

2020 Season of Peace is designed to deepen the pursuit of peace for congregations, small groups, families, and individuals. We are invited to define and deepen our calling as peacemakers. This season is a time of encouragement, challenge, inspiration, and education.

Reflections and prayers will help grow the faith and witness of the whole church. Throughout this year's Season of Peace, we are invited to reflect upon ways to practice.

Food Week of Action (Oct. 11-18) and World Food Day (Oct. 16)

Presbyterian Hunger Program encourages participation in Food Week of Action and World Food Day each year. It also includes International Day for Rural Women (Oct. 15) and International day for the Eradication of Poverty (Oct. 17).

We envision a world where everyone has enough affordable, healthy and culturally appropriate food where no one is hungry, and where all who work in the food chain are fairly compensated, respected and celebrated!

GROW, NOURISH, SUSTAIN.

Today only nine plant species account for 66% of total crop production, despite the fact that there are at least 30 000 edible plants. We need to grow a variety of food to nourish people and sustain the planet.

TIME FOR ACTION

A steady increase in hunger since 2014 together with rising obesity, clearly indicates the need to accelerate and scale up actions to strengthen food systems and protect people's livelihoods

A HUNGRY PLANET

Over 2 billion people do not have regular access to safe, nutritious and sufficient food. The global population is expected to reach almost 10 billion by 2050.

COVID-19 FUELS HUNGER

Nearly 690 million people are hungry, up 10 million since 2019. The COVID-19 pandemic could add between 83-132 million people to this number, depending on the economic growth scenario.

HOW WILL YOU CONTRIBUTE TO REDUCING HUNGER IN OUR TOWN, NATION, THE WORLD?

Reformation Sunday October 25, 2020

I have heard it said that when we pray for God's kingdom to come we are also praying that we let go of our own. That is the real test of how well our reformed tradition has soaked into us: We worship God, the Triune God, not a denomination or a structure or a book. The God who is through all, in all, and over all is also the God of our conscience. We seek God's disruption of our corrupt ways of worshiping other gods with our lives. The leaders of the Reformation would rather we honor God than them.

Commemorate Reformation 500: Five hundred years ago, Martin Luther¹ presented his 95 theses about the church and its need for reform. Five centuries on is an exciting time to reflect on what we bring forward from the past that strengthens us and future generations for the coming 500 years of ministry of the gospel of Christ.

Why reform? Although the phrase "ecclesia reformata, semper reformanda, secundum verbum Dei" ("the church reformed, always being reformed, according to the word of God") does not originate in the Reformation, we return to it as a watchword because it is accurate to that watershed moment. In times of crisis, challenge, and conflict—then and now—God calls us to be transformed by the Word and Spirit.

As Christians, our faith began with the followers of Jesus. But the beginning of our Christian faith as *Presbyterian* is in the Reformation. The Reformation marks something significant for us in this part of the universal church: the coalescence of our focus on the Holy Spirit's ongoing reform of us as a church and as individuals. We are called to worship the triune God alone, to claim Jesus Christ as Lord of the church, and to seek the ongoing sanctification of the Holy Spirit.

God's ongoing sanctification of us is a gift for how we live together as the church, responding to God. This is why serious study of scripture for all people is an ongoing practice, in addition to communal worship and celebration of the sacraments. This is why we place such a high value on communal discernment in committees and sessions and decision-making. And while we have so much to learn, it is why our habits of conversation push us to listen to every single voice God brings into our midst.

¹ **Martin Luther**, (1483-1546) German theologian and religious reformer was the <u>catalyst</u> of the 16th-century Protestant Reformation. Through his words and actions, Luther precipitated a movement that reformulated certain basic tenets of Christian belief and resulted in the division of Western Christendom between Roman Catholicism and the new Protestant traditions, mainly Lutheranism, Calvinism, the Anglican Communion, the Anabaptists, and the Antitrinitarians. Dear Brothers and Sisters, greetings to you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, our blessed Redeemer. Earlier this month, the Session of the United Presbyterian Church voted to return to in-person indoor worship on Sunday mornings, beginning September 20.

We are committed to the health and safety of every worshiper. So, to reduce the possibility of transmitting COVID-19 during our indoor service, we have implemented the following measures.

- 1. Wearing a face mask is required from the moment you enter the building and throughout the service.
- 2. Your temperature will be taken before entering the sanctuary.
- 3. Upon entering the sanctuary, an usher will seat you, starting at the front.
- 4. Pews are marked to denote where people should sit to ensure compliance with CDC guidelines for social distancing.
- 5. There will be no passing of the peace, no live music, and no coffee hour. Any form of touching is discouraged, except among members of the same household.
- 6. When leaving, please file out starting from the rear of the church and leave the building immediately.

Despite our best efforts to keep worshipers safe during indoor services, we are acutely aware of the science that suggests the virus is particularly dangerous to those with underlying health conditions, including obesity. For that reason, I urge those with chronic illnesses or weakened immune systems not to attend our indoor gatherings.

However, for those managing chronic health conditions who want to attend in-person indoor services, please consult your healthcare professional about whether attending in-person service is right for you. If, after consulting your physician, you decide to join in-person indoor worship, please adhere to the following guidelines.

- Wear a face mask, a face shield, gloves, and a head covering that can be removed and discarded as soon as you leave service.
- Before entering your car or home after service, remove and sanitize your shoes, discard your gloves, and disposable face mask.
- When you get home, wash your clothing and reusable face mask.

The good news for those of you apprehensive about attending indoor service, you can still worship with us on our YouTube Livestream Sundays at 12:30pm.

I strongly urge anyone living with chronic illnesses not to attend an in-person indoor service.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

THE BEGINNINGS OF HOPE CHAPEL

Most members of the congregation know that Grant Avenue Presbyterian Church started as Hope Chapel, but where did Hope Chapel get its name? In the 1880's Crescent Avenue Presbyterian Church established three Mission



Sunday Schools in the area, the first being the Bethel Sunday School, (later Bethel Presbyterian Church) established in 1884. The building used for the Sunday School was at Fifth Street and Roosevelt Avenue, and had been previously been a schoolhouse, and then used as a church by a German congregation. By 1888 the Sunday School outgrew the building and it was decided to move the building to a new foundation on Fourth and John Streets. This property originally housed a saloon. There Crescent Avenue planned to establish a new Sunday School for the West End of town. The story goes that as one of the Committee in charge of establishing the Sunday School was digging the foundation 8 boys joined him in the trench. He described the Sunday School plan and 5 agreed to attend. They did, and became part of the nucleus of Hope Chapel. They decided to call the Sunday School "Hope Chapel", because "as yet there was nothing in sight but hope." They used the building until 1927 when the church moved to the building on sixth Street and the property on Fourth Street was sold to the Moorland Branch of the YMCA. Neighborhood House currently occupies the site.

Star Fish Friend:

We have benefited greatly from many of our friends who are not residents of Plainfield. This indicates truly multicommunity support that recognizes good work being done by others.

We have an opportunity to help our friends in North Plainfield. Holy Cross Church is hosting a Community Pumpkin Patch, with 1000 pumpkins being delivered on October 10. They need help unloading.

They purchased the pumpkins through a Navajo Native American tribe. The pumpkins are grown in the high desert on the Navajo reservation in New Mexico. The company employs 700 seasonal workers, mostly from the reservation, and a year-round staff of entirely Native Americans.

This is a perfect service opportunity for us, our families and friends to support not only Holy Cross but also our Native Americans.

Scripture Exodus 20:1-17

Color one picture carefully, staying in the lines. Color outside the lines on the other picture, making a colorful mess. Do you remember when you first started to learn how to color? If you were like most children, you probably colored all over the page without staying in the lines. I imagine that some of your pictures looked a lot like this. (Show kids the messy picture.)



As you got older, your pictures probably looked more like this. (Show kids the neat picture.) You began to stay in the lines and your color choices were much better too.

These pictures remind me of the way some people live their lives. God gave us the Ten Commandments to tell us the things that we should and should not do. (Show the neat picture.) Some people don't pay any attention to these guidelines that God has drawn for them. (Hold up the messy picture.) They just do whatever they want to do; that's called sin. Often their choices are not very good. They color outside the lines. They think their life is beautiful, but when God looks at it, He sees that it's just a big mess.

(Hold up the neat picture.) There are other people who read the Bible and follow God's rules. They try to stay within the guidelines that God has set. Oh, they may still get outside the lines at times; getting outside the lines is called sin. That is why we all need Jesus. None of us stay inside the lines 100% of the time.

Do you want your life to be like this one? (Hold up the neat picture.) Or do you want it to look like this one? (Hold up the messy picture so you're holding up both.)

God wants us to obey His Ten Commandments. The great news is we have a Savior in Jesus who loves us even when our lives are messy. When we trust Him as Savior He is our help and gives us strength to obey His laws. Let's ask God to help us obey Him.

Dear Lord, help us to remember that You set boundaries for us. Help us to stay within those boundaries so that our lives will be pleasing to You.
In Jesus' name, amen.
