Pastor Doug Veal ~ Christmas Traditions

Each year, as we come towards December, all of us begin to think about the Christmas traditions that we want to hold on for the year. I started thinking about some of the traditions that I had in my own family growing up, as well as some of the ones that Tasha and I follow now. On the first Sunday of Advent, I shared a bit about the tradition my family had of tracking the days until Christmas on a Santa cut-out my father had made one year for his school class (before becoming a pastor later in life). This was a tradition that I absolutely looked forward to each year, and still miss a bit now. Though Tasha and I have a similar tradition, except that it is focused around a candy countdown. Tasha created a crocheted calendar for us a few years ago that has pockets for the twenty-five days in December leading up to and including Christmas. Each year, now, we purchase chocolates to put in the pockets, and use that as our countdown to Christmas. In some ways, I like this even more, as I get to have a bit of a sweet treat each day as we approach Christmas.

Many of us have a tradition of putting up and decorating a Christmas tree at home each year. And whether you do so using an artificial tree (as we do), or use a real tree, this often is a bright highlight in holiday traditions for our homes. I look forward each year to pulling out our tree and ornaments to decorate our home. One thing I don't miss as we do this each year now is having to put lights up on our tree, since we moved to a pre-lit tree several years ago. That was always one of my least favorite aspects of tree decorating, since no matter how carefully I put the lights away each year, they still seemed to find a way to get tangled up. Though I still remember, as well, as a child when we had some of the older Christmas lights that wouldn't turn on if even a single light bulb was out. I really don't miss those!

We also often will find time to visit with our families, traveling to see both Tasha's side of the family and my side of the family. We are hoping to get to do so again this year, since we were unable to do so last year due to COVID-19.

While many of our traditions revolve around decorations and family, we may also have spiritual traditions that we engage upon as we approach Christmas. Of course, here at the church we have our tradition of lighting the Advent Candles each Sunday as we approach Christmas. One of my traditions is to use the Advent devotional that we get each year. I often find that to be a very rewarding spiritual tradition that helps me to focus on the meaning of Advent and Christmas. I also look forward to the opportunity to gather on Christmas Eve for our annual Candlelight service, a special time to hear the Christmas story right before Christmas Day.

As you begin to think and look towards Christmas, I would like to invite you to take time to really think about the traditions you have for Christmas. Ask yourself why these traditions are important to you (or, alternatively, if they are things you do just because you've always done them). How are they helping you to prepare for Christmas this year? I'd love to hear from you about the traditions you have, why you do them, and how they contribute to your own experience of the Advent and Christmas seasons.

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Church Board

Board Reorganization Report:

At the regularly scheduled church board meeting on December 8, the board reorganized itself for 2022. Dennis Horn will continue to serve as our board chairperson, and Dave Hahn will continue to serve as our vice chairperson. Our commission chairs will remain the same, with Laurie Kiefabber Cornett continuing as our Nurture/Witness chair, and Larry Jamerson continuing as our Stewards chair. The Nurture/Witness commission will consist of Laurie Kiefabber Cornett, Audrey Hahn, Sharon Larrowe, Jean Martin, Barb Miller, Linda Miller, and Michelle Roudebush. The Stewards commission will consist of Larry Jamerson, Bethene Gill, Cliff Ross, and Dave Hahn. Carol Horn will be continuing as our clerk, completing the third year of her first term next year. We want to especially thank those board members who completed their sixth year of service in 2021: Linda Barkey, Bonnie Haughn, and Mikayla Stanley.

Actions of the 2021 Church Council Meeting:

On Sunday, November 14, following worship and a meal, the annual Church Council meeting was held. Reports from the various commissions, the board, and the pastor were heard. The slate of officers for 2022 was adopted, including approving three year board terms for Dave Hahn, Michelle Roudebush, and Cliff Ross. Laurie Kiefabber Cornett was approved for a one year term as our Annual Conference delegate, and a two year term as District Conference delegate. Mikayla Stanley was approved to a one year term as District Conference Delegate. Pam Little was approved to a new three year term on the Nominating Committee. Bob Gross was approved to a new three year term as our moderator.

Three people were recognized for concluding six years on the church board: Linda Barkey, Bonnie Haughn, and Mikayla Stanley.

The following persons will continue on the church board as they complete three year terms: Laurie Kiefabber Cornett (1st term, 2023), Bethene Gill (2nd term – 2023), Audrey Hahn (1st term – 2023) Dennis Horn (2nd term – 2022), Larry Jamerson (2nd term – 2022), Sharon Larrowe (2nd term – 2023), Jean Martin (1st term – 2022), Barb Miller (2nd term – 2023), and Linda Miller (2nd term – 2022).

The 2022 Church Budget was adopted, with projected spending totaling \$90,570 for 2022. This represents a decrease of 6.25% from the 2021 Budget. A portion of this savings comes from a revised contract with Pastor Doug, who will be on an 11 month contract for 2022. Tentatively, the plan is for him to take a month off from mid-September to mid-October next year. Copies of the 2022 budget are available through the church office.

Commissions and Board will be at 6:30pm on Wednesday December, 8. Commissions meet at 6:30 and the Board meeting will start at 7. All new members of the board who start in 2022 are <u>invited</u> to attend the board meeting, as we will be re-organizing the board for 2022.


Christmas Eve Service ~ December 24, 2021

National Youth Conference "Foundational" Colossians 2:5-7 July 23 – 28, 2022 in Fort Collins, Colorado

The registration fee, which includes food, lodging, and programming, will be \$550. Youth who have completed ninth grade through one year of college at the time of NYC (or are age equivalent) and their adult advisors will gather at Colorado State University in Fort Collins, Colo. Online registration will open in early 2022 on <u>www.brethren.org</u>.

The cabinet discussed theme ideas relevant to senior high youth. Ultimately, the theme that emerged was "Foundational," based on scripture from Colossians 2:5-7, "For though I am absent in body, yet I am with you in spirit, and I rejoice to see your morale and the firmness of your faith in Christ. As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving."

We talked about all of the ways that God is revealed as the foundation for our lives throughout the Bible. Some examples of this are the cornerstone, the way that God can be seen as an anchor for our lives, and how we remain rooted in God in all circumstances.

Isabella Torres noted, "Picking the theme was difficult at first because we had so many different ideas, but all of our ideas always intertwined with having a foundation in God. To me, it is a great theme, and it is also something I find to be very important as a youth today."

Luke Schweitzer shared, "I am really excited about this theme and I cannot wait to see what the speakers and youth do with it next summer."

Upcoming Brethren Academy Courses

Clergy Tax Seminar–January 29, 2022

The annual Clergy Tax Seminar will consist of two sessions:

• Morning Session, from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. EST, will focus on the rules surrounding Clergy Tax Returns, including who is subject to these rules, what income is subject to tax, and how to reduce total tax liability using various methods. Credit for 0.3 CEUs will be available for attending Session 1 only. According to the new webinar policy, CEUs may also be earned by viewing the recording and filling out the report form. (Registration is required to receive the recording.)

• Afternoon Session, from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. EST, participants will complete a clergy tax return using H&R Block's highest tier (Premium and Business) downloadable software.

Registration and Cost: Registration is \$40 per person (generally nonrefundable to keep fees and overhead low). Current Brethren Academy, Bethany Theological Seminary and Earlham School of Religion students may attend the seminar at no cost, although registration is still required to allow us to provide you with web access to the seminar. Instructions and handouts will be sent a few days prior to the event. Registrations are not complete until payment is received. For quality reasons, registrations may be capped at eighty-five persons.

Prompt registration is advised - registration deadline is January 19, 2022.
