One of the articles had this title: "Want Teachers to Motivate Their Students? Teach them How to Do It."

My first thought was: With all that education, didn't teachers learn how to motivate? That led me to think: Did the seminary teach us how to motivate the members that we would serve?

The simple answer is — yes! Preachers over the years have been trained to preach God's Word so that "Whoever believes in Him will not perish but have everlasting life."

Why? What was God's motivation?

"God so loved the world."

This summer there have been seven seminarians ordained and installed in congregations in our district (see page 2), along with two pastors already serving in the field. At the installations, they affirmed to perform faithfully the duties of the pastoral office according to the Word of God and the confessional standards as recorded in the Bible and the *Book of Concord*.

Words to motivate and encourage them in their role as pastor came from Scripture.

> "Preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching." – 2 Tim. 4:2

"Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain." -1 Cor 15:58

The Counseling CONNECTION Marijuana: our Christian reponse

ne could argue that this debate has roots in the first garden. It was a perfect place with perfect plants and animals. God gave mankind a special place in His cre-



place in His creation and formed District Counselor their bodies. All was good ... all was in harmony.

Then the great deceiver came on the scene. His broad goal was to corrupt what was healthy and holy. And he posed an alternative — Eve (mankind in a broader sense) could be "like God,

knowing good and evil" (Gen. 3:5b).

What lay in the balance was control and who would decide good and evil. Also, in question was whether mankind was qualified for such a pivotal position.

The rest of the story was not good. One outcome was the corruption of perfect creation. Unhealthy vegetation would now plague mankind (v.18). Now all was not good. Conflict with God also had its beginning.

Now we jet forward 6,000 years. In 2019, we face a controversy over the marijuana plant, with all its intrigue and complexity. We have entered a time when mankind wants to define its goodness for medical purposes. A growing body of research points to its unique benefits. This research is relatively new, lacking fully conclusive results. (We might consider how long it took to determine that nicotine was addictive.)

So how does a Christian respond to this controversy? What position should be taken regarding the medical use of this plant? (The concern only grows when the recreational use of marijuana is promoted as another liberal step.)

A clear and direct answer is not found in Scripture. A specific reference to marijuana is not given by God.

An alternative is to use what God does offer. A pivotal reading is the following:

"Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought with

a price. Therefore, honor God body." **– 1 Cor. 6:19-20**

We have a responsibility for the welfare of our God-given bodies. We should not intentionally do anything to corrupt what is holy. What we put in our bodies must be examined carefully. Side effects, including spiritual, need to be considered.

This moves us into another arena with spiritual implications. A very contemporary agenda is "individual rights." More specifically, it is the cry, "It's my body, I can do with it as I please!" As previously stated, it is really God's body.

Another matter deserves consideration. God gives us what we need, not what we want or desire. He recognizes our fleshly tendency to pursue, sometimes impulsively, what is not in our best interest.

God is in ultimate control over our lives, and we are to be good stewards of what He has entrusted to us—including the welfare of our human bodies. May all we do, honor Him as we live holy, healthy lives.
