
AA Truck Lubrication Improvement by Jim Lake

I have been working on a early 1930 AA truck. My truck has a early March of 1930 build date and I believe it was assembled April or May.

The June 1930 Service Bulletin shows the addition of a lubrication fitting on the torque tube.

I had the rear end out and was able to work on the torque tube out in the open. I removed the existing grease zerk and hooked up my air supply, took my shop vac hose and put it in the end of the torque tube and taped close.

Using the shop vac and the air I was able to drill and tap a new hole without getting any metal shavings or debris in the torque tube.

A look into our member's workshops



My Latest Road Tripby Dave GeroldGetting ready for a road trip only to cancel as I was leaving

Ever since I acquired a Model A, I have dreamed of traveling across the United States camping along the way and enjoying the freedom of retirement. I have been working feverishly since late last summer finishing my "clamshell" teardrop camper started over 3 years ago and readying my car to start a road trip on March 14th of 2020, the day after I turned 66 years old. Friends and family have not seen much of me this past winter. The past few weeks, I worked diligently at our construction company to ready my active projects to be handed off to able and willing partners.

I finished the camper, a few days prior to leaving, but came to learn, I should have spent a bit more time readying the '31 S/W Town Sedan.





I actually set out on the trip March 14th hoping to get well south of Iowa within two days as some unfavorable weather was moving in. As I was cruising south on I35, I noticed small water droplets on my windshield and it's not raining. I pulled into the Cabela's parking lot near Medford as I needed a small coffee percolator for the trip to round out my cooking equipment. I opened the hood to discover the engine and firewall had droplets of coolant sprayed on them. I had the upper water hose off the previous week and the leak looked like it was coming from the connection of the upper hose to the radiator. I tightened it and was soon on my way. I did not even make Blooming Prairie when the car bucked and I pulled over to find the interior of the engine compartment soaked with coolant. The ignition spark was being shorted by the moisture. At this time I could see the coolant was coming from the base of radiator cap. I quickly surmised the problem was a leaking head gasket. I decided to return home to change the gasket rather than change it on the road. I carry a spare head gasket and the necessary tools with me but using it this early in the trip leaves me without a spare and that is not how I want to start a trip. I drove home keeping the speed under 50 to avoid losing more coolant but over the legal minimum of 45 mph on Interstate 35. It was early evening when I arrived home, and the engine was hot, so I decided to change it in the morning after it cooled.

At 8:00 am the next morning I started changing the gasket while listening to National Public Radio cover the emerging Corona virus pandemic. By 10:00 am I was reluctantly realizing this trip should be postponed. By 11:00 am I was self-convinced that starting out again would be a real bad idea and I was staying home. There will be a better time to go. The road trip would take me to the panhandle of Florida across the southern border of the US to the west coast. The road back would include part of Route 66 and then on roads I have not traveled to make my way home. I planned to use the camper as much as possible along the way.



So, now that I am home, I went back to work with my brothers and nephew at our construction company. I was only retired for 2 days but retirement sure was fun. Can't wait to do it again in about 4 years...retirement I mean. The trip, God willing, will be much sooner.

The past 26+ years dreaming of this trip and especially the past three years planning and preparing for it have been so much fun, I am actually not disappointed with postponing it. With the virus shut-downs, everything I would want to stop and see along the way would have been closed. I am actually thankful I had the good fortune of the failed head gasket.
