Dear Friends.

Happy New Year!

Greetings to you in the holy name of the Lord Jesus Christ, our blessed Redeemer. As always, I hope this message finds you in good health, rejoicing in the joy of the Lord, and continuing to grow in your knowledge of godliness.

Like many others, Christians are beginning to make New Year's resolutions, those well-intended strategies for developing or enhancing areas of our lives. Many will plan to improve their physical, emotional, and spiritual health. Others will commit to working diligently to be more present in the lives of those who love them. Some will pledge to curtail their spending and get their finances in order. Others will promise to grow their faith by engaging more regularly in the spiritual disciplines – praying, studying Scripture, attending worship service, fasting, and doing charitable works. Others will pull out their fancy daily planners from previous years and determine to bring the plans previously made to fruition.

Whatever your thoughts for making changes during the new year, consider beginning with Proverbs 3: 5-6, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not depend on your own understanding. And in all your ways acknowledge God, and God will make your paths straight."

Pick a day during the first week of the new year to read and meditate on the passage. Begin by asking God to help you apply his word to your life. Then, read the passage three times (you may find it helpful to read it in three different translations). Underline, highlight, or jot down the phrases you found particularly meaningful.

Then, pray about your resolutions. Try whittling your list down to one or two things. Once you have done that, ask God to help you develop realistic strategies to achieve your goals. End with prayer by thanking God for the reassurance that he will help you accomplish your objectives. Do not be afraid to revise your goals and strategies.

Each day, review your resolutions and the strategies for fulfilling them. If you miss a day or fail to complete a task, start over, knowing God cares for you (1 Peter 5:7) and will help you get back on track.

Well, friends, that is all for now. May the peace of Christ rule our hearts and strengthen us to run the good race that glorifies God through our good works until Christ calls us home.

Epiphany Christians celebrate it on January 6th, 12 days after Christmas Day

Epiphany is a time of revelation. Jesus revealed himself to the Israelites and the Gentiles as represented by the Wise Men. God doesn't play favorites but receives all whose hearts long for him.

What is Epiphany?

Epiphany means "appearance or manifestation." Many countries refer to it as "Three Kings Day." On this day, Western Christianity recognizes Christ's manifestation to the Gentiles who were represented when The Magi (wise men) visited the child Jesus and showed how God's gift of the Good News is for everyone. Eastern Christianity observes Jesus' baptism on this day. His baptism revealed his identity to mankind. Epiphany celebrates God revealing himself to the world.

To understand Epiphany's origin, we need to look at the Church Calendar's history:

First century: The earliest Christians set aside one day a week as the Lord's Day. We observe this day on Sunday.

Second century, they established Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. Lent was a period of time set aside for penitence and the training of new Christians. Easter observed Christ's death and celebrated His Resurrection, followed by Pentecost, where the church focused on triumph and victory.

Third century, the early Church leaders established Epiphany which celebrates and recognizes Christ's birth, baptism, the adoration of magi, and the first miracle at Cana.

Fourth century early Christians began observing Christmas and Advent. Christmas became the time to celebrate Jesus' birth. Advent is the fourweek period of time before Christmas which is used to prepare hearts to receive Jesus.

The Church Year begins at Advent. From Advent through Pentecost, Christians concentrated on the life and work of Christ. This six-month period covers all six major events: Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. For the rest of the year the church year focuses on the teachings of Christ and their applications to the Christian life. The ultimate purpose of the church calendar ensured that Christians covered the entire Gospel in the course of a year.

History and Traditions of Epiphany

Since epiphany means manifestation, early celebrations honored any of the four manifestations of Christ. <u>His birth</u>, the <u>adoration of the Magi</u>, <u>Jesus' baptism</u>, and the first <u>miracle at Cana</u>, where Jesus turned water into wine.

These four manifestations reveal God to mankind. At his birth, the angels bore witness, and the shepherds, representing Israel, bowed before Jesus. The visit of the Magi revealed Jesus to the Gentiles. The Holy Spirit descended at His baptism, and God declared Jesus' identity. The first miracle at the Wedding in Cana revealed Jesus' divinity over nature. God disclosed himself to humankind through the person of Jesus. He made himself known so we might know him.

Do All Christians Celebrate Epiphany/Three Kings Day?

Not all Christians celebrate Three Kings Day, but many do. Roman Catholics, Lutherans, Anglicans, and Eastern Orthodox Christians observe Three Kings Day. Whether someone celebrates Epiphany depends on their own personal choice or whether or not their church observes it. Either way, it is a great way to close out the Christmas season and turn our hearts toward keeping Jesus at the center of our lives.

The baptism of Jesus, the ritual purification of Jesus with water by John the Baptist, was a major event described in the three synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, and Luke) of the New Testament. It is considered to have taken place at Al-Maghtas, today located in Jordan.


At the beginning of his public ministry, Jesus presents himself to John to be baptized in the Jordan. The heavens open, the Holy Spirit descends as a dove and we hear the voice of God: "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased" (see Psalm 2:7).

God's rule inaugurated

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 148)

The Baptism of the Lord is closely related to Epiphany and should be considered in relation to that feast. Jesus' ministry to bring in God's rule was inaugurated in his baptism. As he came out of the water, the Spirit rested on Jesus and a sign of God's approval was heard. On this day, we celebrate not only Jesus' baptism but our own as well, for our baptism is rooted in Christ. Baptism joins us to Christ and his church, and with all of the baptized we are called to share in Jesus' ministry. In the waters of baptism we are buried with Christ, cleansed of our sins, and raised to share in his resurrection. The Spirit is given to us and we are declared the children of God.




Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

Thu, Jan 18, 2024 – Thu, Jan 25, 2024

2024: 'You shall love the Lord your God... and your neighbor as yourself - Luke 10:27

For the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2024, The World Council of Churches and the Christian Churches in Burkina Faso selected the theme and drafted prayers and reflections. This theme highlights the call for charity, mercy, justice, and unity in inter-communal relations.

"As we renew our commitment to this call, may this love strengthen our unity as Christians." The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is an international Christian ecumenical observance kept annually around Pentecost in the Southern Hemisphere and between 18-25 January in the Northern Hemisphere.

The parable of the Good Samaritan is one of the best known passages of Scripture, yet one that never seems to lose its power to challenge indifference to suffering and to inspire solidarity. It is a story about crossing boundaries that calls our attention to the bonds that unite the whole human family.

In choosing this passage of Scripture for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, the churches of Burkina Faso have invited us to join with them in a process of self-reflection as they consider what it means to love our neighbor in the midst of a security crisis. Communities in the British-Irish context may be less vulnerable to acts of mass violence than in Burkina Faso, but there are still many living with the memory and/or the threat of serious violence, centered on issues of identity and belonging. There are also groups within communities, including people from ethnic minority backgrounds and people seeking asylum, who feel particularly vulnerable to violence or being displaced by the threat of violence.

As we witness nations around the world continue to struggle under the weight of violence, hate and poverty, today's social, political and economic landscape reveals the urgent necessity of Dr. King's philosophy and methodology of Nonviolence.

Martin Luther King, Jr. was the chief spokesperson for nonviolent activism in the Civil Rights Movement, which protested racial discrimination in federal and state law. The campaign for a federal holiday in King's honor began soon after his assassination in 1968.

MLK Day of Service

The national "Martin Luther King, Jr., National Day of Service" was started by former Pennsylvania U.S. Senator Harris Wofford and Atlanta Congressman John Lewis, who co-authored the King Holiday and Service Act., a federal legislation that challenges Americans to transform the King Holiday into a day of citizen action volunteer service in honor of King. The federal legislation was signed into law on August 23, 1994. Since 1996, Wofford's former state office director, Todd Bernstein, has been directing the annual Greater Philadelphia King Day of Service, the largest event in the nation honoring King.

Since 1994, the day of service has been coordinated nationally by AmeriCorps, a federal agency, which provides grants to organizations that coordinate service activities on MLK Day.

The only other official national day of service in the U.S., as designated by the government, is September 11 National Day of Service (9/11 Day).

5 Ways to Exercise Your Bones

And keep your bones and body strong By -

BEGINNING IN our 30s, we experience a gradual decline in bone mineral density, losing about I percent each year. But there's evidence that if you are physically active on a regular basis, you can optimize your bone health throughout your life, says Wendy Kohrt, distinguished professor of medicine in the Division of Geriatric Medicine at the University of Colorado. Any movement that causes you to fight against gravity by standing up and moving is good for your bones. But if you want to amp up the protection, these five exercises will help keep you—and your bones—strong for life.

PUSH UPS

You can do these against a wall, on bent knees or on the floor. Extend your arms and put your hands shoulderwidth apart on the surface in front of you. Tighten your abs, then bend your arms, lowering your torso toward the surface. Push yourself back up. Perform the exercise 3 to 5 times, rest, and repeat for a second set.



SQUATS

You don't have to do a deep squat for this exercise to be effective. Stand with your feet hipwidth apart, then bend at the knees to slowly squat down. (Rest your hand on a sturdy object if you need extra balance.) Squat as far as you can, but don't let your butt get below your knees. At the bottom of the movement, tighten your buttocks and use your butt and thigh muscles to return to a standing position. Repeat 8 to 12 times.



WALK AND STOMP

Bones are stimulated when they're jolted, something that doesn't happen on your typical stroll. Running and hiking will fit the bill, but if walking is more your speed, consider a walk-and-stomp routine: While walking, stomp each foot 2 or 3 times every 10 steps or so, imagining you are crushing a can. (BTW: Walking on real ground requires you to lift and push off with your legs in a way that's much more beneficial than using a treadmill.)



CLIMB STAIR



Stair climbing increases bone density, particularly in postmenopausal women, because it forces your body to resist gravity as you climb while strengthening the leg and hip muscles that support your pelvic bones. Use a handrail as needed—and consider adding an occasional stomp for more bone stimulation.

HIP-LEG LIFTS

This exercise strengthens the muscles around your hip bones, which are vulnerable to fracture, and can help to improve balance. To begin, place your hand on a counter or against a wall for balance, and set your feet hip-width apart. Shift your weight onto your left foot, then straighten your right leg and lift it out in front of you until your right foot is about 6 inches off the floor. Do a set of 8 to 12 lifts, then shift your weight



to your right foot and repeat the motion with your left leg.





Baptism of Jesus

Theme: The Baptism of the Lord

Object: Photo Album

Scripture: Matthew 3:13-17

I'm sure you recognize what I have in my hand. It's a photo album. Most parents have several photo albums that are full of pictures taken of their children as they were growing up. We have always been very pleased with our children. (Show a few pictures as you talk.)

We took pictures of our children in school, at church, playing, at Christmas time, on their birthdays, and many other occasions. We were pleased with them as they grew up and we are pleased with them today.

Do you think God was pleased with His son, Jesus?

I know He was, because the Bible tells us that He was. When Jesus was baptized, the Bible tells us that there was a voice from heaven that said, "This is my Son and I love Him. I am very pleased with Him."

Why do you think God was pleased with His son?

(Open your Bible to Matthew 3:17.) Let's read that verse again to see what God said first: "This is my Son and I love him. I am very pleased with him."

What did God say first? (Allow time for kids to answer.) - That's right! God said, "This is my Son!" God said, "This is my Son and I love him."

What's the second thing God said? (Allow time for kids to answer.) - That's right! God said, "I love him." God loves His son!

(Show kids the photo album again.) These pictures show a lot of things that our children did. But more than anything, these pictures show that these are OUR kids. They belong to us. And we love them!

When we trust in Jesus as our Savior, we become the children of God. Our baptism is like an official adoption ceremony. God loves us from the very beginning when we become His children because that is what He wants us to be.

God says to us, "You are my son. You are my daughter. And I love you!" God loves you! That's pretty awesome, isn't it?

I wonder if God has a photo album in heaven with your pictures in it. I know He has a book with all His children's names in it.

God is pleased with you when you become His child. It's wonderful to hear God say, "You are my child. I love you. And I am pleased with


