The children's choir Voices of Haiti performed a short concert at I.S. 10 on Tuesday, Dec. 11. After the performance, the Haitian students and members school choir enjoyed lunch together, and asked each other questions about their homes and singing techniques.

"It was the Haitian students' first time in New York and, despite the diversity of the neighborhood, the first time for many Astoria students to meet peers from Haiti.

Voices of Haiti was created by the Andrea Bocelli Foundation and the Foundation St. Luc. The St. Luc choir program provides musical training and "comprehensive education in a classroom setting" to children from the most vulnerable parts of Haiti.

The choir traveled to New York City to sing alongside Andrea Bocelli, who was performing at Madison Square Garden tonight, Dec. 13.





On Wednesday, November 28, 2018, P.S. 234 The School of Performing Arts and Technology hosted their first District 30 Professional Learning. The Professional Learning focused on the Key Shifts and Hallmarks of Advanced Literacy. Participants included teachers from various District 30 schools who teach grades K-8. 


























Play teaches children much needed executive function skills, such as planning, negotiation, socialization and creativity.


