**Make Lent Great Again**

No, this isn't a play on a politician's catch-phrase.

Rather, our friends in the Eastern Orthodox Church have always called Lent the "Great Lent." I've admired their approach to Great Lent because it truly is a drawn-out time of preparation, self-awareness, and therefore, self-discipline. It's more than focusing on a couple of days but a "greater" focus on self-awareness and discipline over the weeks leading up to Good Friday.

Lent in our own times however has become full of complacency and satisfaction with the status-quo. There is little focus on confession and absolution because we see little reason to change. There is little focus on fasting because we can't see our lack of self-control. Without a dependency on the Holy Spirit we love ourselves 'just the way we are' a little too much....... We're more with God's blessings than wondering how far we are from the Presence of Who God Is. Not only have we become unconcerned about the idols in our lives we have also become as indifferent towards the lack of Holy Spirit fruit in us as well.

For us to make Lent "Great" again begins in honest self-awareness as enabled by the Holy Spirit. As we make the journey towards Jerusalem with Jesus, pray and ask the Lord to reveal your life to you: how you live in spirit, soul, and body. Where do you authentically need to lay down your life and pick up the cross and follow Him?

Jesus gives us a parable in Luke 18:9-14 that actually typifies the value of Lent.

He also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous, and treated others with contempt: "Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, prayed thus: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other men, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give tithes of all that I get.' But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even lift up his eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his house justified, rather than the other. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

<u>Are we like the Pharisee</u> – self-satisfied and complacent with our lives? Unaware of a lack of spiritual maturity and any need for growth? Are we ignorant of our lack of love for God and love for neighbor?

Or are we like the tax-collector – unwilling to even look towards the Presence of God and call on God's mercy? Do we have an awareness in ourselves of our lack of love for God and our failings to love our neighbors as ourselves? Are we aware that although we may be justified by grace our lack of practicing that justification impacts the lives of those around us?

In the ancient Christian traditions, Lent typically begins with going and seeking the forgiveness of others around us. Why? Because other people are more of an authentic mirror of our lives than the gaze in our own mirrors. Just like in Luke, I may pretend that I am not like other people, but in dialogue with others I will find out I have hurt and sinned against my friends and neighbors and coworkers in so many different ways. Eventually pride gives way to self-awareness and the need of more Holy Spirit repentance in our lives (and less of self) as we listen to those around us.

How do we make Lent "Great" again? We can pray all that we want. But until we live in authentic relationship and understanding with others and learn to see ourselves in the ways they see us, we are sometimes fooling ourselves. Only with greater awareness will we even see the need to pick up the cross and follow Jesus in His passion and death.

"Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner."
