

FROM THE PASTOR

October 27, 2019

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Lk 18:9-14

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

A Yellow Light is on at the Temple! Like a traffic signal, we are at the intersection of two different ways of praying. Jesus offers a parable today about *'how to pray'* and *'how not to pray'*.

So, we want to proceed with caution! Jesus is commending one type of 'fruitful and God-worthy' prayer that is reflected in the humble, penitent sinner, and calling out another 'time-wasting and selfish' prayer seen in an arrogant, hypocritical Pharisee. Who do we look like in our prayer? The lowly sinner who knows he needs God, or the boastful and 'holier-than-thou' Pharisee? Of the two examples of prayer, Jesus praises the humility of the admitted sinner and exposes the self-deception of the hypocrite. The humbled, fearfully repentant man goes home 'justified', while the Pharisee doesn't receive 'justification' from God. Reading the men's prayers closely, we can see that the posing and hypocritical Pharisee's words don't even sound like prayer. He is 'praising himself' (praying to himself!), and glorifying his own actions. Luke 18:11 says the Pharisee 'took up his position'. Jesus had already pointed out such obvious self-congratulation when he said in Luke 11:43, "Woe to you Pharisees! You love the chief seats in the synagogues and the greetings in the marketplaces." *And the Pharisee's prayer gets worse*, as he rattles on to God, promoting his own self and achievements when he says 'I am not like the rest of humanity.....I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income' (Luke 18:11-12). Jesus had already unmasked the sinful egotism found in such pompous and showy prayers when he said in Matthew 6:7, "When you pray, do not babble on like the pagans, who think that they will be heard because of their many words". The Pharisee's prayer sounds more like a laboring monologue to himself publicly gloating for everyone to hear. But the sincere and self-convicted sinner offers his humble prayer in an opposite fashion. The confessing tax collector just slips in the door, taking a lowly position, and not even lifting his head, to offer a simple and quiet eight words, 'O God, be merciful to me a sinner. (Luke 18:13). His prayer sounds so much like the penitential psalm 51. They both begin by begging for God's mercy. A great prayer meditation is to reflect upon the seven penitential psalms, numbers 6, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130 and 143. All of these psalms offer an honest searching out of sin in oneself and facing it in ourselves. Then we confess our guilt to God and ask for His mercy. The tax collector's prayer in the Temple is commended by Jesus, just as *Psalm 51:19* affirms with hope that *"a contrite, humbled heart, O God, you will not scorn."* Four weeks ago, our opening prayer at Mass extolled God's goodness reflected in His Mercy, when we prayed, "O God, *who manifest your almighty power above all by pardoning and showing mercy*, bestow, we pray, your grace upon us..."(26th Sunday). God reveals His divine might by forgiving our sins, and we show our human dignity by admitting our fault/guilt to Him.

This simple *sinner's prayer* is well known within the Eastern Orthodox traditions as 'The Jesus Prayer'. It gained great popularity in the mid 1800's Russia in an anonymous book written titled The Way of a Pilgrim. In the book, the questing pilgrim wants to learn how to 'pray constantly' as 1 Thessalonians 5:17 commands. He is introduced to a method of short repeated prayers to maintain spiritual focus (sounds like centering prayer or the rosary!). He settles on the 'Jesus prayer', which is simply *"Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner."* As a completely scriptural prayer, we can find it on the lips of the blind Bartimaeus and other blind men calling on Jesus, (in Mark 10:47, Luke 18:38, & Matt 9:27, 20:30). The ten lepers use it in Luke 17:13. The Canaanite woman addresses Jesus with this phrase in Matthew 15:22, and a version of it is prayed by the Centurion soldier who admits similarly, "Lord, I am not worthy of you to enter under my roof"(Matthew 8:5).

So, Jesus teaches us today that justified prayer is prayer that knows God, by correctly acknowledging the almighty source of goodness (which we do by continually seeking God) and the same prayer that honestly knows its own sinful self, as Psalm 51:5 says, "For I know my transgressions; *my sin is always before me*" (which we do by continually searching out the sin in ourselves). This is why I love how we begin our prayer at every Mass by first examining our own consciences, in the Confession Prayer (Confiteor) and the Sinner's Prayer (Kyrie Eleison) ending with 'Lord Have Mercy, Christ Have Mercy, Lord have Mercy!' To pray genuinely and seek to know God, we have to know we need God, and we certainly need God when honestly know ourselves!
