side, or at least have ears open to receive direction and sense his/her presence. Without a shepherd, sheep become mutton fast. Those ears and eyes are lifelines for the sheep to the Shepherd. *Really, I hear it.* I mean I hear that in the gospel today, where three times (in verse 3, 4 & 5 of chapter 10) it is stated that Jesus' sheep 'hear his voice'. Okay, I pray we got it! We must listen to Jesus' voice. Yet, tragically, verse 6 says that too often many do not hear God's voice. John 10:6 says that "Although Jesus used this figure of speech, they (Pharisees) did not realize what he was trying to tell them." So, even right here in this text we have the fact demonstrated that some 'are not listening' to Jesus the Shepherd. They don't hear Him

I want to bring us back to the beginning of this reflection by saying again that sometimes it is just the right word, or just the right voice that can cut through everything that might block, confuse or upset, to bring soothing, definition and clarity to whatever is being felt or experienced. Like Proverbs 15:1 that tells us about the power of language to bear fruit in defusing anger, when it teaches that "a gentle answer turns away wrath". Or Proverbs 25:11, that speaks about the most opportune speech, saying that "Golden apples in silver settings are words spoken at the proper time." but above all, God's word and the Shepherd's voice are always on time and always just the right word needed. Isaiah 55:10-11 reminds us that God's word never returns empty, but always bears fruit and effects action (change or results-whatever is needed!). So, we want to know it!

St. Roch and St.Rosalia: A Couple More Saints in Times of Plague

St. Roch: not much is known of St. Roch's birth and early life. He lived in the mid 1300's, the eldest son of a wealthy, ruling family. He was born with a birth scar across his chest, that was a striking large red cross. After his parents died when he was only 20,

St. Roch handed the leading government position in Montpellier that he inherited from his dad, turned it over to his uncle. Then he donated over his entire fortune to the poor and their feeding care.

He left France, and set out to Italy as a pilgrim, and visited various plague-infested cities, miraculously curing its citizens by his prayer and invoking the intercession of the power of his Cross scar. Everywhere he went, people witnessed the vanishing of the terrible scourge of deadly sickness. The curative powers of praying and looking upon the Cross, that God allowed him to exercise as a healing gift became widely known. Pious tales of St Roch's miracles spread all over Italy.

He eventually succumbed to the disease himself, and he withdrew into obscurity. After a while, he recovered from the infection which killed almost everyone who contracted it. He never wanted to be recognized and honored for his ministry, so the humble saint returned to France in disguise. In times of such high political intrigue between countries and powerful families, he was mistakenly identified as a foreign spy and arrested, eventually dying as a political prisoner. It was only after his death that St Roch's identity was rediscovered, mostly owing to the unique mark of the holy cross on his chest and some letters in his possession. He was given a dignified funeral, and additional miracles followed his death, that further testified to his sanctity in life. By then, the Church's hierarchy revered St. Roch. In 1414, during the Church Council of Constance, a wide-ranging plague broke out in the city, and the Fathers of the Council ordered public prayers and processions in honor of the St. Roch. Through his intercession and the devout prayer of the citizenry, the plague ceased and many of the city residents were spared as the plague immediately ceased."

Here is an old prayer to St. Roch, that is still recited in Italy and France to this day.

O Blessed St. Roch,

Patron of the sick, Have pity on those Who lie upon a bed of suffering. Your power was so great, When you were in this world, That by the sign of the Cross, Many were healed of their diseases. Now that you are in heaven, Your power is not less. Offer, then, to God Our sighs and tears. And obtain for us that health we seek Through Christ Our Lord.

Another less well-known Powerful Plague Saint was St. Rosalia, who was born around 1100, but went unrecognized until the 1600's. Rosalia was born into a Norman family descended from Charlemagne. So devout and pious as a child, she decided to devote her life to prayer and sacrifice in a cave on Mount Pellegrino. In her anchoritic cell, she inscribed on a wall: "I, Rosalia ... have taken the resolution to live my days in this cave for the love of my Lord, Jesus Christ." She was hidden away in her devotion to sacrifice, fast and pray. Five hundred years later, when a plague beset Palermo, Italy, St. Rosalia appeared to a hunter, whom she told to bring her bones to the Sicilian city. She revealed where the hunter could find her bones. The hunter followed Rosalia's instructions, and the people of Palermo desperate for healing carried her remains in a holy procession throughout the city three times, and it brought about a miraculous and dramatic end to the plague there. St. Rosalia became the patron saint of Palermo, and a church sanctuary was built where her remains were discovered originally.

This intercessory prayer has been attached to her name as a special prayer to bring comfort to the ill and heal plagues and pestilences. Let us pray:

O God, Our Father, mercifully look upon Your people who come to You and grant through the intercession of St Rosalia, who turned away from earthly delights to the joys of contemplation, that we may be delivered from all harm here on earth and one day be welcomed into the Kingdom of Heaven. St Rosalia, confessor and virgin, we pray to God for our families and friends. Through your powerful prayers, may we obtain health, life and eternal salvation. May our sacred contemplation of Jesus Christ, lead us to good health and keep us safe in your loving care, Through Jesus Christ the Lord, Amen.
