God's Encouraging Word ... when I'm worried

Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you. – 1 Peter 5:7

Erma Bombeck once told about Donald. Donald was worrying about going to school. Here is how he expressed his anxieties: "My name is Donald. I don't know anything. I have new underwear...a loose tooth...and I didn't sleep last night because I'm worried. What if a bell rings and a man yells, 'Where do you belong?' and I don't know? What if the trays in the cafeteria are too tall for me to reach? What if my loose tooth comes out when we have our heads down and are supposed to be quiet? Am I supposed to bleed quietly? What if I splash water on my name-tag and my name disappears and no one knows who I am?"

Worry about big things and little. Worry about the future. Worry about the past. Worry about your finances...your family...your marriage. What is it that transforms normal basic human prudence into worry? Just this: the gut-level urge to assume the worst in every possible outcome. Worry seems to have an office in hearts. It never leaves and continues to send out reports about how things are going. Its reports always paint the darkest pictures and project the worst.

You are literally worrying yourself sick over some situation over which you have no control. How can you shut down the office of worry? What can be said to help you lighten your load today? First, you need to understand that worry is not based on an outer circumstance...but on an inner condition. Worry comes not from what is happening to you on the outside...but from how you process it on the inside.

Shutdown worry by living in the present. "**Cast all your anxiety on him.**" You aren't God. You don't know the future. You may be worrying about something that will never happen. You may be worrying about something that will resolve itself. Focus simply on today. Are you healthy this moment? Do you have enough to live on this moment? Are your children well this moment? Try not to anticipate what may never occur.

Here is the key. "Cast your anxiety on him…**because he cares for you.**" Shutdown the office of worry remembering Jesus cares for you. How can you trust his care? The righteousness that he wove in his perfect life...colored with his blood from the cross...was guaranteed to you the moment he rose victorious over death. Like all people, you have failed so many times and so many ways to be who God wants you to be. You could worry every minute of every day over your guilt! But Jesus wants you to remember his righteousness! That forgiveness and peace with God that you were given through Jesus' death and resurrection! You are forgiven! At peace with God! Going to heaven! Focus on this foremost thought: Jesus cares for you.



PEANUT BUTTER AND CRANBERRY PROTEIN BARS (From Blue Zones recipe file) Legumes, including peanuts and peanut butter are a great source of plant based protein and fiber. They're also rich in vitamins A and C and minerals like magnesium, phosphorus, and zinc. Perhaps one of their best benefits is that of resveratrol, an antioxidant known for its disease preventing characteristics.

INGRÉDIENTS

- 3/4 cup walnut pieces (or other type of nut)
- 1 1/4 cup old-fashioned rolled oats (not quick-cooking or instant)
- 1 cup dried cranberries or other dried fruit (or a combination)
- 1/2 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup pure maple syrup
- 3 tbsp peanut butter
- 1 tbsp butter, melted
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

DIRECTIONS

1. Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Grease an 8-inch-square baking pan.

2. Place the walnuts in a dry skillet and toast over medium heat until light brown and fragrant, 3 to 4 minutes, shaking often. Transfer them to a food processor.

3. Add the oats, dried fruit, chocolate chips, maple syrup, peanut butter, vegan butter and vanilla to the food processor, and pulse until crumbly. Continue to process until the mixture is well combined. Add a little water, a tablespoon at a time, if the mixture is too crumbly to stick together. Press the mixture evenly into the prepared pan.

4. Bake until lightly browned, about 20 minutes. Remove from the oven and set aside to cool, then refrigerate until completely cold. Cut into 2- by 4-inch bars. Wrap each bar individually in plastic wrap for easy transport.

Makes a great snack for kids!

New WELS high school opens

On Aug. 8, a new WELS high school began its first school year. Kingdom Prep Lutheran High School (KPLHS) is serving young men from Milwaukee County, most of whom qualify for the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program, a government school voucher system.

"There is a huge mission field right here in Milwaukee," says Mr. Kevin Festerling, the school's founder and principal. "Hundreds of students graduating from WELS grade schools in the area could not pursue Christian secondary education due to the scarcity of voucher seats available in the existing area Lutheran high schools. I felt like we as a church were turning our back on the Great Commission by turning students away who wanted a Christian education."

Festerling recognized that building a Lutheran high school to serve this new group of students' needs wouldn't be easy. The school has deliberately focused on providing young men with a kingdom-first mindset. The statistics are grim for boys who are raised in urban areas in the United States, and Milwaukee's statistics are even worse than most. According to Festerling, many young men in today's families are navigating the most critical years of their lives without active fathers. To help reverse that trend and build Christian leaders, Kingdom Prep's vision is for "young men to develop their God-given gifts to lead in the home, serve in the church, engage in meaningful work, and transform community."

Daily small-group Bible studies focus on what it means for a man to seek God's heart with his whole life. Assigned projects help the young men solve real community problems with godly solutions. School decisions are placed in the hands of student leaders. Each facet of the school is focused on helping it accomplish its mission of "building a brotherhood in Christ for lives of purpose."

Rev. Dr. Paul Steinberg, executive director of Chaplains in Schools and one of Kingdom Prep's spiritual advisors, is helping the school's leadership maintain its focus on its mission to disciple the next generation of Christian male leaders. He says, "My work will be to spiritually assess each of the freshmen and connect them with a strong Christian mentor. Kingdom Prep students and their mentors will aim to meet weekly for spiritual check-ins, prayer, and Bible study."

In 2018-19, Kingdom Prep is serving 60 freshmen boys. Each school year, a grade will be added, along with space for 60 more boys. Each Kingdom Prep student is invited to commit to the school's mission, carrying the KPLHS vision through brotherhood in Christ and hard work.

"We are there to walk alongside the brothers as they grow," says Festerling, "celebrating the way each takes responsibility for his own growth."

Mr. Jim Rademan, director of the Commission on Lutheran Schools, notes, "The Christian love and commitment of the called teachers and staff, led by founding principal Kevin Festerling, is clear. The teachers are sharing with the students the power of the Holy Spirit and the opportunity they have to learn the skills to be leaders in their homes and community."

August 2018 Newsletter

It's the dry season in Malawi, and temperatures are gradually warming up, though the early mornings are still cool. The hills are more brown than green, and our ambulance leaves a cloud of red dust as we travel to clinics. The distant mountains are blurred with smoke and dust, but the sky is blue every day. Sunny days make for more light in our Msambo clinic building, where we had been bringing battery or solar-powered lights so our staff could see to do their work on cloudy days. This week we didn't need them, and we were thankful.

The outpatient numbers are going down a bit, mainly due to far less patients having malaria this past month. Mosquitos are not as prevalent when there isn't rain, so there are less around to spread the parasite. The children seem to be the sickest with malaria, and we test them and give them the medicine, but we are seeing only about two thirds as many as in previous months. There are plenty of patients with respiratory illnesses and skin rashes but less very sick patients to refer to the hospital, and I'm thankful.

The lines of mothers with children coming to under-fives clinics are still long most days, and there is the constant sound of crying babies getting their life-saving immunizations. We were able to give moms the handmade baby hats and washcloths given by women in the US, and they were thankful.

Four members of the CAMM committee spent 6 days here visiting Gary and me in Malawi at the end of July- Shelly Sievert, Cindy Fietzer, Cheryl Valus and her husband Mike. They brought needed clinic supplies like rolls of gauze, orthopedic equipment, and ambu bags as well as another essential, chocolate chips! They came out to clinics to observe, count pills, meet our staff and see the clinic buildings. They even helped unpack pill bottles and put them in bags, all ready to pack in the ambulance. Gary and I had good meetings with them and had their input with important decisions. We had some enjoyable gatherings with them and much of the mission family here. God granted them good health and safe travels on to Zambia and then home. We are thankful.

The Lord allows this medical mission work in Malawi to continue through many volunteer hours, monetary donations and answered prayer. We thank God for the means to continue serving the people of Malawi with medical care.

Board of Education News

- After Home Visits and Registration Day, our school enrollment is projected to be near 100 students for the start of the 2018-19 school year. (We ended the previous year with 106 students.)
- Due to a surplus in the Milk Fund, the yearly cost for milk has remained at the reduced price for the students and faculty.
- The Family Fee was increased by \$100 to \$400 and the Enrollment Fee was increased from \$365 to \$385 for the 2018-19 school year.
- Pastor Brandt reported that the Youth Group trip in June went very well. Eighteen total people were on the mission trip and four went to the International Youth Rally at Bowling Green University.
- Mrs. Shannon Schmidt ran the volleyball camp in the start of July. There were a total of twenty-nine campers that participated in this year's activities. Thank you Mrs. Schmidt for your work!
- The Board of Education approved a recommendation proposed by the music directors from LLHS to support a new program to better compensate the elementary band directors.
- The Board of Education approved the purchase of fifty-five new Chrome books for grades 5-8. Scrip funds will be used to purchase these non-budgeted items for the school that totaled over \$12,000. Thank you to Scrip and everyone who participates in this program for helping support our school!
- The Board approved a new copier lease from Oshkosh Office Systems for the school. This lease will take effect in October.
- The Board was informed of some of the challenges of trying to make changes to our Spectrum account and bill. Mr. Bob Paplham was given approval to represent our school in trying to negotiate better services and charges.

Some Important Information -

- Mrs. Noldan has made an announcement that this school year will be her last school year teaching at St. John's. She plans on retiring following this school year. We wish Mrs. Noldan the Lord's richest blessings as she faithfully serves the Lord this school year and as she plans for retirement.
- First day of school for PK(4)-8 was Wednesday, August 22. Faculty, students, families, and members of St. John's attended the Opening Service that was led by Pastor Schupmann. PK-3 had their first day on August 23.
- Mr. and Mrs. Paplham and family assisted Mr. Cody in getting the new Chrome books and the teachers' computers ready for the start of the school year on August 8 and 19. Thank you for their help and time!

- Please continue to save General Mills Box Tops, Kwik Trip milk caps / tops, and aluminum cans for school.
- At the start of the school year, we were able to forward over \$4,000 in assistance to the families that are at LPS and LLHS through the High School Student Assistance Program. This program is supported by your donations through the aluminum cans and your gifts that are designated through the SCRIP program.
- Over the summer, SCRIP forwarded these funds to be used by our families: \$317.23 for St. John's Student Assistance, \$224.59 for High School Student Assistance, and \$5,123.97 for the families of St. John's for their Enrollment Fee payments on Registration Day. We are very thankful for the support of our families here at St. John's and for the faithful work of the SCRIP Committee!
