A letter from our Hierarchs December – People with Disabilities Awareness Month

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This year's International Day of People with Disability will be celebrated on Tuesday, 3 December 2019 – thus we prayerfully declare the month of December as a special time of care for the persons with disabilities. Persons with disabilities are members of our families, our communities, and our churches. We are enriched by the gift of their lives and their contributions. Every one of us is brought into life as a very precious gift, formed by our gracious Creator and loved into life by our parents. We come "wrapped" with a variety of qualities, skills, desires, and needs.

Our Holy Orthodox Church understands every human life to be equal, inherently sacred and worthy of dignity and respect as the bedrock of a just society. This year will mark the 27th anniversary of this special day (proclaimed by the United Nations in 1992), which promotes an understanding of the issues experienced by people with disabilities and celebrates their achievements.

As a Ukrainian Orthodox community in the United States of America, truly walking in the footsteps of the Good Shepherd, International Day of People with Disability is an opportunity for each one of us to make positive contributions to the lives of 40 million Americans, many of whom are members of our parish communities, with a disability with the hope of breaking down physical, technological, and attitudinal barriers and realizing an inclusive society for everyone.

Within our Church, we are committed to pastoral care of all people, regardless of their life circumstances, thus achieving an inclusive ministerial community that has been blessed to organize and host the St. Nicholas Program for Children with Disabilities, established by the Consistory Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry (under the leadership of Natalie Kapeluck-Nixon) at All Saints Camp in Emlenton, PA dedicated to high quality support for children with disability and their families living in the communities of our Church and beyond.

We are committed to making our Church a 'welcoming home' for all, and it is our hope that in our parishes, the doors are always open to people with disability, and as an Ukrainian Orthodox community, we must ensure that our liturgical life is accessible and inclusive so that everyone is invited to be active in the service of the Church.

We take this opportunity to remind everyone that as people walking in the footsteps of Christ, the Good Shepherd, we have a duty to pray for people with a disability, their families and people who provide them support. We encourage the clergy and faithful of the Church to hold conversations about disability in our parishes, at our workplace, school or community and to show your support for anyone with disability throughout the month of December and always. The following material is presented for your personal reflection and implementation as we journey through life:

Ten Commandments for Welcoming Persons with Disabilities to Church

- 1. Treat a person with a disability as you would anyone else. Relax when communicating. Rely on natural courtesy, consideration and common sense. Avoid getting flustered or irritated if misunderstandings arise. Repeat yourself if you sense misunderstanding or ask the person to repeat himself or herself if you do not understand.
- 2. Address the individual, not an assistant, interpreter or family member.
- 3. Treat adults with disabilities as adults rather than as children, regardless of the disability.
- 4. Speak at a normal rate, without exaggeration or overemphasis.
- 5. Do not be afraid to ask questions about the person's disability.
- 6. To facilitate communication, have pads of paper and pencils available in all meeting rooms and other gathering places on parish property. Use them when helpful.
- 7. Allow people to do things for themselves when they want to, even if it takes longer or results in mistakes. Do not always "do for" the person.
- 8. Offer assistance, but do not impose if help is not desired.
- 9. During all gatherings or meetings, allow time to attend to personal needs and rest. Be patient.
- 10. Respect the individual's personal space and auxiliary aids. Do not lean against or push a wheelchair, pet a service animal in a harness, move wheelchairs, crutches, white canes or other assistive devices out of reach of a person who uses them.

Above all, pray and care for the world around you!

Saints and Feasts on the Pre-Nativity Calendar November 27 – December 14

As is true of all of the four Orthodox fasts, a Great Feast falls during the course of the fast; in this case, the Entry of the Theotokos (December 4). On this day the first announcement of His Coming is made by singing the Irmos of the Christmas Canon "Christ is horn! Glorify Him! Christ descends from the heavens, welcome Him! Christ is now on earth, O be jubilant! Sing to the Lord, the whole earth, And sing praises to Him with joy, O you people, For He has been exalted!" After the apodosis (leave-taking) of that feast, hymns of the Nativity are chanted on Sundays and higher-ranking feast days There are many high-ranking feasts during this time, including those of the Apostles, Great Martyrs, and those who are a significant part of the Nativity.



Saints and Feasts Pre-Nativity Season (Advent) Calendar December 15 – December 31

During the course of the fast, a number of feast days celebrate those Old Testament prophets who prophesied the Incarnation, for instance: Obadiah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Daniel and the Three Holy Youths. These last are significant not only because of their perseverance in fasting, but also because their preservation unharmed in the midst of the fiery furnace is interpreted as being symbolic of the Incarnation—the Virgin Mary conceived God the Word in her womb without being consumed by the fire of the Godhead. During Great Lent and Holy Week, we here from these prophets again in the Hymnography of the services.

A few more worlds about today's Gospel: The Parable of the Rich Fool.

The Prophet King David wrote in the Psalms: "The fool has said in his heart, 'There is no God'" (Ps.14:1 & 53:1). This saying provides and interesting segway into the Gospel reading for today, the (12:16-21). Jesus relates the well-known Parable of the Rich Man and his Crops. He had lots of crops (v.16) and what did he do with them? He built bigger barns to store them (v.18) so he could take it easy, eat, drink and be merry (v.19). He came to this conclusion by "thinking within himself" (v.17). In other words, he didn't talk to anyone. He didn't see advice or guidance. What does God think about the rich man's approach to life? As Jesus tells it, God calls the rich man a 'fool'

Now King David noted the same thing, that a "fool says in his heart." In other words, a fool talks to him/herself giving lots of self-advice. Reminds of the saying that "a doctor who treats himself has a fool for a patient." Thus, a very knowledgeable person, perhaps even a wise sage or a respected medical doctor or an eminent college professor, can still be a fool if they do not believe in God and if they only take their own advice.

Everyone criticizes the rich man because he didn't give away his extra crops to help others, especially the poor, hungry and needy. Jesus did as well when He summed up the parable by saying, "He who lays up treasure for himself is not rich towards God" (v.21). However, we often overlook the primary cause of the rich man's fall—his atheism. His self-talk is a natural consequence of his lack of belief in God or the denial of God's existence.


Now, let's take this lesson/parable and apply it to ourselves. Many of us have more than enough to live, eat, drink and be merry on this earth. What do we do with our extras? Do we build or buy bigger houses, nicer cars, fancy exotic vacations? Do we store our extra crops in bigger barns of investments and securities? And how did we arrive at these decisions? We may have sought out the advice of other wealthy friends and financial experts and advisors, but did we consult our spiritual advisors? Did we consult God in fervent prayer seeking to know His will for our life or did we just talk with ourselves? Let me say that the devil is cunning enough that he can get us to believe that our self-talk is prayer to God. In other words, the devil can fool us so that our prayer becomes just self-talk or self-advice. Think about it. (Greek Archdiocese)

Then he said to them, "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." Luke 12:15 (NIV)
