Grateful Hearts Come Together

Our journey takes us back to the remarkable story of Sarah Josepha Hale, a woman who fervently believed in the power of Thanksgiving to unify a nation. In the mid-19th century, the United States was a country divided and on the brink of civil war. It was Sarah who saw Thanksgiving not just as a harvest festival, but as a beacon of hope, a unifying force that could bring together a fractured nation. Her relentless campaign, which led to Abraham Lincoln declaring Thanksgiving a national holiday, was rooted in her belief that shared gratitude could heal and unite people.

Sarah's story teaches us an essential lesson: the act of coming together on Thanksgiving is not just a nice tradition; it is a powerful tool for building community and fostering unity. Such gatherings and opportunities can be profoundly healing. Modern research in psychology shows that gratitude and social connections are vital for our mental and emotional well-being. When we come together in a spirit of thankfulness, we create a positive environment that nurtures our mental health and strengthens our relationships.

But most importantly, this practice reflects the love of God. The Bible tells us in 1 John 4:11-12, "Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete (Continued on the back page)

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From a national and cultural point of view, one of the Armenian Church's most important and unique feasts is the feast of the Holy Translators. The Armenian people dedicated this feast to all of the translator teachers whose deep understanding of the difficulties and challenges of their time gave them the wisdom to resolve those issues by creating an alphabet for the Armenian language. Armed with that alphabet, they undertook the monumental task of translating into Armenian not only the divinely inspired and inspiring Bible, but also liturgical texts and many important writings by the Church's Fathers. Taking these from other languages, they made them Armenian in words and in spirit, laying the foundation for Armenia's own, original literature.

By bringing worldwide Christian thought into Armenian, the movement that the translator teachers created became in reality a movement for national liberation — the basis for Armenia's spiritual, intellectual and cultural independence.

It is not too much to say that this feast commemorates the welding together of Armenia's Church, culture, and political life as one. It is this unbreakable connection that we celebrate every October.

My dear faithful friends, brothers and sisters of Yettem's St. Mary parish! You too possess the spirit and inexhaustible grace of the most holy translator teachers. I can say without hesitation that by their prayers on your behalf, you are doing the same work that they did, here on American soil; you are keeping your ancestors' cherished dreams alive by keeping alive and well all of those excellent customs and cultural values that they first entrusted to you, and that you now pass on to the generations that will come after you.

As a small token of my love and appreciation for your community on the occasion of this wonderful celebration, I send you my humble blessings and best wishes through your beloved pastor, Fr. Mashdots Keshishian.


and her Yettem church family. She grew up attending Sunday School and participating in the Sunday School Christmas program. She was a member
