Pastor's Word

Everything is different in 2020. Church, school, work, shopping, dining, healthcare, sports, entertainment, you name it. The pandemic has changed life considerably for all of us. I saw a neighbor this morning while we were both out walking our dogs. 'How are you?" I asked. "I'm doing OK," she said, "but I am tired of staying home."

We all feel that way. At our Virtual Coffee Shop on Tuesday, we were talking about how little we had driven our vehicles over these past months – we can go a couple of months or more between fill-ups. I was on vacation this past week, but it was not the usual vacation. We stayed home mostly, and I worked on a variety of projects. As I mentioned on Sunday, our big trip was to Marcy Township in Boone County, to the Sparks Cemetery. William Sparks, one of the early settlers in the area, is buried there, along with his wife Sarah, several children including son King David Sparks (actual name), and many descendants. He was a farmer-preacher, originally from North Carolina, who farmed and pastored in Indiana before moving west. He started the North Union Baptist Church, which was the first Baptist church in the area and at the time it was founded "probably the farthest northwest of any Baptist church on the continent," according to Historical Sketches of Iowa Baptists, written by Samuel Mitchell, the historian of the Iowa Baptist Convention (and first pastor of our church), and published in 1886.



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The North Union Church was about 5 or 6 miles south of Moingona (which is a few miles west and south of Boone, on the other side of the river). The church drew members from miles around and in time sent out members who started or helped start churches in Boone and Webster Counties including Great Bend, Mineral Ridge, Swede Point (a Swedish speaking church), Boonsboro, and Montana (which changed its name to Boone). Rev. Sparks preached regularly in some of these churches at various times and also started a church in Homer (north of Stratford) and was pastor there – all while serving as pastor at North Union and being a full-time farmer.

I had learned a bit about Rev. Sparks, who was called Father Sparks, while researching our church's early history. Mitchell wrote (in the 1880's), "Father Sparks was one of that class of numerous non-slaveholding whites who fled with their families from the blighting influence of chattelism to enjoy the free institutions of the North." That comment might say as much about Rev. Mitchell as it does Rev. Sparks, but it certainly speaks to Rev. Sparks' convictions.

Since reading about Father Sparks and these early churches, I had the idea of driving to visit these pioneer communities, but found that the churches and, for the most part, the communities are long gone. There is no trace of the North Union Church; from what I can tell of its location, there is nothing but a cornfield there. But the Sparks Cemetery is there, still in use, and a reminder of the earliest Baptist roots in this area. It is a beautiful little cemetery and it was a nice drive. And if not for the pandemic, I may not have visited. As I said, everything is different this year.

Racial Justice Resources and Action Ideas

Our church has been providing opportunities for learning, reflection, conversation, and action working toward racial justice. Our church librarian, Catherine Parrish, has done a wonderful job of ordering books for children, youth, and adults on issues of racism and injustice. Many of these titles were described in the <u>June Spire</u>. A recent addition donated to our library is *White Fragility* by Robin Diangelo.

Our Thursday night devotion group spent three weeks listening to and discussing portions of an interview with Ibram Kendi on how to be an anti-racist.

And then on July 19 we held a virtual forum in which we watched a conversation with Robert P. Jones at the BJC Annual Luncheon on

"White Supremacy and American Christianity." The conversation that followed was engaging, and we talked about what the next steps for our church might be. We decided to share resources and opportunities for action through the *Spire*. If you have resources to share, please pass them on and we will include in next month's *Spire*.

The video we watched on Thursday evenings with Ibram Kendi is <u>The Difference between Being</u> "Not Racist" and Anti-Racist.

Our July 19 forum and discussion was around the conversation with Robert P. Jones on White Supremacy and American Christianity.

Jan Thompson found Fredrick Douglass' Fourth of July speech <u>delivered by his descendants</u> to be very powerful.

Johnie Hammond suggested several simple action ideas. She encourages us to <u>contact Governor</u> <u>Reynolds</u> (phone 515-281-5211) and ask her to issue an executive order restoring voting rights to felons who have served their time, as she has pledged to do.

You can <u>contact Alabama Governor Kay Ivey</u> and encourage her to rename the Edmund Pettis Bridge in honor of John Lewis.

Organizations such as <u>The Innocence Project</u> and the <u>Equal Justice Institute</u> that work on justice for the innocent need support.

Locally, Johnie suggests asking the City Council to adopt a racial profiling data collection and analysis. This would determine whether racial profiling by the police is a serious problem in Ames.

Jean Hayes shared an excellent video - a <u>concise history of race in America</u> post-Civil War by Phil Vischer (creator of *VeggieTales*.) An article about the video appeared in *Christian Century*.

Jean also shared resources from her church in Minneapolis, Judson Memorial Baptist Church. While some of the links and suggestions are Minnesota or Twin Cities-specific, there is a lot of helpful information. <u>Click here</u> and scroll to bottom of the page to Resources from the Racial Justice Team.
