Pastor's Word: What I'm Reading

I am one of those people that tends to read two or three books at a time, and not necessarily very quickly. I admit that I start more books than I finish. Right now, I am actually working on four books, and I'm going to offer here some inprocess book reports.

I have just started Bruce Springsteen's memoir, *Born to Run*, and I have already encountered the way that his Catholic upbringing shaped his life. As he grew older, he rejected his religion but later realized that no matter what disagreements he may have had with the church of his childhood – and there were many – it had nevertheless influenced him, and he was still "part of the team." I'm looking forward to reading more about his journey, which while filled with family dysfunction and a good deal of pain has led to not only great music (maybe I'm showing my age here), but a concern for social justice.

Like many of you, I am very troubled by the division and polarization - and just plain meanness - that seem to be on the rise in our culture. There are numerous examples of those even in our own community who have felt emboldened to wear their racism and disdain for others openly. I am particularly concerned for the way that fear can lead us to set aside Jesus' concern for those who live on the margins or are different from us.

Methodist Bishop and former Duke University chaplain William Willimon has written a little book called *Fear of the Other: No Fear In Love*. Willimon notes, "Is there anything more natural, innate, and universal than fear of the Other? This propensity... to stick with your own tribe makes all the more remarkable that early on in Israel's history, God's people are explicitly commanded to 'love the immigrant as yourself." Willimon quotes from Leviticus: "When immigrants live in your land with you... they must be treated as if they were one of your citizens. You must love them as yourself; because you were immigrants in the land of Egypt." Willimon argues that the Church does not simply exist for itself, but for others. Written in the last year, this is a timely book.

On the way to church a few weeks ago, I heard an interview on the radio with Michael Eric Dyson. Dyson is a professor of sociology at Georgetown as well as a Baptist minister. He has written a book filled with personal stories on what it is like and how it feels to be black in America, and I was intrigued enough with the interview to buy the book. *Tears We Cannot Stop: A Sermon to White America* is not necessarily easy reading. It challenges white privilege and it is making me think. But this is something I need to hear, and while it can make me shudder at times, it is written with love.

All that is going on in the world in recent days has led me to - guess what? - prayer. Anne LaMott is one of my favorite writers; in one of her earlier books she said that the two best prayers she knows are "Help Me, Help Me, Help Me" and "Thank You, Thank You, Thank You." She later expounded on this and wrote a book on prayer, *Help, Thanks, Wow*, which we will use for our Lenten Study. Personally, I use "Help Me/Help Us" a lot, but if we are able to practice gratitude (Thank You!) and experience awe (Wow!), then we are able to see beyond the present moment and find the road to joy – or at least make it through the day. I'm looking forward to discussing this book together.

Spring Break Mission Trip

March 11-16 Murrow Indian Children's Home Muskogee, Oklahoma

We will be sending a team to Muskogee, Oklahoma over spring break to work at the Murrow Indian Children's Home. Established in 1887, Murrow currently provides a home for around 25 Native American children. These are children that are in State or Tribal Custody and in the current foster care and adoption system. Murrow is a ministry affiliated with American Baptist Churches USA and the campus is adjacent to Bacone College, an ABC-related school that is a historically Native American college.

Our work will include maintenance and work projects on grounds and residential cottages at Murrow as well as opportunities to interact with the residents. We will also tour Bacone College and worship at the Bacone College Church.

With fundraising and some budgeted funds, we expect that the cost per person will be \$50. There will be a meeting following Church School at 12 noon on Sunday, February 12 for all who are going on the trip. Please let Pastor Dave know if you are planning to go and to get a registration form.

Mid-Iowa Community Action, Inc. (MICA) serves a variety of families in many different ways – all their families have their own unique needs. We collect items and money twice a year in February and September. We all know times are hard and some families are facing a trip to the Food Shelf when they have never before needed to and may have even donated in other years. First Baptist has a strong tradition of supporting the work the Food Shelf does.

Most Needed Items! Hamburger Helper Rice Rice mixes Potato mixes Soup

Other items needed:

Non-perishable, unopened, and unexpired food items - Bring things that YOU would enjoy eating.

Jell-O, hot cocoa packets, juice, pasta, pancake mixes, syrup, tomato products such as paste and chunks, coffee, tea and canned chicken, peanut butter, tuna, flour, sugar,

canned beans – this provides protein for some families

Personal hygiene items – bath soap, shampoo, women's supplies, shaving crème and deodorant, toilet paper, Kleenex, paper towels

Household supplies –dish soap, cleaning products **Infant needs** – diapers of all sizes and wipes, baby food

Money – Mica likes to give food vouchers to be used for milk, eggs, meat and fresh vegetables and fruit.

MICA's food pantry is entirely community funded. With financial aid they are able to shop for items that they are out of. Often at reduced prices that are given to food shelves across the country.
