

Sunday Lent Year A John 11: 3-7, 17, 20-27, 33b-45



'The sisters of Lazarus sent word to Jesus, saying, "Master, the one you love is ill." When Jesus heard this he said, "This illness is not to end in death, but is for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So when he heard that he was ill, he remained for two days in the place where he was. Then after this he said to his disciples "Let us go back to Judea." When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went to meet him; but Mary sat at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise." Martha said, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world." He became perturbed and deeply troubled, and said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Sir, come and see." And Jesus wept. So, the Jews said, "See how he loved him." But some of them said, "Could not the one who opened the eyes of the blind man have done something so that this man would not have died?" So, Jesus, perturbed again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay across it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the dead man's sister, said to him, "Lord, by now there will be a stench; he has been dead for four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?" So, they took away the stone. And Jesus raised his eyes and said, "Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me; but because of the crowd here I have said this, that they may believe that you sent me." And when he had said this, He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go." Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him.

Eucharistic Renewal Meditation

"With Ars Celebrandi, in addition to technical knowledge, there has also to be inspiration, which is a positive form of possession. The true artist does not possess an art but rather is possessed by it. One does not learn the art of celebrating by frequenting a course in public speaking or in persuasive techniques of communication. (I am not judging intentions, just observing effects.) Every tool can be useful, but it must be at the service of the nature of the Liturgy and the action of the Holy Spirit. A diligent dedication to the celebration is required, allowing the celebration itself to convey to us its art. Guardini writes: "We must understand how deeply we remain entrenched in individualism & subjectivism, how unaccustomed we have become to the demands of the 'great', and how small the parameters of our religious living are. We must regain the sense for the 'great' style of praying, the will towards the existential in prayer too. The way to achieve this, though, is through discipline, and giving up weak sentimentality; through serious work, carried out in obedience to the Church, on our religious being and acting." This is how the art of celebrating is learned.

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

5th Sunday Lent Year A

John 11: 3-7, 17, 20-27, 33b-45

Another long reading! But today we hear several great exchanges of conversation between Jesus and others. Jesus speaks first with Martha, then offers some heart-to-heart conversation with Mary (through His tears), then addresses His Father (and the gathered crowd), and then even greets the dead Lazarus! Amazingly, Jesus can speak to the 'dead' and they 'listen' and respond! Since Lazarus is all wrapped up (and surely has a dry throat!), he doesn't speak back initially, but clearly he responds by rising and stepping out of tomb! I thought of Lazarus after my recent surgery. When I was awakened by the nurse's voice in the post-op room, she was letting me know where I was and asked me about the pain level. I couldn't talk! (I know some people may smile at that!) I was moving my arms and legs, like I was trying to get up, but I could only give a hand signal of four fingers (I know I gesture a lot!) (: It was strange trying to speak, and not being able to voice it. But, since John 11:44 says that even Lazarus' face was wrapped, he could not 'voice-answer' Jesus, either. But Lazarus definitely heard Jesus and responded, by his 'baby-steps' walking out of the tomb (keep in mind, his legs are wrapped too, so he had to shuffle out- we surely wouldn't want Lazarus to fall and knock his head on the rock unconscious again). So, just as our previous Lenten Sundays have blessed us with great sections of extended dialogue between Jesus and others, we get even more of it today. Most of the good dialogue is shared between Martha and Jesus. We already know of Martha's close relationship to Jesus, as we recall that she is not hesitant to share her heart with Jesus, like when she angrily lets loose on Jesus and Mary because she felt overwhelmed with kitchen duties (Luke 10:40-41). In strong relationships, even 'strong' feelings can be expressed safely. Good friends speak easily from one heart to the other, not afraid to mention even really sensitive, personal or strong things to each other. The deep-bond strength of the relationship can handle even difficult emotions. I love St Teresa Avila for many reasons (for one, she is the patron saint of 'headache sufferers'). But, St Teresa is also a master of prayer. She teaches that we should have straight-forward honesty and frankness in our prayer (expressing our hearts' concerns to God, even if the feeling is raw). God knows our hearts anyway, but our expression of honest sentiment testifies to the closeness within the relationship. A humorous story about St Teresa and her simple honesty with God, tells that on one of her trips visiting a neighboring convent in a rain storm, her horse suddenly halted because of a flash of lightning. She tumbled over its head, and landed in a puddle of mud, soiling her habit completely. Due to her constant prayer conversation with God, she didn't hesitate to look up to heaven and honestly say, "God, if this is how you treat your friends, no wonder you don't have many." Since prayer is our ongoing dialogue with God, St Teresa reflects her deep relationship with Him by this show of trust and confidence in knowing that He can easily handles her feelings, even her upset frustrations. She doesn't piously pose or deceptively mask her response. She humbly lays it out before Him, trusting God to sort it out with her and help her get through whatever difficulties are facing her. I find Martha doing that too, today.

First, Martha seems discouraged or disappointed when she tells Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died" (Jn 11:21). After Jesus reminds her of His teaching on re-birth and resurrection, she dismissively says, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day" (Jn 11:24). Martha suggests by this that she *hoped* Jesus could do more, now, to 'save' Lazarus. Of course, Jesus comes back at her quickly reminding her that He is the 'Resurrection and Life-Messiah'. She settles down into trusting & assured belief in Him, but Jesus has more relationships to work on as He visits next with Mary (who echoes word for word Martha's same grief over Lazarus- Jn 11:32). Amid Mary and the crowds' public tears and grieving, Jesus becomes sympathetically emotional too. John 11:33 & 38 tell us that Jesus was 'perturbed' and that He wept with them in verse 35. Again, good, deep relationships can allow for strong feeling to be expressed, and instead of ruining the relationship, such emotions lovingly expressed can strengthen the relationship. Yet, there is one more bump in the 'relationship road' to ride through for Martha and Jesus. It happens when Martha tries to hold Jesus back from opening the tomb of Lazarus (even though she had just asked Jesus to do something-anything to bring Lazarus back!). Jesus gently and patiently reminds her that He is the Resurrection, and so to step back herself and trust His miracle to roll out as planned. And of course, Lazarus is called out of the tomb as he is raised back to Life. Jesus will add some additional words addressed to the Father in prayer and to the gathered crowds before the scene ends. Jesus always wishes to engage everyone (including us!) Yet, I love the wonderful give-and-take, the back-and-forth between Jesus and Martha. I find it to be a great example of genuine prayer and how all true relationships are filled with trust and acceptance of the other person. Such strong relationships can absorb and process even strong emotions/feelings to make the bond shared between persons, even more lasting. It always does with Jesus, and our genuine, honest prayer talk with Him makes it so! Peace, Fr Brian
