Fall is here and winter is just around the corner! It is the time of year when many people



celebrate holidays as well as decorate. And with that in mind, we have to consider the safety of the decorations that we put in and around our homes. Our goal is always to keep everyone safe from harm in whatever way we can. Just recently an article was put out regarding the safety of Smoke Alarms that have been purchased online.

*****Special Notice Regarding Smoke Alarms***** It has been determined that many smoke alarms that were purchased online do not have the safety seals of the UL (Underwriters Laboratories) or the ETL (Intertek) per a news release by Kidde and Mr. Neal Zipser, Community Affairs Manager. The article states that products not tested to this standard may not accurately detect fire, alarm the consumer in a timely manner, operate for the desired time period or meet other critical performance standards.

If you have purchased one of the non-tested models, you may want to consider replacing it at your earliest convenience. Any products that are installed by a consumer not meeting the listing and testing requirements may be in violation of the law and subject to the prescribed penalties.

If you are in need of help determining whether or not your smoke alarms are properly meeting the requirements, you can generally see a UL or ETL marking on the back of the detector. (Cont. p. 2)

If you are concerned and you have questions regarding the origin of your smoke detectors,

err on the safe side and have them checked or replaced. Your safety and the safety of your loved ones are most important.

As we prepare for the winter season and the holidays, here are some safety tips to remember. If you decorate with lights or decorations



that need to be plugged in, be sure the plugs are either waterproof or weatherproof if they are to be used outdoors and that they are not frayed or worn.

If you use live plants, whether it is a wreath, tree or garland, make sure they are properly watered, if needed, and once they begin to lose their needles, it may be time to remove them as they become more flammable. Remember if you use some of these decorations in your home, they may have been cut a month or more ahead of time, so be cautious and observant of the condition of your décor.

Candles can be beautiful decorations, but consider using battery powered candles or plug in candles, rather than true flame candles.



If you do use flame candles, be sure they are not near anything flammable and that they are not so low to the ground that small children can reach them.

Remember, small children are notorious for putting everything in their mouths, so don't be surprised if small ornaments, bright shiny objects and things that light up end up in their mouths causing them harm. Safeguard your home from the bottom up. Check your outlets and fireplaces. Be sure they are safe. If you have not had your chimney cleaned in a few years, you may want to add that to your list.

With the holidays, we also need to remember the health and safety of our elderly population. If you have neighbors that may be in need of help shoveling their driveway or walkway, please keep that in mind. And if the weather becomes extremely harsh, check on your elderly neighbors who may not be able to get out or they may not have adequate heat. Be sure to have your furnace cleaned and checked annually. The winter is when there are increased cases of CO poisoning because people may use space heaters. If you must use a space heater, be sure it is at least three feet away from anything combustible. If your CO detector goes off, be sure to evacuate the premises immediately and call 911! With the changing of the seasons, the Road District is preparing the vehicles, and yes....getting ready for that winter season. Before too long, the snow plows and salt trucks will be on the road. It is always our goal to have the Township Roads cleared by 6 a.m. after a snowfall. However, winds and the timing of the storm can make that difficult. Please keep in mind the direction of travel of the snow plow when clearing your driveway. This will save you time and frustration as we continue to try and keep the roads clear. Our wing plow does extend 5 feet beyond the edge of the road into the easement. While we try our best to avoid items that may be within that area, sometimes they can be difficult to locate in heavy storms and are unavoidable. It is recommended that any decorative rocks, etc. be moved so that we there is no damage done to your property or our vehicles. A copy of the resident's responsibilities regarding easements, mailboxes, etc. can be obtained by contacting our township offices at (847)683-9464, or you can contact my office for more information at (847)683-4485.

Lastly, it is always important to remember roads near open fields can be very different than those within the Village. Plan accordingly and always be cautious of ice patches that form on the roads beneath the branches of trees that extend over the road way. (Cont. p. 5)


St. Charles Borromeo
