because the little one is a disciple amen, I say to you, he will surely not lose his reward."



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

#### June 28, 2020 Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Mt 10:37-42

#### Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

Awkward! A part of me is glad that that today's gospel was not last weekend's reading! We had a great time thanking our dads for their sacrifices and work loving and raising us with our moms. And today we hear Jesus say, "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me" (Matt 10:37). Luke's way of expressing this teaching of Jesus is more awkward and harsh, as he says, "If any one comes to me without hating his father and mother....., he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:26). What, surely not? Jesus is bringing up the unhappy 'What If..' question about us humans sometimes putting our immediate self-interested concerns against God's concern for us. It does seem extreme. Unless we are talking about an infamous crime-syndicate family, likely we won't be faced with making a choice between going with God or going with a brother, sister, mother or father. I wonder what the first disciples thought after hearing this, as they all had family, too. Some of them had family members right alongside themselves in ministry! For example, how did the brothers James and John hear this command of Jesus (Mark 1:19)? Or the brothers Andrew and Peter (Mark 1:16)? Or Peter and his mother-in-law (Luke 4:38)? Or imagine later in the church, when the Acts of the Apostles tells us that whole households, like Lydia's (Acts 16) Cornelius' (Acts 10) the Philippian Jailer's (Acts 16) or even Crispus' (Acts 18) all convert as a whole family? St Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 16:15, that the whole household of Stephanus had "devoted themselves to the service of the saints." With whole families in ministry together, how did they understand Jesus' command to set family aside for the sake of following him?

Let's start by remembering who it is that is telling us to make family second fiddle in our lives by loving God more above all. It is Jesus. He knows family. He is our family, too. He was raised up lovingly in a good Jewish home with all of its familial and bonding rituals. His home kept the Law of Moses. Jesus Himself taught, "I have come not to abolish, but to fulfill the Law' (Matt 5:17). And what does the Law teach us, but, 'Honor your Father and Mother (Ex 20:12). Jesus wants us to love and honor our family. This 4<sup>th</sup> command (itself significant) could be called the first to regulate human to human relations. But the first preceding three commands regulate how we relate to God '1-No other God but Yahweh, 2-Do not take God's name in vain, and 3-Keep Holy His Day' (Ex 20). So Jesus calls us to love and honor our family, under God and according to God's order of blessing and life given. God made my parents, and all my family. I don't have any family if God doesn't give them to me, or better said, 'gave me to them'. God created this whole 'get-up'. I know that God is not going to let anything adverse happen to them because of any call He gives me according to His purpose. First things first. God is our first principle. Parents know this and raise their children to honor and love God above all. They want their children to 'go with God first'. I would question mine and any human's mind, if they were putting me above God, and if I let them. Jesus summarized the whole Law of God as these two commands, "Love God with whole mind, whole heart...."and "Love neighbor as yourself" (Matt 22:38-39). He is teaching us to love our family and our neighbor, yet first acknowledging that God created them. So, love God. And love your family as having come from God, too. Loving God is the original blessing, and then loving all that comes from that originating blessing is next. Starting from God, We work our love outward through further and further rings of responsibility and relationship. I am honoring my father and mother (as they taught me) when I serve and love God first. Consider this: If I do not acknowledge God, then what do I have to give to anyone else? Or, if I put any human being first before God, then I have made them out to be God, which is a disservice to them. They probably will reject me for that, saying, "Don't put that on me! Don't call me in place of God. You have the wrong number!" Well, yes, the wrong priority. Put God first, and all else thrives in its place. Jesus taught this priority in another place in scripture, when he called us to strive for the Kingdom, ahead of & above all earthly worries. In Matthew 6:33, he said, "Seek first the kingdom of God, & His righteousness, and all these things will be given you besides."

Another Saint in a Time of Plague: St. Gregory the Great (born 540 AD - died 3-12-604 AD)

St. Gregory the Great was born around the year 540 in the city of Rome. His father Gordianus, was a wealthy aristocrat along with his wife Silvia, who was from the upper class. They owned a large estate on the Caelian Hill in Rome. Rome was a declining city when Gregory was born, due to repeated invasions and occupations, as well as the natural disasters of a couple of earthquakes. Gregory was a studious child who excelled in school. He was so brilliant that by 30 years old he was placed in the highest civil office of Prefect of the City. However, he felt the call of God to a life of greater prayer and reflection upon divine matters. In 574, he retired from public life and founded a monastery out of his home and welcomed several other men to live the monastic life with him according to the Rule of St Benedict. As a monk, he prayed, fasted and wrote of the mysteries of God. In 578, over his protests, the Pope ordained him as one of the seven deacons of the city of Rome. A Deacon had major responsibilities for the city, serving the public order, distributing charitable aid and seeking peace of alliances with competing cities. Following a local siege and invasion, Pope Pelagius II dispatched a special delegation to the Emperor Tiberius in Constantinople. Gregory went along as an ambassador to the Byzantine court, and was named to a post within the Byzantine court of Constantinople from 579-586. Following this court service, he returned to his home monastery and led the monks as abbot for a couple of years. In this time as abbot, he encountered some young men from England seeking to join the monastery and learned through them of the sad plight of many English boys who were sold into slavery. This sparked his life's heartfelt concern for the youth of England. He asked permission from the Pope to go to England as a missionary. After being recalled by the people of Rome, Gregory sent Augustine of Canterbury and others to evangelize and serve England. In 589 several plagues, a drought and lost harvests, and then a consuming flood devastated Rome. Not one to be idle, Gregory began public ministry work in Rome, seeking to alleviate the severe needs and give comfort to the residents. He called for processions and litanies to be performed for relief from the plague. Much prayer and penance was offered by Gregory's example and by his call for everyone to pray and ask God's intercession. Then in 590, Pope Pelagius II died of the plague. Gregory was elected to become next Pope. He declined and sought appeal from the Emperor to be released from the call to be Pope. But Gregory continued his prayer campaign seeking an end to the afflicting plague. At one time, there were seven different processions of people praying together in public for an end to the plague. A legend has it that a public miracle occurred during one of the processions, that the Archangel Michael appeared atop the mausoleum of the Emperor Hadrian and sheathed his sword signifying the end of the plague. Cases dropped and the plague ended within days. Gregory was named and installed as Pope on September 3, 590. His time as Pope was a busy one as he frequently taught and preached, writing much on church governance and commentary on the scripture. He oversaw reforms to the Church's liturgy, enhancing the universality of its music through spread of Gregorian Chant, adding more music to prayer and even himself composing many Latin hymns. Gregory is often seen with a dove on his shoulder signifying his wisdom interpreting scripture (Holy Spirt) and the influence of music. He personally mediated a peace settlement for Rome with an invading King Agilulf, by leaving the city and meeting the king on the battlefield.

St. Gregory served as Pope for fourteen years, and died on March 12, 604. His writings include the Dialogues (that includes a biography of St Benedict), the Pastoral Rule, Morals and Job, and Homilies on the Gospels, Ezekiel and Song of Songs. Again, he led strong prayer among the whole city for an end to the plague and healing relief came to the city! So, St. Gregory the Great, pray for us!
