

Doing the Splits

When I took church history back in the late 1970s at North Central Bible College in Minneapolis, I learned that the overarching characteristic of Protestant churches in America has been our tendency to split. Over the years that tendency has created many new denominations as well as several Methodist denominations. Recently, our United Methodist Church has splintered, arising out of action taken at the 2019 specially called General Conference.

The 2019 GC was convened to solve our gender issues once and for all. That Conference toughened our stand on gender issues, but also provided a way for progressive churches to disaffiliate from the UMC so they could do two things: (1) ordain gay and lesbian clergy and (2) perform same sex marriages. However, very few progressive churches opted out. Instead, many traditional-leaning churches used that new provision as a means for leaving our denomination. Eighty-two churches in our Conference opted out and many of them chose to join the recently formed Global Methodist Church.

Splits are nothing new to Methodism. This past February, I attended a Conference event in O'Fallon, and one of our keynote speakers, Rebekah Simon-Peter, addressed the history of schisms in the Methodist Church. She identified 18 times when Methodism split and gave birth to a new denomination. The first split occurred in 1816, just 32 years after the Methodist Church was formed.

Some of the denominations which were formed out of the splits were the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, the Free Methodist Church, the Salvation Army, the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church, the Church of the Nazarene, the Southern Methodist Church, the Evangelical Methodist Church, the Global Methodist Church, and the Primitive Methodist Church. That last denomination is interesting, because today there are a total of 60 Primitive Methodist Churches in 13 states.

Incidentally, my former denomination, the Assemblies of God, split off the Church of the Nazarene in 1914 which split off from the Methodist Church in 1895.

When churches decide that the Methodism has become "too this" or "too that," and break away, they have acted out of judgment and a fear of whatever "this or that" may be. And "this or that" can be anything from a fear of liberalism to a desire for greater local church autonomy.

At least three splits have occurred when churches decided that the denomination had moved away from its roots in holiness. However, the most glaring reason for Methodist church splits has been racism, which was the cause for four splits. Racism included conflicts over slavery and later, conflicts over segregation.

Prior to 2019, Methodism had not had a split in 50 years. That changed with the formation of the Global Methodist Church in 2022. I have many friends who chose to leave the UMC for the GMC, and I have worshipped in churches that were once United Methodist but have since disaffiliated, so I don't want to judge their motives for leaving. However, I do pray that our season of separation has come to an end. I believe that we are stronger when we are united. I believe that's true of our denomination and I believe it's true of local churches. For that matter, I believe it's also true of our nation, but that's a subject for another time and place.

If you are reading this before May 3, then you are reading it while General Conference is still in session in Charlotte, North Carolina. I hope and pray that the legislation coming out of our General Conference is filled with justice and grace. I hope and pray that "mercy triumphs over judgment" (James 2:13). I hope and pray that General Conference does not spark further disaffiliations.

Thankfully, uniting conferences have also been a part of our Methodist history. In 1939 the Methodist Episcopal Church (the northern church), the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and the Methodist Protestant Church united into The Methodist Church. In 1968, the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren united to form the United Methodist Church. Those were good unions and I pray that the day will come again when we can be known for our unity rather than our disunity.



This past month, Kenny Tharp began work in a third-floor storeroom where we keep our seasonal decoration. Four old stained -glass windows are being removed and the opening bricked in. This will not only reverse the damage to the north side of our building, but it will also save energy.

So far, we have received \$2,283.00 toward this most necessary project, including a \$1,000 gift from both the United Methodist Men and United Methodist Women.
