CHOICES HAVE CONSEQUENCES!

(Sirach 15:15-20; Psalm 119: 1-5, 17-18, 33-34; 1 Cor. 2:6-10; Matt. 5:17-37)



During one of his Sunday homilies, Father Davis stated from the pulpit that he was "pro choice." When he noticed some discontented and a few smiling faces in the congregation, he boldly announced, "Yes, I am for choice!" His announcement did not sit well with the chairperson of the parish *Pro-Life Group*, who, a day later, hurriedly called a meeting of the *Pro-Life Group*, and

decided to have Father Davis, removed from the parish. The group brought their case before the Pastor and demanded that he send Father Davis away for his "anti pro life stance." In his defense, Father Davis explained that there was a big misunderstanding and misuse of the term, *Pro Choice*. He further asserted that from creation God has given man the free will to choose: "The Lord, your God, says, these commandments that I give you today are neither too high nor too far for you...See, I set before you on this day life and good, evil and death...life and death, blessing and curse. Therefore, choose life that you...may live" (Deut. 30:11, 19). Father Davis argued that his promotion of the concept of choice does not in any way conflict with his belief in pro life, but rather it affirms what the Bible teaches about God's design for human beings to make choices and be ready to bear the consequences of their choices. He was mystified that the *Pro Life Group* labeled him as a supporter of abortion.

Today's first reading from the Book of Sirach further lays emphasize on the freedom of choice you and I have. It teaches that the choices that we make have consequences. It challenges us to make choices that are safe – "If you choose you can keep the commandments, they will save you; if you trust in God, you too shall live...He has set before you fire and water; life and death, good and evil, whichever you choose shall be given to you." Surely, God has given you and me the freedom to choose, but He urges us to always choose good over evil if we want to live and have a happy life. "No one does the Lord command to act unjustly, to none does He give license to sin." In other words, should we act unjustly or should we commit any act that is considered sinful, we are doing so on our own volition – using irresponsibly the freedom God has given to us. Thus, we risk losing the happiness and the life we have been promised.

In one of our recent weekly Bible Study sessions, we discovered that although the Lord God gave us the Ten Commandments to guide us in making choices that will win us life and bring us true happiness, the Scribes and the Pharisees multiplied them and offered various types of interpretations. The Commandments which were meant to free people and give them genuine happiness, became a burden and oppressive. They were interested in the *letter of the law*, but Jesus was concern with the *spirit of the law*. He interpreted the Law in the light of His commandment of love. Thus, in today's gospel, He reminded the Scribes and the Pharisees, who accused Him of breaking the Law, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill."

The purpose of the Ten Commandments is to teach you and me how to relate to God and to each other. They offer us the opportunity to make the right choices that will bring us life. Absolutely, these Commandments are "God's wisdom – mysterious – hidden, which (He) predetermined before all ages for our glory." Therefore, it does not matter whether you and I are *pro life* or *pro choice* – Your choice must never lead you to sin! Choose life over death, good over evil, heaven over an unquenchable fire of hell, and you will live!



SAINT VALENTINE



ST. VALENTIN

Although many don't realize it, St. Valentine's Day is based on the life of St. Valentine, a Roman martyr who was beheaded in c. 269-273 AD. Emperor Claudius II declared that unmarried men were potential soldiers, so he outlawed marriage. However, St. Valentine abhorred

his outrageous action and continued to marry young couples. Claudius attempted to convert St. Valentine to paganism, but St. Valentine resisted and attempted to bring Claudius to the Church and Jesus Christ. For this, the Emperor had St. Valentine beheaded.

In prison he helped the imprisoned soon-to-be martyrs. The jailer saw that Valentine was a man of learning, so he brought his daughter, Julia, to Valentine for lessons. Julia was a young girl, who had been blind since her birth. During the lessons, St. Valentine would read to her about the history of Rome. And, he taught her about God. The following is an account of St. Valentine:

"Valentinus, does God really hear our prayers?" Julia asked one day.

"Yes, my child, He hears each one."

"Do you know what I pray for every morning and every night? I pray that I might see. I want so much to see everything you've told me about!"

"God does what is best for us if we will only believe in Him," Valentinus said.

"Oh, Valentinus, I do believe! I do!" She knelt and grasped his hand.

They sat quietly together, each praying. Suddenly there was a brilliant light in the prison cell. Radiant, Julia screamed, "Valentinus, I can see! I can see!

"Praise be to God!" Valentinus exclaimed, and he knelt in prayer.

On the eve of his death Valentinus wrote a last note to Julia, urging her to stay close to God. He signed it, "From your Valentine." His sentence was carried out the next day, February 14, 270 A.D., near a gate that was later named Porta Valentini in his memory. He was buried at what is now the Church of Praxedes in Rome. It is said that Julia planted a pink-blossomed almond tree near his grave. Today, the almond tree remains a symbol of abiding love and friendship. On each February 14, St. Valentine's Day, messages of affection, love, and devotion are exchanged around the world.

After Julia's healing, the jailer too was converted to Christianity.
