Rabbi Prof. David Golinkin is President of the Schechter Institute of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem and a professor of Jewish Law. He served 20

years as Chair of the Law Committee of the Rabbinical Assembly which writes responsa and gives halakhic guidance to the Masorti Movement in Israel. He is the founder and Director of the Institute of Applied Halakhah and the Director of the Center for Women in Jewish Law. He was ordained at the Jewish Theological Seminary, where he also received a Ph.D. in Talmud. He is the author or editor of 39 books and published more than 190 articles, responsa and sermons.



Rabbi Dr. Einat Ramon was ordained by the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York in 1989, becoming the first Israeli-born woman

rabbi. She served as the Dean of the Schechter Rabbinical Seminary in Jerusalem for 4 years and is now teaching modern Jewish thought, literature and Jewish feminism at the Schechter Institute. Dr. Ramon holds a Ph.D. from Stanford University and has published articles and books on modern Jewish thought, Jewish feminism and Zionist history.



Rabbi Dr. Paul Shrell-Fox is a lecturer and the academic head of both the Women's Studies and the Family and Community MA programs at

Schechter. He is a licensed psychologist in private practice and manages the special education program at Efrata College in Jerusalem.



Dr. Ari Ackerman teaches Jewish philosophy and education and serves as the Educational Advisor for the Educational Leadership program of the

TALI School Network. Dr. Ackerman received his Ph.D. in Jewish Thought from the Hebrew University and has published numerous articles on the topic.



Dr. Tamar Kadari is a Lecturer in Midrash and serves as Academic Advisor of the Judaism and the Arts MA program. She received her Ph.D. in

Midrash at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and was a fellow at the Center for Judaic Studies at the University of Pennsylvania.


