# **Committee Takes Aim at Bay Cleanup** Key to Success Rests With Citizen Input

The new Western Perdido Bay Watershed Action Committee is calling all bay lovers to band together to help clean up Perdido Bay.

It's a chance for the community to play an active role in helping to preserve the waterway that is the scenic backdrop to our lives. A three-member committee has been working with area environmental experts for more than a year to study the condition of the bay and how to restore it. Now they're asking the community to weigh in.

"An initial study of the watershed has been done, recommendations have been made and the results are coming soon. Now we want the community's input," said Lucy Smith, one of three local committee members of the fledgling Western Perdido Bay Watershed Action Committee.

The committee is inviting people from Lillian, Perdido Beach, Soldier Creek, Josephine and other nearby communities to its first public meeting later this month. The meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. Monday, Aug. 28 at Lillian Fire Station 2 on Hwy 91.

Smith, along with Lani Cameron and Mike Cleveland, has been working with Ashley Campbell, Baldwin County Environmental Commissioner, Foley Environmental Director Leslie Gahagan and the Mobile Bay Estuary Program to draw up an initial report on the condition of Perdido Bay waters and ways to make it better.

"I grew up on the water and I love to fish," Smith said. "I wanted a place for my grandkids to be able to enjoy the water like I did."

Since the 1960s, research has cited the International Paper Mill in Cantonment as a likely cause of excessive nutrients, depressed oxygen levels, high levels of bacteria, and other problems in Eleven Mile Creek and Perdido Bay.

The WPBWAC, which focuses on the Alabama side of Perdido Bay, is still working on its findings and does not have a firm timeline for when they will present them. But other environmental studies over the past decade have painted a bleak picture.

A National Wetlands Research Center study found Perdido Bay lost more aquatic grasses than any other bay on the

Gulf, reporting dramatic drops in marine life.

Last year, the Bayou Marcus water reclamation facility increased its discharge of sewage into wetlands draining into Perdido Bay, a move scientists predicted would add more harmful nutrients and "residential waste" into the bay.

The Western Perdido Bay Watershed Action Committee will be updating the public about what they've been working on with the Mobile Bay Estuary Program on a wide range of topics ranging from fish and wildlife and environmental health to local heritage and culture, beaches and shorelines.

"Our outlook for the future of Perdido Bay is very optimistic. Our hope is to get the local citizens involved in improving their watershed" said Mike Cleveland, founding committee member.

"You don't need any experience at all, just a love for the water and the hope that we leave it better than we found it for our children to enjoy," Cameron said.

The committee plans to meet monthly or bi-monthly to brainstorm with experts from the various natural resource agencies in Baldwin County and the State of Alabama, working for "long-lasting change that will impact everyone who uses the watershed," she said.

"If you have even a curiosity about possibly getting involved, we invite you to attend the upcoming meeting in August and see what it's all about," Cameron said.





## **Evelyn Underhill: A Mystic and Theologian for the Ages**

Evelyn Underhill (1875-1941) was a British writer, mystic, and theologian who is known for her extensive writings on mysticism and spirituality. She was born in Wolverhampton, England, and was educated at King's College London. First a member of the Catholic Church, she later converted to the Church of England and became an active member of the Anglo-Catholic movement.

In her writings, Underhill is important for her contributions to the study of mysticism, which she approached both as a scholar and as a practitioner. Her book "Mysticism: A Study in the Nature and Development of Spiritual Consciousness" (1911) is still considered a classic in the field. In this work, Underhill defined mysticism as "the art of union with Reality" and traced its development through different religious traditions. Underhill substituted (1) mysticism is practical, not theoretical, (2) mysticism is an entirely spiritual activity, (3) the business and method of mysticism is love, and (4) mysticism entails a definite psychological experience.

By 1921, Underhill was to all outward appearances, in an enviable position. She had been asked by the University of Oxford to begin a series of lectures on religion, and she was the first woman to gain such an honor. She was an authority on her own subject of mysticism and respected for her research and scholarship. Her writing was in demand, and she had an interesting and notable set of friends, devoted readers, a happy marriage and loyal parents. At the same time she felt that her foundations were insecure and that her zeal for reality was resting on a basis that was too fragile. By 1939, she was a member of the Anglican Pacifist Fellowship, writing a number of important tracts expressing her antiwar sentiment.

As an Anglo-Catholic, Underhill was committed to the sacramental and liturgical aspects of Christianity, as well as to the social and ethical implications of the faith. She believed that the Church had a vital role to play in the transformation of society and that the sacraments were means of grace that could enable individuals to encounter God and be transformed.

Underhill was also interested in the role of women in the Church. In her book "The

Church and the Mystic Way" (1920), she argued that women had a special role to play in the spiritual life of the Church and that their contributions had been undervalued. Underhill writes that "the sacramental life of the Church demands the ministry of women as well as men." She also argues that "the Church's sacramental system, which involves the use of material things as symbols

of spiritual realities, is peculiarly adapted to women's ways of thought and feeling." Additional quotes from her several books and lectures include: "Eternity is with us, inviting our contemplation perpetually, but we are too frightened, lazy, and suspicious to respond; too arrogant to still our thought, and let divine sensation have its way. It needs industry and goodwill if we would make that transition; for the process involves a veritable springcleaning of the soul, a turning-out and rearrangement of our mental furniture, a wide opening of closed windows, that the notes of the wild birds beyond our garden may come to us fully charged with wonder and freshness, and drown with their music the noise of the grama-phone within. Those who do this, discover that they have lived in a stuffy world, whilst their inheritance was a world of morning-glory: where every mouse is a celestial messenger, and every thrusting bud is charged with the full significance of life."

"The birth of Christ in our souls is for a purpose beyond ourselves: it is because his manifestation in the world must be through us. Every Christian is, as it were, part of the dust-laden air which shall radiate the glowing epiphany of God, catch and reflect his golden Light. Ye are the light of the world - but only because you are enkindled, made radiant by the one Light of the world. And being kindled, we have got to get on with it, be useful. As Christ said in one of his ironical flashes, "Do not light a candle in order to stick it under the bed!" And finally two of my favorites, "We mostly spend our lives conjugating three verbs: to Want, to Have, and to Do ... " and "If God were small enough to be understood, He would not be big enough to be worshipped."





## How Bonds Fit in a Diversified Portfolio

Most investors are aware of the different types of stocks: big-company, small-company, technology, international and so on. And it may be a good idea to own a mix of these stocks as part of your overall investment portfolio. But the importance of diversification applies to bonds, too - so, how should you go about achieving it?

To begin with, individual bonds fall into three main types: municipal, corporate and government. Within these categories, you'll find differences in the bonds being issued.

For example, government bonds include conventional, fixed-rate Treasury bonds as well as inflationprotected ones, along with bonds issued by government agencies, such as the Federal National Mortgage Association (or Fannie Mae). Corporate bonds are differentiated from each other by several factors, but one important one is the interest rate they pay, which is largely determined by the credit quality of the issuer. (The higher the rating grade — AAA, AA and so on — the lower the interest rate; higher-rated bonds pose less risk to investors and therefore pay less interest.)

Municipal bonds, too, are far from uniform. These bonds are issued by state and local governments to build or improve infrastructure, such as airports, highways, hospitals and schools. Generally, municipal bonds are exempt from federal tax and often state and local taxes, too. However, because of this tax benefit, municipal bonds typically pay lower interest rates than many corporate bonds.

How can you use various types of bonds to build a diversified bond portfolio? One method is to invest in mutual funds that invest primarily in bonds. By owning a mix of corporate, government and municipal bond funds, you can gain exposure to much of the bond world. Be aware, though, that bond funds, like bonds themselves, vary widely in some respects. To illustrate: Some investors may choose a low-risk, low return approach by investing in a bond fund that only owns Treasury securities, while other investors might strive for higher returns — and accept greater risk — by investing in a highervield, but riskier bond fund.

But you can also diversify your bond holdings by owning a group of individual bonds with different maturities: short-, intermediate- and long-term. This type of diversification can help protect you against the effects of interest-rate movements, which are a driving force behind the value of your bonds — that is, the amount you could sell them for if you chose to sell them before they matured. When market interest rates rise, the price of your existing, lower-paying bonds will fall, and when rates drop, your bonds will be worth more. But by building a "ladder" of bonds with varying maturities, you can take advantage of different interest-rate environments. When market rates are rising, you can reinvest your maturing, shorter-term bonds at the new, higher rates. And when market rates are low, you'll still have

longer-term vour bonds working for (Generally, you. though not always, longer-term bonds pay higher rates than shorter-term ones.)

A bond ladder should be consistent with your investment objectives, risk tolerance and financial circumstances. But if it's appropriate for your needs, it could be a valuable tool in diversifying your bond holdings. And while diversification in either stocks or bonds - can't always guarantee success or avoid losses, it remains a core principle of successful invest-

## Cicada Killer: For Bugs, It's What Nightmares Are Made Of

There are lots of things in the world that look alike from people (like actresses Zoe Saldaña and Thandie Newton) to cars (like the Aston Martin DB9 and the Ford Fusion) to even a moth that imitate snakes (the Atlas Moth).

The Cicada Killer, sometimes known as a Cicada Hawk, is another one of these look a-likes. This insect looks very much like an oversized Yellowjacket. Or, since 2020, when the world became aware of Asian Giant Hornets, people confuse Cicada Killers for the giant wasps. (Fun fact, Asian Giant Hornets have only been spotted in the United States in Washington State. Their department of Agriculture moved swiftly to eradicate them!)

Eastern Cicada Killers, *Sphecius speciosus*, is the largest species of wasp in Alabama. They are often seen skimming around lawns and trees seeking burrow sites. These insects have transparent amber color wings and black abdomens featuring three uneven and jagged yellow bands which are distinct characteristics of Cicada Killer wasps.

Cicada Killers are solitary digger wasps, meaning they build nests in the ground. Nests are made in areas with full sun exposure and little vegetation. The tunnels usually have a distinctive U-shaped collar of loose soil around the opening. These burrowed homes can reach depths of 10 to 20 inches and contain up to 16 individual chambers. They may dig along sidewalk or patio edges, in flower beds, gardens, or lawns. Be sure to monitor any window boxes, flower beds or planters as these insects may nest in these areas!


If a Čicada killer digs at the base of a plant, the tunnels could disrupt

the plants root system. If only a few plants are affected, soaking the base of the plants with water is a good approach. The wasps do not like wet soil (it's hard to excavate heavy, wet soil, you know) so they may abandon the site. Watering the plants thoroughly will also settle soil back around the roots of the plant. Do not drench soil around plants with an insecticide mix because it may damage the roots and/or leave residue in or on the plant. Be especially careful around those plants that are meant for eating!


The Cicada Killer wasp will grow from 1 to 2 inches in size. Because they are large, people tend to think they are dangerous. The truth is that Cicada Killer wasps are passive insects that do not pose a threat to people. Only female Cicada Killers are capable of stinging and will only do so if disturbed. And by disturbed, I mean swatting at them, screaming, running about, and waving hands around in the air.

The males are territorial but are unable to sting. They will try to protect their nest by approaching anything that enters "their area", including people, pets, mowers or weed eaters, or riding tractors. They may hover and challenge (dive bomb) trespassers but are harmless which can be easy to forget when a big wasp is chasing you. Ignore it and you can pass through areas where wasps are active without attracting their attention.

Some dogs and cats may catch cicada killers because the insects are often low to the ground. Most pets learn their lesson after the first time! Pets that pick on female wasps probably will be stung! Hopefully, they will remember it, and associate the experience with the buzzing sound of the wasps' wings and the warning colors. Some pets may have a severe reaction to the venom, especially if stung in the mouth. If a reaction is suspected (swelling is usually a BIG hint) then the animal should be taken to a veterinarian immediately.



Just like its name suggests, the



Cicada Killer is a predator of cicadas. Adult wasps feed on flower nectar and drink tree sap. The wasps hunt cicadas to feed their young. They can even attack their prey in mid-air! The cicada is stunned by a sting from the female wasp. The sting will paralyze the cicada. The wasp will carry the cicada to its burrow. The female wasp lays one egg on the numbed cicada and seals the chamber.

The egg will hatch within 2 to 3 days of being laid. Then the hairy, grub-like larva feeds will slowly consume their meal. Their meal is the stunned cicada!

Over the course of about 10 days, the larvae will eat leaving only the cicada's outer shell. During the fall, the larva spins a silken case, basically shrink wrapping itself, and prepares to overwinter.

The adult wasps emerge the next summer to start the cycle again.

teers take care of our children and our community.



## Life is Full of Difficulties: Best Advice is to "Be of Good Cheer"

I grew up with a special needs older brother and witnessed how cruel people were towards him. When I was 10, he had to be institutionalized and I remember crying my eyes out praying to the Lord to please make my brother better.



This past fall I laid him to rest at the age of 53 following infections he developed from burn wounds he received from the abuse of a group home em-

ployee. When I was nine, we went to my grandparents' home to eat with my dad's side of the family and exchange Christmas gifts. When we arrived, I discovered my grandfather was having a heart attack and what was supposed to have been a time of cheer was spent crying over his passing. My father was a medic and fireman and tried to revive him. I'll never forget seeing him weep as he was unable to bring him back.

At 12 my parents divorced and after a year and a half of living with my father, I moved in with my mother and grandparents. Before finishing college two more of my grandparents passed.

By age 37 my remaining grandmother and both of my parents passed. As I write this, I am sitting in a recliner having to change wound bandages from a back-to-back surgical procedure that is taking me a lot longer to recover from than I or my doctor hoped. I know I will heal, and this will be just another of my sad memories, but it feels hopeless right now.

Yet through it all God has been good to me and provided peace and comfort in ways that I will never be able to comprehend.

We all understand the despair of hardships and suffering. For those who have experienced physical and emotional suffering, disappointment and struggles you know how hard it can be to be hopeful.

The unexpected and unwelcome storms of suffering will come your way in many forms. Your storm may look like a lost relationship or a lost job. Your terrible tempest may include financial reversals or a health crisis. When it hits, you will ask, "Where do these stinking storms come from?" and "Can my suffering fit into God's plan?" One of the great benefits of Christianity is adopting a Jesus-centered worldview which helps make sense of suffering. Jesus declared, "In this world, you will have tribulation, but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." (John 16:33) In this statement Jesus reveals two truths about suffering: first, you will crash into it; and second, God will win! I cannot imagine going through this life without Jesus as my Lord and Savior.

In this life, we will encounter tribulation and suffering that stems from three primary sources: the devil, disasters, and disobedience.

The devil is a real and personal force for evil who wants to hurt you. Satan's job description is to "kill, steal and destroy." (John 10:10) Jesus comes to bless and Satan comes to blast! You need to understand that the devil authors an immense amount of suffering. Another source of suffering is disasters. We live in a fallen world that is dangerous and unpredictable, making life fleeting and fragile.

On the jagged journey of life, you will be bloodied and bruised when your path crosses those inevitable disasters. There will be train wrecks, pandemics, tornadoes, earthquakes, floods, fires, famine, babies born with deformities and every type of disease in our flawed environment.

So, don't be shocked when you have a wreck with a natural disaster in this fallen world because it comes with the territory. Thirdly, disobedience is a factor in the equation of suffering. God wired into you a freedom to choose. You can receive or reject Christ.

You are not a puppet. Your choices can bring blessings or disastrous consequences for you and for others. But here is the rest of the story, Jesus proclaimed, "Be of good cheer for I have overcome the world!" Jesus is the Resurrected Redeemer and His power is bigger than your problem!

## Lillian Firefighters Study Landing Zone Safety

The Lillian Volunteer Fire Department responded to 76 calls dispatched by the 911 operators in June: 39 Medical Assistance; 9 Public Assists; 2 Motor Vehicle Accidents/Clean up; 1 Brush Fire; 1 Structure Fire; 8 Cancelled en route; 14 False Alarm/Miscellaneous; and 2 Aircraft Standby.

To ensure excellence in the Lillian Volunteer Fire Dept, Chief, Dewhurst and Deputy Chief, Mullane are consistently providing training opportunities to promote highly skilled and professional firefighters. Not only are the firefighters provided with the best training, but several have also been through extensive training to become certified instructors. All the hard work of the officers has afforded our department a welldeserved reputation as first-class fire fighters and instructors. Because of our highly trained instructors, we were approached by Summerdale VFD and requested to hold a Hazmat A&O class for their department and several other fire departments in the surrounding fire districts. Although this was a last-minute request, LVFD personnel immediately stepped up to the challenge to ensure the class was planned and taught without issue.

Over the years, LVFD has encountered many of our medical calls turning into critical situa-

tions where an emergency evacuation is needed. Depending on the situation and traffic, air flights are usually requested for transportation. As you can imagine, it can be very dangerous for helicopters to land in small spaces with buildings and overhead power lines. Precise communication between the fire department and pilot is essential for a safe landing and takeoff. For this reason, continued training is essential. Last month, Perdido Beach Fire and AirCare hosted a Landing zone class for our department and our mutual aid departments - thank you Perdido for hosting this event.

It won't be long before the kids are back at school; however, some families are going to find it extremely difficult to purchase the required school supplies because of financial difficulties. To help our communities, Lillian, Josephine, Elberta and Perdido Beach volunteer fire departments have setup a school supply drive to support our children in Elberta schools. The drive was held last Saturday at the Lillian Dollar General. This will continue for the next several Saturdays. Please help us in providing essential supplies and opportunities for all our children.


Singer Jones grew up belting Gospel in daily duets and weekly church performances. Over time, music came to be less of a pleasure and more of a grind.

Jones demurs, tossing

kudos to her husband Jeremiah and the band's stable of sound technicians.

"The sound guys make a lot of magic in the back," she says.

While the band prides itself on the variety of its repertoire, *Shallow* is an outlier in its playbook. Motown hits, country and classic rock are the staples of the Highway 95 playlist.

That's what drummer and singer Ken Perkins grew up on with his garage band buddies in the Boomer era. He sings with the band now, but he's always been all about the drums.

"I always wanted to play the drums as a little kid," he said "I asked for a drum set every Christmas."

He got them.

But Perkins' relationship with singing is the opposite of Jones'.

"I had no desire to sing," he said. "The fact that I'm singing with the band is a big accident."

During an interim when the band was recruiting a new lead singer, the recently retired Navarre fire chief started standing in at practice. It wasn't long before the search had ended right where it started and Perkins kept his hand on the mic.

For a guy who has no desire or background in vocals, Perkins feels quite comfortable covering legendary country crooners like George Jones for *He Stopped Loving Her Today*. You would never guess that singing was an after-thought as he aptly delivers *Purple Rain* and Southern rock hits from ZZ Top and Lynyrd Skynyrd.

"We're all over the map " he tells the audience. "If you don't like what we're playing now, just wait a couple songs and we'll be on to something else."

If the band is all over the musical map, Jones is the passport to many of the continents. And, like any good tour guide, she likes to tell a tale as she goes.

"The songs I love to sing most are the ones that tell.a story," she says.

She brings us to *Jolene* in a soulful sound that is familiar, but not at all Dolly Parton. She gives us the grit in Joplin's *Me and Bobby McGee*. And she she loves to hype a crowd with Elle's *X*'s and O's.

Whatever Highway 95 is playing, all roads lead to the dance floor.

*The Wobble, Boot Scoot Boogie and Wagon Wheel are* sure to get the line dancers up and prancing. Jones is known to hop off the stage and join dancers in country choreography.

"I just can't help but join in the fun " she said.

You can join in on the fun with Highway 95 on Aug. 26 at American Legion 340 on Ashland Avenue in Pensacola.

We certainly hope they'll be back in Lillian sometime very soon.
