Fertilizer Information

NEW SOD LAWNS

For new sod, it is critical to get the roots established quickly. A fertilizer with a suitable amount of phosphorus is best. By applying a fertilizer with a listing of 16-16-16 (at a rate of: 6.5 - 8 lbs. / 1000 sq. ft.) to the bare ground, and watering it in lightly before installing the sod, you will greatly help to establish these new roots. Fertilize your sod about 4 weeks after installation, with a balanced fertilizer such as 16-16-16. Fertilize the sod when it is dry, followed by a thorough watering. This will reduce the chance of burning the grass. The first 2-3 applications should be with a balanced fertilizer, after which you can follow the guidelines for established lawns provided below.

ESTABLISHED LAWNS

For established lawns, aim toward 4-6 fertilizer applications per year (each one supplying about 1 lb. of Nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft.). Suggested applications dates can vary depending on weather (especially early spring and/or late fall). These are general guidelines to follow. Fewer or more applications may be necessary depending upon soil type, weather conditions, etc. Remember to apply fertilizer to a dry lawn, and then water in well as soon as possible.

The chart below is a schedule, which suggests timing for 6 fertilizer applications per year. The number of applications will vary depending on the needs of your lawn. It is best to never apply more than 1 lb. of Nitrogen per 1000 square feet at any single application.

April 1 st (approximately) Spring Fertilizer	Spring fertilizer (such as 12-2-8)
May 14 th (approximately) Summer Fertilizer	Spring fertilizer (such as 12-2-8)
July 1 st (approximately) Summer Fertilizer	Summer fertilizer (such as 25-0-5 w/ slow release).
September 1 st (approximately) Summer Fertilizer	Summer fertilizer (such as 25-0-5 w/ slow release).
October 15 th (approximately) Summer Fertilizer	Fall fertilizer (such as 21-0-21).
December 1 st (approximately) Fall Fertilizer	Fall fertilizer (such as 21-0-21).

* On new sod and lawns avoid Weed and Feed Fertilizer mixtures because it may leach into the soil and burn the roots.
