South Slope Cooperative Communications and Aureon are pleased to announce that matching charity grants have been awarded to the Amana Benefited Fire District and the North Liberty Community Pantry. ACLU receives MAJOR Historic Revitalization Grant

The National Park Service (NPS) announced September 10 that \$12.125 million in Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization Grants will be made to 17 grant programs in just 15 states to support economic development through the preservation of historic buildings in rural communities across the country.

The grants will allow state and local governments and nonprofit organizations to develop subgrant programs and select individual projects in their rural communities for physical preservation projects that will contribute to local economic development. The Amana Colonies Land Use District applied for and has been awarded \$748,375 for a program to provide sub grants for four to six significant, at-risk historical properties within the Amana Colonies National Historic Landmark that promise to have an impact upon the community and a sustainable future.

Saving at-risk structures and providing more options for economically viable and sustainable uses for buildings will help point the way for future rehabilitation projects, the ACLUD application notes.

"The National Park Service helps rural areas across the country revitalize their communities through historic preservation," said National Park Service Director Chuck Sams. "This locally stewarded work supports improvements to historic buildings, preserving America's cultural resources while benefiting local economies."

Right now the Amana Colonies Land Use District offers a local subgrant program – the Historic Preservation Grant Program - to help property owners. It is funded by the Amana Colony / Iowa County hotel-motel tax. About \$20,000 annually is given in small grants to property owners for projects such as historical lantern installation, doorway or siding reconstruction, brick or stone work. (To learn about that program go the ACLUD website.)

As the ACLUD application for the NPS Paul Bruhn grant reads, "We have less than \$20K to distribute annually. 10% of contributing structures (to our National Landmark status) have been lost. There are 15 structures that would benefit from this project . . . The loss of these structures will negatively affect the preservation and interpretation of our history. Future generations will lose access to these properties and a significant portion of our history will be lost. We are at a tipping point. Our current subgrant program, though successful, has not been able to address the level of need within the community."

The Amana Colonies Land Use District will provide a \$1,200 non-federal match.

Other projects in the USA receiving Paul Bruhn Revitalization Grants include:

- Georgia – The Coastal Regional Commission will offer subgrants that support retail, tourism, and home-based business development projects in historic buildings in McIntosh County.
- Maryland – Preservation Maryland, \$737,417 for subgrants to historic properties that serve residents and visitors in small towns along three historic canals in the state.
- Utah – The Utah State Historic Preservation Office, \$749,160 for subgrants to support reactivation of ground floor and upper story space in historic commercial buildings located in the state's Main Street communities.
- Iowa – Iowa Economic Development Authority, \$750,000 for sub grants for rural revitalization of National Register listed properties owned by local governments and nonprofit groups that will enhance development in rural communities.

According to the National Park Service, the grants are supported through the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), which has provided more than \$2 billion in historic preservation grants to states, tribes, local governments, and nonprofit organizations since its inception in 1977. HPF funds may be appropriated by Congress to support a variety of historic preservation projects to help preserve the nation's cultural resources.

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The HPF, which uses revenue from federal offshore oil and gas leases, supports a broad range of preservation projects without spending tax dollars. The intent behind the HPF is to mitigate the loss of nonrenewable resources through the preservation of other irreplaceable resources.

Tax dollars are not spent for this grant program the NPS explained.

These grants mark the sixth year of funding for the program honoring the late Paul Bruhn, who served as executive director of the Preservation Trust of Vermont for nearly 40 years. State and Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, Certified Local Governments, special district governments, and nonprofits are eligible to apply for funding to create a subgrant program to fund multiple preservation projects in their rural jurisdictions.

Fish Fall from Sky Over Parkside

Residents of the Parkside addition to Middle Amana were shocked and bewildered to see dozens of fish lying in their yards and on the streets Monday, Sept. 16. The fish were seen falling from the sky about 7 p.m. Monday.

Rick Hergert reported that Tom Johnson and Meg Mercken spotted the rain of fish and made him aware but that he quickly found over a dozen laying in his yard and on the street near his house. The fish - apparently shad - ranged in size but most were from 2 to 6 inches in length.

"It's really almost Biblical . . . like one of the plagues or something," said Hergert who called this reporter Tuesday morning.

Residents wondered if the fish were dropped from the sky by the large flock of pelicans that has been seen on the Lily Lake and flying high overhead in great flocks, dipping and swirling in the super heated air. That seems the only likely explanation.

Tuesday morning residents were picking up fish though many had already been eaten by birds, rodents, cats, etc. The DNR was called to give their opinion on the very unusual circumstance. No one we questioned could recall ever hearing of such a thing.

Brad Baker, Iowa County DNR officer, quickly returned Hergert's text (which had photos of the fish) and confirmed that the pelicans were known to gorge themselves on shad. At this time of year with the low water levels, fat shad are abundant and easy to scoop up in the Coralville Reservoir on the Iowa River. Flocks of pelicans have been seen on the reservoir diving for shad. Most likely they overate and then regurgitated fish as they flew over Middle.
