#### FROM THE PASTOR

"I am the vine and you are the branches. He who abides in me and I in him, he it is who bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing."

It is the growing season here in Western New York. We may be thinking about our gardens: how to arrange them, what we want to plant. Maybe your garden will feature sugar snap



peas, or green beans. For others, like myself, the garden may have many different vegetables in it, but your preference is for only one thing: tomatoes! Or, perhaps, you prefer to plant flowers of different varieties. Whatever your garden is going to look like, you know that to achieve that end, it needs to be tended. Flowers need to be deadheaded...or maybe not. Weeds need to be pulled. Perhaps some vines need to be staked. Unwanted visitors need to be kept out. The soil needs to be watered if it is a dry year. The garden needs to have tender, loving care to produce optimally.

Whatever the case, because we know we are just the branches, we know that we get our nourishment from the vine....the true vine. Then, and only then, are we assured that we will grow as God intended us to....to each produce the fruit of God's love.

## ◆ The Morgan-Scott Project (MSP)

Since 1972, the Morgan-Scott Project for Cooperative Christian Concerns (MSP) has formed a base from which the needs of low income families in Scott and Morgan counties in rural Tennessee can be addressed. MSP functions as both a social services agency and as a community development organization.

The church has supported the Morgan-Scott Project since 2013. We have collected and mailed seeds, sent monetary gifts through the NACC and collected and delivered used clothing for sale in their store. This year, Christian Education held a Family Life Lunch and a special "shopping" event where church members were able to buy personal care items to be given to needy families at their site. So, after another delicious potluck (complete with good fellowship), the congregation "shopped" at a store for items. After all was done, the congregation had purchased almost \$500 of personal products and also raised \$300 in cash. These items were sent to Morgan-Scott.

Our thanks to the Christian Education committee for another excellent way for us to reach outside our walls and help others in need. Thank you to all who participated!


