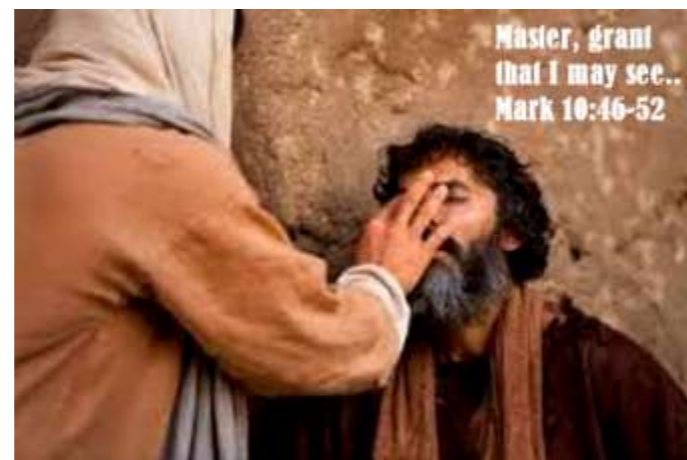

World Mission Sunday

The World Mission Sunday is an annual celebration which we observe on the second last Sunday of October. According to Pope Francis, the purpose of the World Mission Sunday is to "recall with gratitude all those men and women who by their testimony of life help us to renew our baptismal commitment to be generous and joyful apostles of the Gospel. Let us remember especially all those who resolutely set out, leaving home and family behind, to bring the Gospel to all those places and people at thirst for its saving message." This means that the observation of the World Mission Sunday should be, for us, an opportunity to, firstly, thank God for our brothers and sisters who passed on the Christian faith to us. Secondly, we continue to pray for missionaries and their ministry around the globe. Thirdly, it is also an opportunity for us to renew our faith and commitment to share the mission of the risen Lord who told us, "Go therefore to the highways and byways, and invite everyone you find" (Mt 22:9). How can we do this?

The theme of the World Mission Sunday 2021 is 'We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard' (Acts 4:20). The theme reflects the boldness, courage and confidence of Peter and John to preach the Good News of the risen Lord without fear despite strong warning by the Sanhedrin. Moreover, the theme also reflects the tremendous power of the Spirit of the risen Lord who had worked miraculously in the lives of His apostles. They had lived with Jesus for three years and accompanied Him in His ministry. They were eyewitnesses of what He did and taught. They also witnessed His suffering, death and resurrection. Their encounter with Him had transformed their lives. For instance Peter, who was a simple fisherman and even denied Jesus three times, had been transformed into a powerful witness of the risen Lord. Hence, turning back or keeping their mouths shut from proclaiming the risen Lord to anyone was not possible. Listening to God, for them, was far more important than to men.

What does this theme mean to us? We must admit that unlike the apostles we are not eyewitnesses of Jesus' life in Palestine. We did not witness what He did and taught. However, we must keep in mind that our Christian faith is rooted in the apostolic eyewitness testimony. How can we have the boldness, courage and confidence of Peter and John and the rest of the apostles to give a living witness to the risen Lord? The secret, I believe, is to have a personal encounter with the risen Christ. Such encounter may take place in the Eucharist, prayer, reading and meditating the Word of God, and so on. We can experience God's healing power from all sort of brokenness in our personal encounter with Him. We may experience God's unconditional love in an intimate relationship with Him. Our living witness of God's love, then, comes from our personal encounter with Him. Our witness, I believe, will be more persuasive when it flows from our personal encounter with the risen Lord. Reminding us of the strong connection between personal encounter with the risen Lord and our live testimony, Pope Francis says, 'Once we experience the power of God's love we cannot help but proclaim and share what we have seen and heard. Jesus' relationship with his disciples and his humanity shows us the extent to which God loves our humanity and makes his own our joys and sufferings, our hopes and our concerns'.

We live in a world that is devastated by many problems such as climate change, wars, crisis of migrants and refugees, Covid-19 pandemic, etc. It is to such situations and conditions that God calls us to bear witness to His loving care and compassion. Encouraging us to listen to God's whispering call, Pope Francis says that 'Jesus needs hearts capable of experiencing vocation as a true love story that urges them to go forth to the peripheries of our world as messengers and agents of compassion'. Let us continue to pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit to discern God's call to be messengers and agents of His loving care and compassion like Peter and John.

Please do not attend Mass if you are feeling unwell, have tested positive or are waiting for a Covid test result.

World Mission Sunday

This Sunday, the second last Sunday of October, is World Mission Day – established by Pope Pius XI in 1926.

This year's theme is:

"We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20).

In his message Pope Francis said:

"We know that the call to mission is not a thing of the past, or a romantic leftover from earlier times. Today too Jesus needs hearts capable of experiencing vocation as a true love story that urges them to go forth to the peripheries of our world as messengers and agents of compassion."

"He addresses this call to everyone, and in different ways. We can think of the peripheries all around us, in the heart of our cities or our own families. Universal openness to love has a dimension that is not geographical but existential."

Persons aged over 18 must have a current Working With Children Check or be willing to apply for one.

Assistance to do so is available.

Working With Children Checks (WWCC):

It is a requirement of the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne that all clergy, employees and volunteers over the age of 18 are required to maintain a current Working With Children Check throughout their involvement in parishes, Agencies and entities. This is to ensure that we all stand united in creating safe environments for children and young people. The application process can be commenced online and finalised at a participating Australian Post Office.

While most of our frequent volunteers already hold updated WWCC that are recorded in our parish register, we urge volunteers who have not yet applied for a Check or whose Check has expired or not linked to the parish do so via the WWCC website:
