




worked in a note worthy internships with Disney Imagineering. This was an unique experience going behind the scenes at Disneyland when the park was closed to the public.

# What's Your Legacy?

The Touchet Educational Foundation was officially organized in February 2003. The class of 2007 is the 5th class to be awarded scholarships. With the cost of higher education going up, and the need of education after high school becoming more important everyday, the Foundation is a way for businesses, alumni and the community to support and encourage our kids in a very deliberate and specific way.

**Touchet-Gardena Lions Club** was established in 1962, and meets in the old Gardena School, which was built in 1902. Classes were held there until 1949, and the building is still owned by the Touchet School District. The Lions Club leases it for \$1/year and is responsible for maintaining the building as a community center. The major funding source for the Lions Club is the May Day Barbecue. The Lions Club has been a committed and supportive member of the Touchet community and especially the children, for the past 40 years. They have contributed generously to the Touchet Educational Foundation.

In addition to Touchet Educational Foundation Merit Scholarships we have other scholarships to give to those meeting specific criteria. You may recognize some as community scholarships that have been given for many years. They have joined the Foundation and use our application. Some donors have exercised the option of choosing the recipient themselves, and others have left it up to the discretion of the Foundation Board of Directors.



#### Leadership Scholarship In Memory Of Wilbur Garbe, Jr, and Paul Garbe, \$650.00

This scholarship was established during the 1970-71 school year. It is in memory of two brothers, Paul and Wilbur Garbe who died tragically. Each year a student is selected that demonstrates outstanding citizenship, leadership, scholarship and a commitment to following through with their educational plans.





#### Gun Club Scholarship, \$900.00

On January 17, 1947, the original 17 members of the Touchet Gun Club met in a local pool hall to elect officers and begin making plans for a dance at the grange hall to help fund the new organization. The objectives of the organization were for social, educational, entertainment, and recreational benefit of its members.

By the May 26 Gun Club meeting in 1948, enough money had been raised in the first year of shoots and fundraisers to purchase 3.5 acres of property from Harlan Seachris on the Touchet River Road, for \$250. The Club House was built on the property, painted on the outside, varnished and shellacked on the inside. A fifty cent fine was levied for anyone caught spitting on the floor.

The Touchet Gun Club was an important social and educational organization in Touchet for 58 years. Because of dwindling membership and the costs associated in keeping up the property, the 3.5 acres were sold in 2006, for \$26,000. Members of the Gun Club voted to give the proceeds of the sale to the Touchet Educational Foundation. The money has been placed in a permanent endowment fund, with the interest to be used to fund scholarships to Touchet graduates.



#### The FFA Scholarship in Memory of Ronald Dunning, Jr., \$650.00

This scholarship was instituted in memory of Ronald Dunning Jr., who died tragically in August of 1986. Ronnie graduated from Touchet High School in 1986. The FFA and his family sponsor this award, which recognizes an FFA member who exhibits outstanding participation, and leadership.

## What kind of skills do you need to become Royalty?

Girls on the court may not compete for, or hold any other honorary positions that will interfere with Court activities.

The Court must stay in a group (entire Court) at all times when in uniform. Uniforms must be complete at all times.

Girls must conduct themselves properly at ALL times.

The activities of the Frontier Days Royal Court bring together a group of young ladies and parents who must work together effectively and cooperatively throughout the year. Royalty members are expected to demonstrate poise, friendliness, maturity, unselfishness, and a concern for others in their dealings with the public. These characteristics are just as important when dealing with other members of the Court.

Girls must furnish an acceptable horse and equipment.

The reign runs from approximately November 1st through the end of October, following the Appreciation Dinner. There are approximately 75 appearances to be made throughout the season.



Last year Brock Palmer, Bryce Palmer, Jade Smith, and Taylor Gregg won the High Point Boys Team, which was a bit unexpected as they were one of the smallest teams competing. In 2006 Brock and Bryce won the state championship in Team Roping (for the 2nd straight year) and qualified for the National Finals in Springfield, Illinois. Brock also qualified in Calf Roping. Taylor and Jade both finished in the top ten of the state and qualified for the Silver State International Rodeo in Fallon, NV in Calf Roping and Team Roping. Courtney Frazier has also been outstanding by winning the 2005 Girl Rookie of the Year and qualifying for nationals in the Barrel Racing and Pole Bending.

Currently Bryce Palmer leads Washington state in Calf Roping and is in the top four in the Team Roping. Jade Smith is in the top ten in Calf Roping and Team Roping.

Some past Touchet graduates that competed in High School Rodeo are Carrie Maiden, Julie Norris, Rowdy Barry, Kim Kammenzind, Cody Jesse, Tyler Bronkhorst, Ben Londo & Chelsea Schaefer. Cody Jesse went on to qualify for the professional National Finals Rodeo multiple times in the Bareback Bronc Riding (the pinnacle of rodeo competition) before injuries forced him to retire. Ben Londo has won back to back All-Around Cowboy titles at the College National Finals Rodeo while competing for Cal-Poly on a full scholarship. Look for him soon at the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas.

He appears annually at well known rodeos like the Reno Rodeo in Reno, Nevada, the El Paso Rodeo in Texas and Farm City Pro Rodeo in Hermiston, Oregon, and the Horse Heaven Round Up in his hometown of Kennewick, Washington.



"We are athletes," Barry says of the rodeo profession he has loved since 1986. "I enjoy what I do and I do it with a smile. I hope that's contagious. I do what I do because I love it, and I've always taken loving what I do to heart and have tried to live my life that way."

## CODY JESSE TOUCHET HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 1996

280 days a year on the road, competing in nearly 100 rodeos in 2004, "that's what I did and I loved it," said 1996 Touchet graduate, Cody Jesse. Following in his grandpa's, father's and mother's footsteps Cody began his rodeo career at age 5. In high school Cody honed his Team Roping and Bull Riding skills. But when we got to University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV) on a full ride rodeo scholarship in the fall of 96, Cody began his Bareback Riding career that eventually earned him \$446,538 in the Pro Rodeo circuit.

Cody graduated in 2002 from UNLV with a public-relations degree and had learned rock carving as well. But prior to graduating Cody won five professional rodeos, including the Heart O' Texas rodeo in Waco, Texas in 2001 and the Chief Joseph Days Rodeo in Joseph, Oregon in 2000.

After graduating, Cody continued his professional rodeo success. The 280 days on the road paid off for Cody. In 2003 Cody finished second in the World Standings and first in the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo. He won the National Finals Rodeo with 839 points on 10 heads, thus tying the record set in 2002.

After winning Rodeo Houston in 2004, Cody's fourteenth concussion from an accident at the Clovis Rodeo in California sent him to a neurologist. The specialist recommended that he give up his promising career. Cody decided to take the doctor's advice and retired in May of 2004. "I wanted to have a life after rodeo so I decided it was time to retire."

Today Cody lives with his wife, Stephanie and daughter, Savannah in Prineville, Oregon. They are expecting their second child in 2007. Jesse now owns and operates Jesse Monuments where he creates tombstones and other custom monuments out of stone with the skills he learned while at UNLV.



# CHELSIE SCHAEFER TOUCHET HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 2005



It all began 20 years ago at the ripe old age of 6 weeks that Chelsie sat aside her first horse. The rest is history in the making. Chelsie has had the opportunity to utilize her communication skills to participate in numerous radio advertisements and also participated in a recruiting video for the state's Agricultural Learning Programs. She has also helped orchestrate the grand entries for EWC's hometown college rodeos. Through her involvement on the Lancer Rodeo Team and the Ambassador's Program; she was able to attend her second year of schooling on a full ride scholarship.

While being a member of the rodeo team, Chelsie competes in Barrel Racing, Goat Tying, Breakaway Roping and Team Roping. She is currently ranked number 5 in the Central Rocky Mountain Region for Barrel Racing and is working her way to being in the top three to enable her to make the trip to the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming in June 2007. In 2006, she barely missed qualifying ending her freshman season in fourth place. While on her way to an outstanding finish in her freshman year, Chelsie qualified for the EWC High Point Team. The High Point team is when a competitor reached a set goal of 300 points that is accumulated throughout their EWC rodeo career. Chelsie happened to be the first freshman girl to receive the High Point letterman's jacket.

"My future goals are to write articles for rodeo and agriculturally based publications and interview people for television programs", say Chelsie. "I would also like to continue to rodeo and hopefully one day make the NFR, National Finals Rodeo, in Las Vegas." "I am anxiously awaiting my completion of school so I can go on to my next step in life of "Broadening my Horizons".

# BROCK PALMER TOUCHET HIGH SCHOOL CLASS OF 2005


Brock finished with three Team Roping titles and two runner-up titles in Calf Roping during his high school career.
