# TOIN BOARD APPROVES BUDGET

Hered thetanding protests to some of the increases in malaries and other items, the increases in malaries and other items, the increases in malaries and other items, the increases budget was approved unanimously by the form Board at the public meeting on Movember 8th. About twenty persons were messent. After everyone had had his say was ar contract the Board had retired for a short executive mession, the vote was taken with all members voting in the affirmative.

Summary shorts passed out at the moeting sangare the 1973 budget with the budgets of 1971 and 1972, as follows:

1971 1972 1973 Compared Fund \$75053. \$75415. \$89114. \$1500. 56439. 61150. \$118553. \$126994. \$150264.

To these totals should be added amounts paid to the Pire Department for fire protestion and sabulance services. In 1973 these till total \$6000, beinging the 1973 expenditures for which appropriations have been made to \$156,264.

Revenue is estimated at \$26,000, and it is inticipated that there will be a balance of \$15,000, carried over from 1972. Thus, the macros to be raised by taxes will be \$115,264. (These figures do not take into beneficiration cost of street lighting which is exclusively to be \$2400. This expense is paid for by special lawy on those properties included within the street lighting district).

The 1972 test base (assessed valuation) is \$8,675,343. A rate of \$13,29 per \$1000 of assessed valuation is necessary to provide the reverse model to meet the budget.

This year the rate was \$11.80. It would appear, therefore, that the increases provided for in the 1973 budget will cost taxpayers about \$1.49 per \$1000, of assessed valuation.

The sounty tax rate in 1972 wer \$2.82 per \$1000, of assessed valuation. county builted officer has amounced that the county budget will be almost \$100,000. less than the current year's hidget. decreass are due, he said, "to efficiency and consolidation in county departments and committees". He also noted that the sales tax, revenue charing and emples funds from 1972 contributed to the decrease. A reduction of \$049 per \$3,000. of assessed valuation in the county tax paid by Hague residents is entiripated. This will reduce the county tax rate to \$2.33 and bring the total tex rate to \$15.62, a most increase of \$1.00.

Maile approval of the budget by the Town Board closes the ratter for this year, a ranker of things brought out at the hearing should be reported. Highway workers who will be greating an increase of 100 an hour, will also receive fring benefits, as followers.

# SHOW ORDERS MUST CUT HOLSE

State officials have declared 49 snowmobile manufacturers ineligible to sell the 1973 machines in the state until the noise level of their 1973 models have been apmoved. Thirty manufacturers have not the Manufacturers.

Ether Allen, who led the famous Green licental: Bayes, captured the fort from the British in the early stages of the Revolutionary Although it did not play a part in thei wer, its compone and amunition were removed and brought to Boston and used by Conemal Husbington in the defense of that estra

the fort and its grounds which consists of about 1000 acres was deeded to Union and Calumbia Colleges by the U.S. Govern ment and in 1820 Mr. William Ferris Pell became its owner. Three generations later Mr. Stephen Pell set about to restore the Fort which had been in ruine for ever a hundred years. In 1930 he deeded the property to the Fort Tioonderona Associa tion which owns and operates it today. Approximately 250,000 people visit . the Fort each sommer.
