Wishing You a Happy Christmas



he sheer quantity of hits resulting from the google search "how to avoid holiday stress" is a telltale sign that there's something not quite right about the way North Americans do Christmas. Whether you're following the controversy around the <u>Starbucks cup</u> or <u>Operation Christmas Child</u>, or you pine for a <u>Buy Nothing Christmas</u>, you can't help but notice there is a disconnect for many of us between what Christmas is and what we'd like it to be.

Results of a recent Ipsos Reid survey conducted for World Vision Canada paint a picture of the Christmas many Canadians are seeking: nine in ten agree Christmas is becoming too commercial while only one in ten would best describe the spirit of the season as giving gifts to those they care about. For most Canadians (53%), Christmas is about bringing family together, while others see it primarily as an opportunity to celebrate the birth of Christ, demonstrate love and caring, and help those less fortunate. In the spirit of helping others, three quarters agree that they would prefer to receive a meaningful gift that would help someone else, rather than another traditional gift like clothes or electronics.

A study in the <u>Journal of Happiness</u> (2002) found that certain Christmas experiences and activities are associated with holiday well-being. Not surprisingly, these are the same experiences and activities Canadians rate so highly. In a study of 117 individuals ranging in age from 18 to 80, more happiness was reported when family and religious experiences were significant, and lower well-being occurred when spending money and receiving gifts predominated. Engaging in environmentally conscious consumption practices also predicted a happier holiday. Overall, the materialistic aspects of modern Christmas celebrations were found likely to undermine well-being, while family and spiritual activities were likely to help people feel more satisfied.

While we seem very clear on what constitutes a meaningful and happy Christmas, for a variety of reasons, we don't always manage to achieve one. This holiday season, we're hoping you'll let us help. Starting right before Advent and extending up until Christmas Eve, Eastside United Church and the Living Spirit Centre have lots of opportunities for you to reclaim the peace, joy and love integral to Christmas.



On Sunday, November 29 and Sunday, **December 6** you will find the Christmas tree in the East Sanctuary decorated with candy canes as part of our Advent campaign in support of Rainbow Youth Centre. Each candy cane will be labeled with the name of a small item you can purchase for donation. Return donations to the church before December 8, and these items will be placed in stockings given out to individuals who attend Rainbow Youth Centre's Christmas Party. The Rainbow Youth Centre involves youth 11-25 years old in creating a safe, caring, healthy and adaptive community of support by sharing responsibility for recognizing, accepting, and developing personal skills.

Sunday, December 6, the LSC Meditation Group will be holding its last class until the new year at 7 pm in the East Sanctuary, a guided meditation from Sharon Moon's "The Healing Oasis." Find retreat from the bustle of Christmas festivities and leave feeling grounded and ready to tackle another week.

Wednesday, December 2 and 9 join us for a quiet time of music, reflection and peace at our shared Advent services. We hope these short services beginning at 7 pm will give you time to recharge and reconnect with the true meaning of Christmas. December 2 is a candlelighting service reflecting on the Old Testament origins of the hymn: O Come, O Come Emmanuel. December 9 is a Blue Christmas Service, particularly for those dealing with the added emotional burden of loss of a loved one.

If you feel overwhelmed by a long list of Christmas tasks and would like to fret less and enjoy more, opt to have Eastside volunteers do your holiday baking for you! **Saturday, December 12** is our 5th Annual Holiday Cookie Walk. Come to the lower hall of the Living Spirit Centre between 10 am and 1 pm and purchase your holiday baking from a wide selection of treats, for the price of \$8/lb.



Advent Reflection

Welcome to Advent!

This time of year, we hear a lot about Christmas but the season of Christmas does not actually start until Christmas Day and continues until Epiphany on December 6. Advent is the time of expectant waiting for Christmas to come, the anticipation of the birth of the Christ-Child, and a reflective time of what we need to do, what we need to change in our lives in preparation for the celebration.

It is a challenging time in our society as stores put up Christmas decorations, preparing for Christmas sales right after Halloween, and the pressure starts for the focus on buying. There is the increasing craziness around a

year started with one person being upset that <u>Starbucks seasonal cup</u> did not have any 'Christmas' symbols on it (previous years it has had only winter type symbols so it was never a 'Christmas' cup. As we discern how to best engage in the season and what is reasonable with regard to gift giving, I invite you to consider a challenge which I am borrowing from One Church, in Chandler Arizona and their Simple Christmas program:

Imagine for a moment...

What if Christmas looked a lot more like Jesus?

This Christmas, what if you bought less stuff and used that money to bless someone in need? What if you carved out quality, unhurried, uninterrupted time to truly celebrate with the people in your life? What if worship was more important than a perfect Christmas?

Because, let's be honest...

Consumerism does not equal happiness, memories, contentment, fulfillment, or meaning. When Christmas begins with worship, it all becomes meaningful.

This Christmas can be different. This Christmas, less means more. Less spending. Less hurry. Less me.

The challenge is this: What if this year, you were to donate to the church, the same amount you spend on Christmas gifts? Or maybe consider donating half to the church and half to an organization that works with helping others and doing justice in the community or world. Perhaps it will cause you to consider spending less on gifts, in order to share more. Isn't that what preparing for the Coming of Christ is all about? May we consider what it means to be people of faith in this time, focusing on the birth of the one who challenges us to care for the poor and oppressed, who speaks up for justice and peace, who comes as the Prince of Peace. Something we really need in our time. May you have a meaningful, wonderful Advent and Christmas, filled with the Peace of Christ, and the blessings of the season!

Instead, let's approach the birth of our Lord


With joyful abandon!


And this year,



Christmas Project helps community youth

This Advent, Eastside is collecting items in support of Rainbow Youth Centre.

RYC is a multi-cultural, community-based organization providing support services for young people aged 11 to 25 years in the City of Regina. Programming at the Centre includes: educational, social, and recreational activities for youth 11 – 19 years; and employment preparation, and parenting programs for youth up to 25 years.

On December 16, Rainbow Youth Centre will be holding its Annual Christmas Celebration for participants. The celebration includes a traditional Christmas supper and the distribution of Christmas Stockings to the youth and the young adults (including their infants and toddlers) who are regularly involved with

programming. It is anticipated that there will be approximately 300 Christmas stockings given to participants this year.

On Sunday, November 29 and Sunday, December 6, the Christmas tree in the East Sanctuary will be decorated with candy canes. Each of these will be labeled with the name of an item to be donated for the RYC stockings. Items include things like toques and mittens, toothbrushes, toothpaste and shampoo, as well as children's books, colouring books and crayons.

All donations need to be returned to the LSC by Tuesday, December 8.

Celebrating the life and work of artist Ovide Bighetty

On Friday, November 13, over 100 people were in attendance at a ceremony commemorating the life and work of artist Ovide Bighetty at the Living Spirit Centre. The evening's activities were capably provided by our partners at Indian Metis Christian Fellowship and included a shared meal of stew and bannock, a pipe ceremony, and the blessing of Bighetty's paintings on display in the East and West Sanctuaries.

Ovide Bighetty was a Cree self-taught artist originally from Pukatawagan First Nation in north western Manitoba. In 2002, Indian Metis Christian Fellowship commissioned Bighetty to create 'Kisemanito Pakitinasuwin – The Creator's Sacrifice'. This series of 17 images in acrylic on canvas presented the Easter story in Ovide's unique Woodland Cree style. These are the paintings on display at LSC.

In 2006, Ovide completed his second commission for IMCF, 'Steps Along the Red Road Following Christ the Creator'. In 2007, Ovide created a third commission for IMCF, 'Kisê-manitow Omiyikowiswin. This series of 17 images depicting the Christmas story.

Ovide Bighetty passed away in Winnipeg on March 20, 2014 at the age of 44.

It is an honour for the Living Spirit Centre to be the Regina home of Ovide's paintings, and equally heartening to have been blessed with an evening of community building with IMCF in celebration and admiration of these works.





Worship at Wascana Rehabilitation Centre

On the third Sunday of every other month, Eastside United Church volunteers hold a worship service for residents at the Wascana Rehabilitation Centre. The service takes place at 1:30 pm and volunteers arrive at the Centre a half-hour ahead of time to usher worshippers from their rooms to the chapel.


All women are welcome to come for an informative and relaxing morning. Please bring a toonie to cover breakfast costs!

Quarterly Financial Update:

January 1 - September 30, 2015

Eastside incurred a substantial deficit of \$6,271 during the first nine months of 2015 (see below). This deficit consisted of an operating surplus of \$4,754 less mortgage payments of \$11,025.

The deficit resulted from very low revenue during the first three months of 2015. At March 31, 2015, Eastside had a deficit of \$8,062, so Eastside has achieved a small surplus in the subsequent six months to narrow the deficit to the present figure of \$6.271.

Although the deficit has narrowed in recent months, it remains a problem, because Eastside has no cash reserves. This means that deficits can only be met by delaying payments on obligations such as our Presbytery assessment.

On a positive note, costs are running slightly below budget, both at Eastside and the LSC, which has partly offset the impact of the decline in giving that occurred in the first quarter of 2015. Also, Eastside's 30% share of the LSC mortgage debt continues to decline, and will be down to \$62,650 at December 31, a reduction of \$55,054 since December 2010.


Members of the congregation are respectfully asked to continue their effort to help Eastside meet its financial obligations.
