Annual Community Thanksgiving Service to Note Alabama Bicentennial

This year's Community Thanksgiving Service will be held Sunday, Nov. 17, at St. Joseph Catholic Church. Sponsored by the Optimist Club of Perdido Bay and participating churches, the service will begin at 4 p.m. and will commemorate the bicentennial of Alabama.

Pastors from nearly all Lillian churches will take part in the 45 minute service in the sanctuary.

The congregation will then move to Immaculate Mary Hall where choirs from St. Joseph Catholic Church, Bayside Baptist Church, Mount Marriah Baptist Church, Lillian First Baptist Church, Divine Revelation Deliverance Center, Lillian Fellowship and Lillian United Methodist Church will perform.

Donations of non-perishable food will be received as the community food drive concludes that day. Light refreshments will be served afterwards.

St. Joseph Catholic Church was the first church in Lillian, erected in 1929. It has been the home of several congregations while their churches were being built, including Lillian United Methodist, Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran, Episcopal Church of the Advent and Lillian Fellowship. Price Legg Named Grand Marshal of Annual Christmas Parade

The date for the annual Christmas Parade this year falls on the 200th anniversary of Alabama becoming the 22nd state. The celebrations have been combined and Price Legg, chairman of the Lillian Bicentennial Committee, will be the parade grand marshal.

The parade is sponsored by the Optimist Club and Legg is an active member and the perfect choice to lead the bicentennial observance. His ancestors were settlers in Alabama before statehood.

He is a charter member of The Order of First Families of the Alabama Territory, a former president of the Alabama Society Sons of the American Revolution and he served ing at the Birmingham Credit Union. This was the beginning of a long and distinguished career that eventually led to becoming an officer at Credit Union National Association (CUNA) Mutual Insurance Group.

His work for CUNA made it possible for him and his wife, Jean, to travel all over the country, and following retirement, Legg became a member of several organizations' boards of directors which allowed them to continue traveling.

A friend told them about Lillian and the Leggs purchased property on Perdido Bay in 1992 that is still their home.

He was appointed to the Baldwin County Historical Development Commission in 2017 and accepted

as president of The Society War of 1812 in the State of Alabama.

Legg was born in Birmingham and graduated from the University of Alabama in 1961.



The Southern Fox Festival hosted at the Veranda at the Preserve in Elberta will be held Saturday, Nov. 2, with proceeds to benefit Mary's Shelter Gulf Coast.

The day begins at 9 a.m. at Soldier Creek Golf Course with a fourperson scramble shotgun start golf tournament. Tickets are \$65 per person and include lunch and a beverage ticket. Smokey B's BBQ will provide the food for the event. To sign up call 986-TOFF (8633).

The Fall Festival begins at 1 p.m. and includes a harvest market, arts and crafts, food trucks, kids zone and live music from local bands. The family friendly event is free, but donations will be accepted. Food may

Blake decided she wanted to start a winery and have a venue for weddings, family events and a yearly festival. Attendees at the Southern Fox Fall Festival will have an opportunity to participate in the planting.

Community Safety Day to honor local first responders at The Park at OWA in August.

The purpose of the event was to allow local fire, rescue, police and other first responder units to show the community who they are and what they do. LASAR presented a rapelling demonstration, which is always a crowd pleaser as people watch the team set up their equipment and rapel from one of the OWA buildings. LASAR members also demonstrated their dive team equipment and allowed visitors to try on masks and breath through regulators.

Also in August, LASAR took part in the National Night Out in Elberta sponsored by the Elberta Police Department. LASAR brought their command bus, dive equipment and utility all-terrain vehicle and team members answered questions.

In September, LASAR provided medical services for the Tate High School megaball tournament that supports the ROTC program at the school. This game is a mixture of rugby and volleyball. The teams try to score goals by moving a six-foot ball up and down a soccer pitch. LASAR was onsite to provide medical first aid and stabilize injuries as needed.

In October, the LASAR dive team participated in another training dive at Morrison Springs, Fla. Training and practice dives are important to improve competency while diving and with other divers. Procedures are practiced and equipment is



Masonic Mountain Men Perform Legendary Master Mason Degree

Lillian Masonic Lodge 925 joined an elite group of lodges in the country when the Masonic Mountain Men came to Lillian and performed its re-enactment of the Legendary Master Mason Degree on Saturday, Oct. 26. Lodge members from throughout the state attended the event, including the State of Alabama Worshipful Master Van Tidwell.

The group also conducted a general informational program on Friday night to educate non-Masons on what it means to be a Mason. Publicized as a secret organization, the group promotes itself as a leadership development and community service organization that works to improve the community by making good men better.

According to Lillian Lodge 925 Worshipful Master Richard Duggan, "Yes, the group has secrets, but it isn't a secret society."

Mountain man regalia consists of a customized authentic handmade wool trade blanket capote, handmade elk hide moccasins and masonic apron, period-correct handmade osnaburg shirts, pants and a possible bag. All attire is produced to represent the actual dress from 1804 to 1840.

All members of the team confer the degrees in authentic attire. The educational aspects and authenticity of the regalia make the presentation exciting, unique and inspirational. The MMM degrees are indicative of how Masonic forefathers would have performed degrees by starlight and campfire.

Strict research has been done from the time Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, under orders to find a way west by President Thomas Jefferson, set out to find a route to the Pacific Ocean in May 1804. Lewis and Clark were active Masons and conferred numerous degrees.

The Mountain Men gathered annually to trade their wares and often to confer degrees. They conferred many Masonic degrees prior to 1840 at the last rendezvous held at Horse Creek and the Green River near Daniel, Wyo.

Masons throughout the south have witnessed this unique degree team in Tennessee, Georgia, Louisiana and Alabama.

The degree team is limited to 24 active members who must be past masters, be proficient in the adopted work and recommended, elected and accepted by unanimous vote of the degree team active members. Members are assigned a unique number for life with their credentials and a special MMM pin for lapel use outside of the ceremonial regalia. Members include several past grand masters, district deputy grand lecturers and usually one or more members are current grand lodge officers. **Space Cove of Lillian, Alabama Come One, Come All!** The Spanish Cove annual Craft Fair will be held November 2 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the main clubhouse.



Three Die in Crash on Lillian Bridge

Two Alabama teens and a Florida man died in a crash on the Lillian Bridge on U.S. 98 in the early morning hours of Thursday, Oct. 10.

According to Florida Highway Patrol, the accident happened around 4:50 a.m. when a large flatbed truck hauling lumber and other supplies was struck head-on by a Chevy Impala on the bridge which connects Alabama and Florida over Perdido Bay.

The Impala was heading east from Alabama into Florida while the truck was heading west toward Alabama. As the Impala traveled the bridge, it crossed the center line into the westbound lane and crashed headon into the truck, according to FHP.

The freight truck caught fire, and op


the lumber fell onto the road, blocking both lanes. Fuel was also spilled onto the roadway.

The car was being driven by Russell Joseph Drummond, 19, of Elberta, and the passenger was Christian Coleton Beech, 19, of Lillian. Both were ejected from the vehicle and died at the scene.

Sheldon Ray Liddell, 48, of Pensacola, was driving the freight truck and also died at the scene.

The bridge remained closed to traffic for approximately 13 hours as crews cleaned up the scene.







The waitress turned around and said, "Sure, honey, we can pray here. Will you say the prayer for us?" And she turned and looked at the rest of the people in the restaurant and said, "Bow your heads."

Surprisingly, one by one, the heads went down. The little girl then bowed her head, folded her hands, and said, "God is great, God is good, and we thank him for our food. Amen."

That prayer changed the entire atmosphere. People began to talk with one another. The waitress said, "We should do that every morning." As the sad man knelt his head and listened to the innocent prayer, the warmth of God's loving presence washed over him and suddenly, his whole demeanor started to improve. He started to thank God for all that he did have and stopped focusing on all that he didn't have. He started to be grateful.

But soon the city became too crowded, food supplies dwindled, a famine and a plague hit and Eilenburg became a giant morgue. In that year, over 6,000 people in the village, including his wife and all of his children, died. He alone conducted 4,500 funerals that year including his wife's.




Reinkard sat down and wrote the great hymn of thanksgiving.

In the book "A Window on the Mountain," Winston Pierce tells of his high school reunion. A group of classmates were reminiscing about things and persons they were grateful for. One man mentioned he was thankful for Mrs. Wendt, for she had introduced him to Tennyson and the beauty of poetry. Acting on a suggestion, the man wrote a letter of appreciation to Mrs. Wendt and addressed it to the high school.

About a month later the man received a response. It was written in a feeble longhand and read as follows: "My dear Willie, I can't tell you how much your letter meant to me. I am now in my nineties, living alone in a small room, cooking my own meals, lonely, and like the last leaf of fall lingering behind. You will be interested to know that I taught school for forty years and yours is the first letter of appreciation I ever received. It came on a blue, cold morning and it cheered me as nothing has for years. Willie, you have made more than my day. You made my life!"

Let us give thanks with a grateful heart for all that God has done, is doing and is yet to do in our lives. Let us express thanks to those who have impacted our lives.







He said tell me how you packed all the critters in the car. After a few minutes talking on speakerphone, I am feeling better.

"You can do this mom," he says. "By the time you go 2,754 miles,



you'll be a pro."

That statement freaked me out, but I continued. He told me when going up hills not to lug the car. Gear down. Going downhill saves on brakes. Gear down. So every time I come to any kind of an incline, I gear down and proceed. Yes, cars passed me but I expected this. I need to listen to the engine to make sure I'm not lugging my car.

Thank the Lord I only have four days of this. I'm on the expressway and almost to the interstate. All three of my kids have me on GPS so they can monitor me. I have AAA.

I have new brakes, calipers, rotors and tires. I had a complete tune up including an oil change. Everything is good. I only need to drive 688 miles a day. And I will be at my destination in 4 days. Just before my 65th birthday.




A former colleague who sometimes proofreads these columns before submission told me this column sounded judgmental.

Self-Destructive Behavior: Causes, Traits and Types, by Jack Nolan. Nolan writes that destructive behavior is "a symptom of other underlying dysfunction or psychological disorders that a person may be experiencing," two of the most common being emotional pain and trauma. Nolan says the behavior may be "intentional or subconscious, impulsive or planned."

While Nolan's response may be clinically accurate, it leaves me still needing an answer at the emotional level. So maybe the ultimate answer, for me, is "there is no answer." Those of us who want answers must learn to live with the ambiguity and discomfort of not knowing. Perhaps the best we can do is search our hearts and commit to being better persons, trusting in a merciful God who understands our frailties and loves us in spite of them.




