Then he said to them all, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will save it. What does it profit them if they gain the whole world, but lose or forfeit themselves? Luke 9:23-25

At what point do we appreciate anything/anyone in life? I hope to be more forthright in recognizing the value of people in my life and understand fully the situations and opportunities that I have been afforded. I believe that appreciation comes most readily during times of loss. Endings, mortality, temporal nature of creation are realities that cause me to appreciate. The Bible reminds us that we might know the cost of something but not its true value. There is a cost to discipleship which involves giving up everything, taking up your cross and following...Jesus. We think that we know the cost but we don't and maybe can't understand the true value of that way of life. I would like to share some considerations of discipleship that might be worthy of our time and prayer.

First, we appreciate more what we have when we give it away. I've heard it said that something is not truly yours unless you can give it away. Jesus had the power to lay down his life and the power to take it up again. We appreciate life and the people in it when we give them over to Jesus, and they are free to appreciate us without fear.

Second, we appreciate who we are as we engage others more with our minds, imaginations, hearts and gifts. Spending time with people as they come into our spheres of influence in little ways and large opens up more inside of us to know and share. God did not create you, form you and fill you with gifts for "stuff" but rather for "other people." That is where you are a pearl of great value!! We are blessed to have been accompanied by Oriett as the Palestine Church Secretary for 29 years. Her value is beyond measure to me in this journey of discipleship at Palestine. Jesus has given me this opportunity to appreciate Oriett and her role in this place, as well as the life she offers in love to her church and her Lord. Pray for her and her family as she moves on from this faithful service as church secretary and give thanks to God.

Let us pray. Thank you, O God, for people who walk with us on the way of discipleship. Thank you for the opportunity to appreciate these people in our lives and ministry. Continued blessings on Oriett for her faithful service as church secretary at Palestine and for all the years in your light and life, in Jesus's name we pray. Amen.

Bishop's Election 2020

The current Bishop of the Southeastern Iowa Synod, Michael Burk, has announced he will not be available for reelection at the end of his term in 2020. A new bishop of the Southeastern Iowa Synod will be elected at the Synod Assembly to be held May 1-3, 2020 in Coralville, IA.

The election of a new bishop is a process by which a "pastor of the synod" is called. Similar to the process a congregation undertakes when calling a new pastor.

You work every day to make your community a better place. Let us continue doing this work together in 2019! On Sunday, September 8th:

10 Workers helped at church making quilts as part of Palestine Piecemakers efforts.

47 Workers (35 from Palestine and 12 from Fjeldberg) travelled to Iowa Gardening for Good and harvested produce - 39 pallets of watermelons (36,370 pounds) and 2,787 pounds of cucumbers.

Previous donors will be contacted by email or phone. You may also sign up with Deb Moore in Fellowship Hall following worship.

To be eligible to donate, donors must be at least 16 years of age (16 and 17 year old first time blood donors must have a signed parental/guardian consent form). Donors must weigh at least 120 pounds and be in general good health. An ID preprinted with the donor name is required at registration. Donors are encouraged to eat a good meal and drink plenty of water before donating blood. St Petri Lutheran Church in Story City will be hosting their 30th Annual Turkey Supper on Saturday, October 19th from 5-7. The cost is \$12 for adults and



\$5 for children 12 and under. The supper is served family style and includes roast turkey, dressing, potatoes and gravy, sweet corn, coleslaw, cranberry relish, dinner roll and homemade pie. "Thank You, God"

Every week, when 8-year-old Chase met with LSI's Pastor Dennis Bauer, he would ask to pray for "the same old thing: to find a good, loving forever family."

Chase is in third grade. But in his young life, he has already experienced trauma most of us cannot fathom. When Chase was 6, he was removed from his home and his mother's parental rights were terminated. He felt confused, terrified, and shocked. Chase struggled to cope with his anger and emotions. He acted out and became physically aggressive. Chase needed help, and LSI's Beloit Residential Treatment Center in Ames offered that help.

After arriving at Beloit, Chase quickly became involved in LSI's voluntary Spiritual Life program, where he participates in faith-based activities like art and music. Through regular meetings with Pastor Dennis, Chase says he is focusing on his faith and "trusting in God and saying prayers."

Outside of Spiritual Life, Chase is also learning healthy skills through group therapy to help him cope on the difficult days.

Now, Chase is thriving. His confidence is building every day, and he has big plans for his future. He wants to be a surgeon when he grows up, and he dreams of learning to bake and do woodworking. And the immediate future is looking pretty bright, too: Chase is in the process of being adopted.

During a recent visit with Pastor Dennis, Chase prayed a different prayer: "Thank you, God, for giving me a family."



Each year, millions of Americans face the reality of living with a mental health condition. However, mental illness affects everyone directly or indirectly through family, friends or coworkers. Despite mental

illnesses' <u>reach and prevalence</u>, stigma & misunderstanding are also, unfortunately, widespread.
