"Who Am I?"

This essay is a tribute to one of many American military heros who selflessly came to rescue all who were injured in the bombing of the Marine base in Beirut 35 years ago on October 23, 1983


This is the story of an American family. A blended family, that is, father with three children, mother with three children, and one child of their own. We met and married in Tucker, GA. Al was a Family Practice Physician; taking out tonsils, delivering babies, making hospital and house calls and working long, long hours. Regina was a Registered Nurse. Back in the day, (I love that phrase, it places us squarely in a time frame) my husband Al and I were both home at the same time. He then announced we'd be making a change in our lives. "We're going in the Air Force," he said. "You'll love military families. They are the salt of the earth." Al had been in the US Army after college to secure the GI Bill for his medical college costs. He knew military life.

The USAF recruiters interviewed us and told us the Air Force needed doctors as the Vietnam era docs were getting out of the service for private practice. They assured us they could station us almost anywhere we wanted to go. We agonized over this decision but came up with California, Hawaii, Spain or Japan. We would be packed out by Christmas.

As we drove into Plattsburgh AFB in upstate NY, a Strategic Air Command (SAC) base, we were in the midst of the first snowfall; 40 inches that January. Plattsburgh, NY is just miles from the Canadian border and just 60 miles from Montreal.

I threw myself into fitting in with the other wives. I joined the Officers' Wives Club, was elected Secretary of the organization, took the kids sledding, skiing, and ice skating. All this was far from the Atlanta, GA home we came from. I went back to school. It occurred to me working as an RN wouldn't happen. The towns near military bases hired hometown girls to work. They all knew our time on station was only about three years. We settled into what became a fulfilling and satisfying life. After three years we moved overseas. We spent three years in Okinawa, Japan and two years at Incirlik AFB in Turkey. My husband received several promotions. He was now Colonel Studwell, a certified Flight Surgeon and a Hospital Commander. The USAF base located in the Middle East gave us the opportunity for travel. Our best visits were to the Holy Land, Egypt and brief visits to France, Germany and England.

Volunteer of the Month Atlanta History Center





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SRCA News

The SRCA board met on August 20. They are scheduled to close-out the calendar year with meetings on September 17, October 15 and November 12. The SRCA responded to a need expressed by Smoke Rise Elementary Principal Pamela McCloud and is funding "the Jaguar Den" - a special break area for achieving students. They are also sponsoring fall plantings in the community garden.

The SRCA had representation at the September 12 Community Council meeting where a first review of the proposal for a new congregation and school at the Mt. Carmel site on Old Stone Mountain Rd occurred. The SRCA also offered assistance to Pat Soltys and Bill Rosenfeld for the District 1 Town Hall meeting on September 18, including using our contacts to facilitate the engagement of the officers from the Tucker Precinct to address safety and burglar-proofing subjects.

The Tucker Steering Committee has introduced to Tucker the prospect of THE PATH--a network of walking and biking paths along and connecting greenways in Atlanta. Several Smoke Rise residents are appointed to that committee including SRCA board member Kim Nesbitt. Many in Smoke Rise do not recall the debate over a PATH proposal in Smoke Rise by the PATH Foundation years ago. Because of this debate, the foundation has seemingly been reluctant to consider trails through Smoke Rise that might connect to Tucker city center, service the new school, connect to Stone Mountain Park and head in the direction of the existing trail on Ponce, or connect to Lilburn trails. To monitor changes and participate in discussion about the PATH, keep an eye on our local social media sites. You are being represented by SRCA!

SRCA has a bit of a black eye for a stall in planned landscaping at key smokestacks in Smoke Rise. We are continuing to work with the contractor to complete the work that was promised at the annual meeting.

The Atlanta Regional Commission reports Dekalb County is in the top three counties in Metro Population Growth, following Forsyth and Gwinnett Counties. The County added 10,600 people in 2017, the largest growth in nearly two decades. Dekalb county's current population is 744,530.



Who Am I?...continued from page 1

Sunday morning, October 23, 1983, we were getting ready for Chapel when Al received a phone call from the Wing Commander, Col. Gordon Clauser. His message was, "Al, there's trouble in Beirut, go down and get those guys." This was the terrorist attack on the US Marine Corps barracks by the airport in Beirut. The terrorists killed 241 that day, 220 Marines, 18 Sailors, and 3 Soldiers. The terrorists managed to decimate the entire first floor of the barracks that housed the Medics. This meant the wounded had no one to care for them.

Al changed into his flight suit, grabbed his medical bag, and without a word started down the hall. I broke out of my trance, started to follow him, and the thought entered my mind – I might never see this man again. I took off my bedroom slipper and threw it at his receding back. I yelled, "Don't you dare do something stupid and get killed." I then burst into tears. He came back, gave me a quick, hard hug, and a kiss. Then he turned and left.

I didn't see him for another week or more. Later we found that after landing at the Beirut airport, Al was the first physician in attendance that day. He evacuated 24 critically wounded soldiers on his aircraft to Rammstein AFB, Germany. One Marine died in flight.

We finished Al's 20-year USAF commitment and retired back home in Atlanta. During Al's career, he lost an eye on active duty, suffered bone and arthritis problems, and had more than 20 major surgeries. The VA considers him 90% disabled, but you'd never know it. He manages to pretty much have a good life.

Twenty-five years after the Beirut bombing, I saw a write up in the Atlanta Journal Constitution saying there would be a local meeting of Beirut Marines. I called the number listed and received a great welcome and an invitation to come to Camp LeJeune, NC for a get together of the survivors. We went.

It was a remarkable evening. We met up with the pilot of Al's aircraft, Capt. Joe Bunker. He had to siphon gasoline from the planes parked on the Beirut tarmac to get back home with the wounded. The USMC Commander, Col. Tim Geraghty met Al that evening. He had a message for Al. The mother of the young Marine who died on Al's aircraft asked the Colonel if he ever met the doctor on the aircraft who brought her son home. If so, please thank him. Even though her son died, she knew where he was. Well, that did if for Al. He started to sob. He'd been carrying his grief over losing that Marine for twenty-five years.

The Marines found out that Al was missed when they gave the flight crew stationed in Germany medals for bravery and heroism in Beirut. Al, being stationed in Turkey, fell through the cracks. They did something about it. The pilot had a friend in his home state of Wisconsin, Congressman Paul Ryan. A lot of activity went on and 28 years after the fact, Al received his Medal during a great ceremony at Dobbins AFB in Marietta, GA on June 5, 2011, with family and friends present.

I quote from the Meritorious Achievement Medal: "Col. Studwell demonstrated stellar clinical skills as he led



the team that saved the lives of the 23 remaining Marines which contributed immeasurably to this hazardous and historic mission." The pilot, then Cpt. Joe Bunker, concluded "today we honor a fellow military member with an award that is 27 years overdue. More importantly, we are here to remember the 241 service members who lost their lives."

Many of the Marines injured in Beirut came to show their gratitude. Col. Tim Tarchick, Wing Commander of the 94th Airlift Wing at Dobbins AFB, Marietta, GA said, "this Award is a big deal authorized by the President of the United States. I am pleased to be standing before a silent Warrior - one who paved the way for people in uniform, particularly in the medical field."

Who am I? I am a military wife.

Now, Al and I sit and watch NASCAR on television to see the beginning ceremony: the prayer, the fireworks, the singing of the National Anthem, and best of all, the Fly-Over and presentation of the Colors. We fly our Flag at home.

Again, I know who I am. I am an American Patriot.



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Strippin' a Boat

My wife, Susan, and I are tackling a major woodworking project this fall. Having built an Adirondack Guide Boat a few years ago, I wanted to build a 10-foot, strip-built tender. "Tender" is the fancy word for dingy – a small boat that resides on a larger one for shore excursions. This small tender we are building seats 3 adults, is really stable, and easy to row. Best of all, it weighs a mere 75 pounds, making it easy to lift and move around. The reason it is so light is that it is built entirely from thin, lightweight wood strips. Each strip is ¼ inch thick and is one inch wide with a bow at the top and a groove at the bottom, making it easy to nest and glue strips together following the shape of a boat. There are no nails, staples or metal on the boat.

You can get plans and kits for kayaks, canoes, and rowboats online. Many plans are free and can be used to cut out the "forms" that are placed at one-foot intervals on a wooden frame, called a "strongback". The strongback is the skeleton upon which the boat is formed, keeping the strips aligned. Putting duct tape over the edges of the form keeps



glue from sticking as you strip-build the boat over the forms.

Because the boat we are building has no nails or staples, each strip has to be securely glued to the one next to it and clamped to the forms to get it to follow the hull shape. The process can't be rushed, but it gets really exciting when the hull begins taking shape and starts looking like a boat. We apply one or two strips each day on each side of the boat, so it takes about a month to complete this phase of the project.

Of course, as you woodworkers know, the real work begins once you have all of the stripping and gluing done, because now you have to sand it smooth, fill in the gaps between strips, and patch the errors that occurred during gluing and clamping. We spend about 30 minutes each night on this, and it is great therapy working together. Plus, Susan is detail-oriented and loves that she can now mix just the right color and putty over all the cracks and mistakes.

Later this month we will be applying fiberglass and adding the finishing hardware that completes it as a boat. We will share our progress in pictures as it progresses.

From conversations about this boat with neighbors, I have concluded, we have many really talented woodworkers here in our community. It would be great for more of our neighbors to share their woodworking projects. Maybe this could even inspire a new column for our Smoke Signal with tips and ideas for using these creative talents. If you are interested, or have ideas or projects to share, please submit them along with pictures to the Smoke Signal Box for future papers (staff@smokesignalnews.com). Maybe if we have enough interest, we can get a craft or woodworker group started here in Smoke Rise. It is not only great therapy, but you can make some pretty useful items with all the hard work. We plan to end up with a boat! Stay tuned.

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Rotary of Stone Mountain President Scott McEvoy: Piloting through Tragedy

This past summer, Smoke Rise resident Scott McEvoy was sworn in as the president of the Rotary Club of Stone Mountain. Like many Rotary officers, Scott had served in a variety of volunteer and leadership roles since he joined the club in 2007, always ready to lend a hand or make a donation to help when he saw a need in the community. He worked hard as a member of the club, but his journey to become the top club officer was more of a struggle than many realize.

Scott was born in St. Louis, Missouri, the youngest of three children born to Alvin and Virginia. His father worked for General Motors, and the family enjoyed a typical suburban life in a suburb outside of Detroit. After earning a bachelor's degree in business from the College of William and Mary, and a master's in finance in from Stetson University, Scott was drafted into the Army.

A large cat scratch incurred the night before induction waylaid Scott's plans for an Army career, since the wound caused a cancellation of his entry into the Army. The injury proved a fortuitous accident; while waiting for his hand to heal, he enlisted with the Florida Air National Guard, who sent him to Officer Candidate School and then flight school. During his

time as a pilot, Scott flew the T-38 Talon, a supersonic jet trainer, interceptor jets F-102 and F-106, and the well-known supersonic interceptor jet F-16. Scott's career with the Florida Air National Guard lasted over thirty years, with both reserve and active duty. He retired in 2002 with the rank of colonel and as the Vice Commander of the Southeast Air Defense Sector, First Air Force at Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida.


After the military, Scott flew commercially for several airlines, including National, Pan American and United, working his way

up to a captain's spot on the Boeing 757/767 out of New York City. His airline career abruptly ended in January 2008 in a violent home invasion in Ormond Beach, Florida. An armed intruder broke into Scott's house, tied him up and beat him into unconsciousness, robbing him and leaving him for dead. Scott managed to escape the house and covered in blood, found his way up to the highway and flagged down a passing car. The driver stayed with Scott until the police and ambulance arrived. A week later, the robber shot and killed a security guard at a CVS in South Beach, then shot and killed himself after being surrounded by police.

Scott spent two months in the hospital recovering from the attack, primarily at Peninsula Rehab Center at Florida Hospital Oceanside. His traumatic head injury left him with severe cognitive deficits, including poor attention span and concentration, and damage to executive functioning. His vision deficits resulted in right sided neglect and poor depth perception, and he had limited reading and writing abilities.

Once discharged from the rehab center in Florida, Scott needed an outpatient facility to continue the ongoing intensive occupational, speech and recreational therapy. He was accepted into the Shepherd Pathways program in Atlanta (the outpatient facility of Shepherd Hospital), where for six months he worked in therapy sessions three days a week. He required a caregiver at home to help him with daily living tasks and to work with him on his physical therapy. As part of his therapy, he also joined Side-By-Side Brain Injury Clubhouse in Stone Mountain Village, an organization that helps survivors of traumatic brain injury readjust to life, learn how to manage day-to-day tasks and regain a sense of independence and self.

In September 2008, Scott briefly returned to Jacksonville, Florida, where he attended Brooks Rehab before returning to Atlanta. While his main motivation during all his rehabilitation and therapy was a return to the skies, even just as a private pilot, unfortunately he was unable to attain that goal. But he is grateful for having recovered enough to again live



independently, drive a car and lead what he feels is a fulfilling life. He credits the wonderful family members, friends, therapists and caregivers who worked so hard and gave him the encouragement he needed to persevere. He is particularly grateful for long-time companion and best friend Paula Adeoba, whom he married in May 2017, forty years after they first met in Daytona during spring break. Today Scott's life is busy with volunteer work, mostly with Side by Side and Shepherd Pathways, where he works to share his experience and

You can feel it in the air on those days when the temperature drops, cool breezes blows, and all of a sudden you realize --- fall is here and winter isn't far behind. This is a great time to investigate ways of lowering winter utility bills, a passion near-and-dear to my heart.

These are simple reminders, but ideas that could save you hundreds of dollars over the winter months while improving your comfort.

1. Conduct an online energy audit of your home. No scheduling or waiting for an auditor to come to your home. It takes only a couple of minutes to complete and you will learn a lot about your home's energy use and savings potential. Georgia Power offers this FREE service at their website www.georgiapower.com. Select Residential and then Save Money & Energy. Scroll down to locate Home Energy Check-Up. If you are a Georgia Power Customer, log-in to your online account get a detailed analysis of your home using your actual billing history. If you don't want to login or are not a Georgia Power customer, just use the Estimate version. It's quite good too.

The Check-up asks just 10 questions about your home, like its size and how many people live there. When you have answered them all, click Show Analysis to reveal "dollarized" recommendations for your home. That means each recommendation tells you how much you are likely to save by taking that suggestion. And if there are rebates or incentives that apply, you will see clickable links right there on the page to help save more money.

1. October is the best time to lock-in a gas rate for the coming winter. And I do recommend lockingin because that insures you against the vagaries of price swings that can happen due to weather and market fluctuations. The Georgia Public Service Commission website has a great price comparison tool that shows an "apples-to-apples" comparison of the real cost of a therm of natural gas.

There you will see home some companies lure you with a really low per-therm price to hide costs in high monthly customer service fees and other fees that make your bills higher than other providers offer. But it's hard to tell, so I have read the September PSC charts for you and report the range is from \$1.02 cents/therm to \$1.48/therm, and the monthly customer service fees range from \$3.45 to \$9.95. Again this year, True Natural Gas is low-cost on both numbers. Their per-therm number is \$1.02, the lowest, 45% less than the highest, and their customer service fee is what most offer, \$5.95, but that drops every year to a low of \$3.45 as part of their customer loyalty program, a \$30 annual savings.

1. When did you last change your HVAC system filters? Clogged filters stifle air flow, stress your heating unit, and cause comfort problems, plus make it more expensive to heat your home. If you can't change them yourself, get help from a friend or HVAC contractor. 2. Final note: the easiest way to cut heating bills is to lower your thermostat setting in the winter. The recommendation is holding 68 degrees F. Sure, you don't want to be uncomfortable, but by dressing warmly and adjusting the setting when you are away or asleep will save money and minimize the impact on your comfort. Here's to keeping more money in your pocket this winter and reducing the wasteful use of our precious natural resources! The majority of our heating still comes from the non-renewable fuel natural gas, and every therm we don't use is potentially available to future generations, who may need it more than we do today.

Scott McEvoy continues to inspire through his spirit for life and dedication to helping others. As he piloted planes during most of his adult life, now he hopes to guide his Rotary Club in service to the community and to the world.



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

IT'S APPLE TIME!

Fall is the time to visit the North Georgia Mountains to take advantage of the apples sold from orchards and stands by the roadside. Here are some different ideas for using those apples or just using those showing up on the grocery store shelves right now. Happy crunching!

Apple Dip

1 8-oz. package cream cheese softened ½ cup dark brown sugar 1-teaspoon vanilla Honey Roasted Peanuts

Mix the first three ingredients thoroughly. Chop peanuts and put on top. You can mix some of the peanuts into the dip. Slice apples and dip in a mixture of lemon juice and water or pineapple juice to keep them from turning dark. (I prefer the taste of the pineapple but use your preference.) Serve along side of the dip.

Sausage Apple Ring

2 lbs. bulk sausage
1 ½ cups cracker crumbs
2 eggs slightly beaten
½ cup milk
¼ cup minced onion
1 cup finely chopped peeled apple
8-10 eggs
Grated cheese
Parsley flakes
Paprika

Combine the first 6 ingredients and mix with a fork. Press lightly into a greased ring mold and then turn onto a shallow pan. Bake at 350* for 1 hour. Fill center of the baked ring with eggs scrambled with cheese and parsley. Sprinkle eggs with paprika. Good for brunch or supper. (Meat may be partially baked for 30 minutes and then finished when ready to serve.)

Slow Cooker Apples

3 lbs. apples, peeled, cored and cut in wedges
1/3-cup brown sugar
1/3 cup white sugar
1-teaspoon cinnamon
1-teaspoon vanilla extract
2 teaspoons lemon juice
½ stick butter sliced

Put apples in a 6-quart slow cooker. Mix sugars and cinnamon. Sprinkle over apples. Put extract and lemon juice on top. Lay butter slices on top of apples. Cook on high for 4-5 hours. Stir occasionally. If you want a thicker sauce, stir 1-tablespoon of cornstarch into apples when you put in the cooker. You may want more sugar or try almond extract instead of vanilla.

Fresh Apple Walnut Cake

2 cups sugar 1-cup vegetable oil

3 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla
3 cups all purpose flour
1-teaspoon baking powder
1-teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons apple pie or pumpkin pie spice
2 cups peeled and diced apples
1 1/2 cups walnuts, toasted and chopped (Toast at 350* for 5-8 minutes)

Combine first 4 ingredients in a large bowl. Beat one minute. Combine dry ingredients and gradually add to sugar mixture. Beat with mixer at low speed until blended. Fold apples and nuts into batter. Spoon batter into a greased 10-inch tube pan or 2 loaf pans lined with parchment paper. Bake at 325* for 1 hour and 30 minutes (less if using loaf pans) until toothpick comes out clean. Cool in pan 15 minutes. This will keep in the freezer for a long time.

Optional—Glaze:

In medium saucepan melt $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar and 2 tablespoons brandy or l tablespoon vanilla. Bring to boil and cook 2 minutes.
