## Rules and Regulations

1. Membership is $\$ 4.00$ per person.
2. All entry forms for exhibits in the Hall must be made to the Secretary on or before five (5) days prior to the fair.
3. No exhibitor may make more than one entry in any class except for Livestock and Poultry.
4. The decision of the Judges shall in all cases will be final, except when a rule of the Society has been violated.
5. Rule interpretation will be up to the discretion of three (3) Directors.
6. Membership cards allows the member entry to the fair on Labour Day Monday only.
7. From the sum or sums awarded to any member as a prize or premium, it shall be lawful for and the duty of the Secretary/Treasurer to retain $\$ 4.00$ as the membership fee for the ensuing year.
8. Any person entering an article or animal contrary to the rules of the Society shall forfeit any prize he/she may be otherwise entitled to.
9. This Society will be responsible for payment of prize moneys only to the extent that the revenues of the Society will permit.
10. A protest must be in writing and be in the hands of the Secretary within 24 hours after the Fair. It must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be accompanied by a deposit of $\$ 5.00$. The deposit will be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained.
11. Prize money will be presented at Awards Night. If you are unable to attend Awards Night and your winnings are over \$20.00, they will be forwarded to you by mail. For persons with winnings lower than $\$ 20.00$, you will be informed of an alternate place to pick up your winnings. All winnings must be picked up by December 31 of the current year. If they are not picked up the money will be relinquished to the Armour, Ryerson \& Burk's Falls Agricultural Society.

## Livestock Classes

1. Livestock to be on the grounds by 9:00 a.m., Poultry and Rabbits to be on grounds and cooped/caged by 9:30 a.m. on the Labour Day Monday. All exhibits to remain until 4:00 p.m.
2. All Directors exhibiting Livestock must remove their badges before entering the judging ring, otherwise they will forfeit all claims to prizes that may be awarded to them.
3. All stock must be the bona fide property of the person in whose name it is entered, who must be a member and make a declaration of ownership, if required. All suckling foals and calves must have been born after January $1^{\text {st }}$ of the current year.
4. No article or animal, except brood mares, will be allowed to participate in more than one class. This By-Law does not apply to Special Prizes.
5. To display sheep or swine, contact the Secretary at least ten (10) days before the fair to accommodate arrangement and placement.
6. Bulls must be properly secured by ring in the nose to prevent accident, or they will not be allowed on the grounds. All other animals must be properly secured either in pens or by rope. Stallions must be tied or removed from the grounds after being judged.
7. Cattle must be shown in the ring provided, bulls excepted.
8. All livestock shown as a herd must be mature animals over one year of age.
9. All male breeding animals and all animals entered as purebred over one year of age must be properly recorded in a recognized herd book and such animals under twelve months of age must be eligible for registration (sire and dam recorded) and registration number must be given to the Secretary at the time of making the entry.
10. No horse or pony shall be allowed to compete in both Junior and Senior events.
11. Entry must be submitted to the Secretary five (5) days before the Fair date.
12. All Exhibitors of livestock must have liability insurance.

## Rules and Regulations

1. Course will be $150^{\prime} / 50 \mathrm{~m}$ long with sidelines $20^{\prime} / 7 \mathrm{~m}$ apart.
2. To qualify, a draw of at least $20^{\prime} / 7 \mathrm{~m}$ is to be completed.
3. Teams will be allowed three (3) attempts to qualify.
4. Horses must stay within side lines of the course while drawing, or they will be excused.
5. Draws
a. All draws are to be taken in order. Pass-ups will be allowed after the first three draws are successfully completed. Only two (2) passups in a row are allowed, the third must be taken.
b. The first four (4) draws will be two (2) blocks at a time. After that, NO MORE than three (3) blocks at a time will be put on stone boat.
6. Ten minutes will be allowed to repair broken harness or equipment which has occurred during a draw, before calling the next team.
7. Any forward movement of the stone boat will be considered a 'draw'.
8. Contestants will draw for their position of order prior to the commencement of competition.
9. ONLY Officials and contestants are allowed within the course area during a 'draw'.
10. Three (3) minutes will be allowed for a teamster to hitch his team. "Time" will commence from the moment the team enters the 'draw area'.
11. Draw Area
a. The teamster and two assistants only will be allowed in the 'draw area'.
b. Teamster MUST have a person to help hitch.
12. While the team is hitched to the stoneboat:
a. Neither teamster or any assistant to be alongside of or ahead of the team. They are not permitted to 'head' their team.
b. Assistants are not permitted to talk to horses.
13. Slapping of horses in the 'draw area' and surrounding area will not be permitted.
14. A horse is permitted to participate as a member of ONLY ONE team
15. The judge's decision is FINAL.
16. Attempting to talking to the judge during the competition will result in disqualification, at the judge's discretion.
17. Any questions regarding the rules, or operation of the competition are to be discussed with the committee only prior to the commencement of the contest.

## Tips on Exhibiting Vegetables

Beans: Do not wash. Wipe gently with a soft cloth. Should be uniform in colour and size, fresh (snap when bent), free from stringiness, fine grained smooth, fleshy clean, well filled.
Beets: Tops removed $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ ( 12 mm ) from crown. Trim roots to 1 ", should be 2 to 2 $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}(5$ to 7 mm$)$. Do not scrub. Can be placed in cold water bath before carefully wiping off soil.
Cabbage: Trim stem $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ ( 12 mm ). Trim heads down to two layers of sound green outer leaves.
Cauliflower: Heads should be dense, well-formed, and free from fuzziness and small leaves. Trim steams to $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}(7-12 \mathrm{~mm})$. Leave 4 to 6 lower leaves around head and trim squarely across leaving $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ to $1^{\prime \prime}(12-25 \mathrm{~mm})$ projecting above head.
Corn: Remove $1 / 3$ of husk from tip to butt. Do not totally strip husk from ear.
Cucumber: Trim stem to $1 /{ }^{\prime \prime}(7 \mathrm{~mm})$.
Onion: Remove roots just below base of bulb. Remove only jagged and dirty outer leaves. Cut tops $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ to $1^{\prime \prime}(12-25 \mathrm{~mm})$ above bulb.
Parsnips: To clean, soak in water. Do not rub skin. Trim rootlets. Should be 2" $(5 \mathrm{~cm})$ to $3^{\prime \prime}(7 \mathrm{~cm})$ in diameter at the crown. Remove side roots. Tops trimmed to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}(12 \mathrm{~mm})$ above crown. Skin clean, smooth, and white with no discolouration.
Pumpkin: Trim stem. Can be washed to remove dirt.
Tomatoes: Leave $1^{\prime \prime}(25 \mathrm{~mm})$ stem attached to tomato. Free of cracks and scars. Clean and firm. At least $21 / 4 "(5.5 \mathrm{~cm})$ in diameter.
Turnips: Trim off tops and roots without leaving scars. Swedes/Rutabagas should be $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ to $5^{\prime \prime}(8-12 \mathrm{~cm})$ in diameter. Smooth shapely and clear skin.
Squash: (Winter: Acorn Squash, Hubbard Squash) Do not wash. Trim stem
Squash: (Summer: Zucchini) Trim Stem. Can be washed to remove dirt. Do not rub skin.

$>\quad$ The exhibitor must grow all flowers and plants
$>$ Buds count as blooms.
$>\quad$ African Violets should only have one crown (the centre growth of leaves and flowers) only.
> Potted plants should have only one plant per pot.
> Potted plants must have been grown in a pot and not dug from the garden.
$>\quad$ A bloom is an individual flower on a stem. Remember buds showing colour count as a bloom and should be removed if prize calls for one (1) bloom.
$>\quad$ A spray is a portion of a plant with a number of flowers and buds.
> A stalk (same as a stem) is a plant structure carrying one or more flowers and/or buds. It may be branched.
$>\quad$ A spike is an upright stem carrying several flowers, usually with short pedicels, such as gladioli and snapdragons.
$>\quad$ Cut flowers are judged based on condition (free of disease), size, uniformity (all specimens in an exhibit should be the same size, form and colour), colour (fresh, clear, bright, etc.), form (proper shape of the flower) and stem and foliage (strong straight stems and clean foliage).
> Make sure all dirt, seed pods, etc. are removed and containers are clean.
> Roses should be shown half to full bloom except when bud is specified in prize list.
$>\quad$ Gladiolus should be straight, balanced and have approximately $1 / 3$ flower fully opened.
$>\quad$ An arrangement is the composition of colour, size and shape to produce a pleasing effect. Each unit (e.g. flower, fruit, vegetable, etc.) is placed so that all of them together produce a design. Although mechanics (floral foam, chicken wire, etc.) make designing easier, they are not required for arrangements/designs, but may be used if desired. Judging is based on arrangement only unless container is specified in prize list..
$>\quad$ Wildflowers, weeds, roadside or any material, which is commonly found along the roadside, in meadows, etc.

- A dried flower encompasses all material that is not fresh.
$>\quad$ A bouquet is a designed bunch of flowers and foliage, and the stems are tied with string before inserting into container.
