#### Pastor's Word

It is possible that our church canceled worship services during the influenza outbreak of 1918. While working on our church's history, however, I read the annual reports for 1918 and 1919 and some business meeting minutes from that time. There was no mention of canceling services. I also know that some churches canceled worship services at times during the polio epidemics of the 1940's and 50's, but our church was not among them.

What I am trying to say is that the moment we are in is something we have never experienced as a church. We have held in the neighborhood of 7900 Sunday morning services over the last 152 years, and as far as I can tell, we have canceled exactly two of them because of a global pandemic.

It is hard to grasp the historic nature of all of this. I'm still working from my office (nobody is in the building). I look outside and it doesn't look like a time of crisis – the sun is shining and the birds are singing. But then I hear the heartbreaking stories and read the statistics. People I know along with well-known public figures have contracted the virus. But it really doesn't

matter if a close friend or family member has the coronavirus; we have all been moved by heart-wrenching stories. And we know that it could be any of us. We are all in this together.



I think about the fact that schools are closed, businesses are closed, medical systems are struggling mightily, and we are all frightened. I think especially about folks who work in the medical field. I think about the courage and commitment of those who literally are putting their own life and health on the line to serve others. And I think of the many who are out of work and wondering how they will get by.

In worship, we began readings in the Gospel of Mark in January and we will continue through Easter. It is funny (*providential* might be a better word) how the scriptures each Sunday have spoken to the situation is which we find ourselves. Two Sundays ago, we read Jesus' words in Mark 12 to "love your neighbor as yourself." What a perfect time to practice love for neighbor as we act with kindness and compassion and patience and understanding toward one another in this difficult time.

And then last Sunday, we were in Mark 13 – known as the Little Apocalypse. (I had that late 80's hit "It's the End of the World as We Know It" running through my head all last week.) Reading about the world being turned upside down when it feels like our world is being turned upside down, right now, was somehow helpful. There is nothing like facing the reality of the situation head-on. It is helpful to know that God's people have faced trying times before, and to hear Jesus' words that the pain we are facing may be "birth pangs" – that new and life-giving things can emerge from such a scary and destructive time.

Maybe one of the reasons this time has seemed at least quasi-normal is that we have been able to continue to stay in touch. I am thankful for the ways that technology allows us to stay connected. An added bonus is that friends from out of town have been able to join us as we worship via Zoom. There was a time when quarantine meant that a person really was cut off from the outside world.

This time has made me even more thankful for our church family and more thankful for every one of you. Holy Week and Easter will be different this year. But we need to remember that Easter is a season, and when we are able to gather together in person again, we will certainly celebrate resurrection.

# **Stewardship Update**



## **Virtual Palm Sunday Procession**

We will not be in the building and we will not distribute palms, but we will definitely have a virtual palm parade. According to Mark, the crowd met Jesus with coats and leafy branches. Basically, they used whatever they had on hand, and that is what we will do. You can make your own palm branch (a great project while you are at home), or wave a scarf or hat or jacket, or a branch you find in the backyard. We will wave our palms as our musicians play "Hosanna, Loud Hosanna" and have our virtual palm procession.

Our youth and children made plans for this in a Zoom meeting. Here are some prototype homemade palm branches made by Pastor Dave and Lucy Stegemöller. You can use a paint stick and construction paper; yard stick, brown packaging paper and markers; decorated cardboard tube and strips of newspaper attached with a glue gun (Lucy's creation); or whatever you have around the house.
