2020 is already a year of growth with HBPOA. We have had 78 new members this year to date! We are excited to see people who have lived here for years joining and getting involved again. There are many young people with children who are becoming involved in our community's future. I would like to personally thank all of our new members and renewed memberships. We believe new members will provide new ideas and a more productive and vibrant HBPOA, as well as offer a great selection of candidates in November's HBPOA Officer and Director elections.

## APRIL SPEAKER SCOTT HECHLER DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SAFETY – FIRE CHIEF FOR HERNANDO COUNTY



Chief Hechler provides executive leadership for approximately 35% of all Board of County Commissioners' employees. He is responsible for the following County departments:

- Fire Rescue
- Mosquito Control
- Emergency Management

Chief Hechler came to Hernando from Virginia in 2014 upon retiring from Spotsylvania County Fire, Rescue, and Emergency Management in the Commonwealth of Virginia. He has a master's degree in Business Administration from Liberty University and a dual major bachelor of arts degree in Labor Studies / Labor Safety and Health from the National Labor College. He also completed the Virginia Executive Institute by the Virginia Commonwealth University Center for Public Policy and LEADS Program by the University of Virginia.

The Chief has 37 years of experience in public safety with greater than 30 years in leadership roles including as local government Fire Chief/ Director of Public Safety, the Chief Deputy Executive Director of the Virginia Department of Fire Programs, and providing fire, EMS, and emergency management subject-matter expertise for the U.S. Navy CNIC Headquarters in Washington D.C.

Chief Hechler has served on many fire, EMS, and emergency preparedness working groups, committees, and task forces at the regional, state, and national levels. He has led or co-led numerous projects impacting all first-responders in the Commonwealth of Virginia and all firefighters in the U.S Navy and the Department of Defense. Chief Hechler was also one of thirty first-responder leaders across the nation selected to attend the inaugural FEMA NIMS – Incident Commander train-the-trainer course.

Chief Hechler is most proud and honored to lead the amazing team of 273 men and women that provide fire, EMS, and a wide array of specialty emergency services for the citizens of Hernando County.

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MINUTES OF THE HBPOA MEETING COAST GUARD BUILDING MARCH 5. 2020 @ 7:00 PM

Diane Greenwell, President, called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM and invited all to stand for the Pledge of Allegiance led by Mike Prescott.

Mike Fulford, Vice-President, was then called upon to introduce our speaker for the evening, David Garcia who is a resident as well as a member of the HBPOA but this night was with us in his official capacity: District Manager for Withlacoochee River Electric Cooperative at the West Hernando Office. Mr. Garcia began by explaining that this coop is one of over 830 in the United States, some small serving perhaps rural communities and some such as ours that operates in 5 counties, serving more than 230,000 customers, making it the third largest in the US. It was interesting to learn that our Co-op was first organized in 1941 although implementation was delayed by WWII such that its first customer was connected on 4/4/1947. A number of er, including the statistic that Cooperatives serve over 75% of our country's mass land though it only serves around 12% of its residents.

Mr. Garcia handed out brand new booklets which have been designed for new WREC members but that he thought might provide some interesting information to us as well. He reinforced that WREC is member based with each to attend the annual membership meeting to meet trustees,

hear reports, voice opinions, etc. Additionally every member is entitled to receive capital credits which are given back in the form of credit on the December bill. Those who move from the area receive any credits in the form of a check.

He expressed a lot of pride in WREC's Operation Roundup whereby customers can arrange to have their monthly bills rounded up to the nearest dollar (average of about 50 cents per month per bill). This money goes into a special fund and is used to help members who experience catastrophic events through no fault of their own. Several examples of how this money has helped individuals were incredibly heartwarming. Since its inception over 2 million dollars have been disbursed to 618 deserving families. He is equally proud of WREC's Education Foundation which

awarded 1, 974 scholarships, representing a potential payout of over 13.3 million dollars, all from abandoned capital credits that might otherwise have been forfeited to the

Lastly Mr. Garcia gave information about the generator interesting facts and statistics were provided by our speak- program whereby they have teamed up with Generac to offer a 22 kilowatt generator which will be serviced by WREC. He provided details about costs, financing, installation details and obvious advantages to having such a generator. The floor was opened for questions from the floor. Lastly Joe Wachs made the very important point that Mr. Garcia facilitates WREC's providing a crew to help install our Christmas lights and to provide the electricity to one having a right to voice opinions on how the company is power them. Mr. Garcia was warmly thanked for his perrun as well as the right to vote. Members are also invited sonal help to our community in his capacity as WREC Dis-(Continued on page 8)

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


GAC.....Dr. John Paul Reeve reminded all members of the Planning and Zoning meeting coming up on March 9th where the three issues affecting our community will be presented: H1962 (Gordon Wolf's request for rezoning of his property at 5000 Calienta St. LLC); SE1908 (S&T Boat Repair and Bait LLC for Special Exception Use Permit); and H1833 (Sport Fisherman's Landing, Inc., for zoning change). Crime Watch.....Jesse Manno reported that they have a "new" car (old police car) and, as always, volunteers are needed to take shifts driving around the community. He also acknowledged the Prescotts for a recent donation to Crime Watch. Meetings continue on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 PM at the VFW.

Environmental.....David Snutes reported that finally he had results from the water samples he had submitted to UF and the results were definitely of concern and show that our waters are being polluted from a number of sources. He plans to have the results in the next issue of the Beachcomber. David wrote an interesting article in the March edition which went into some detail about how he has been taking samples only at high tide but now will be taking them at low tide as well. He asked for volunteers to help with this effort and/or to get involved with all environmental issues that are of concern.

Port Authority.....Steve Barton came forward to give an update on the activities of the Port Authority. Unfortunately it would appear that the County is trying to undermine the PA's important role in our community by the following:

1) It has been suggested by BOCC that PA should limit their meetings from monthly to four times a year. Scott Herring even told them that if they didn't make the change, he would go back to the County and insist that they be or(Continued on page 15)

2) It appears that the money from the BP oil spill settlement that was designated for our waterways may be channeled in other directions under a loophole that allows the County to use these funds for "tourism." This will definitely undermine the intended use of those funds which are sorely needed for our waterways.

3) The County budget for PA has been cut from \$36000 to \$5,000. The Port Authority raised \$5,000 to construct reef balls but now doesn't have the money to place them.

These three major examples should inspire residents of Hernando Beach to write to the commissioners and express our support for the Port Authority which is crucial to the welfare of our coastal community. Their next scheduled meeting will be March 18 @ 7:00PM at the Coast Guard Building.

#### **OLD BUSINESS:**

Roundtable and Vision Plan Update.....Chuck Greenreported that the first Roundtable Meeting was on February 20, 2020, at the Coast Guard Building. The meeting was for all business and residential property owners on Hernando Beach. There were 90 participants; 37 from the HBPOA and 53 from the rest of Hernando Beach. The discussions were participantdriven, civil and productive. The Hernando Beach Vision Plan was modified in accordance with the suggestions and consensus of the participants. Some of the older participants fear change including recreation for our residents because it might attract tourism. The younger residents (Continued on page 16)



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

want more onshore recreational amenities, especially for the children in our community. There was a strong consensus by all participants about the need for greater law enforcement for traffic control and pedestrian safety. Chuck also emphasized that we need the muscle of the business community to partner with us to protect the interests of our community.

The Roundtable was followed up by a meeting with the County Administrator, Jeff Rogers, and County staff in Brooksville on February 24, 2020. The group focused on a review of the Vision Plan and Citizen concerns expressed at the Roundtable. The suggestion of crosswalks with push-button warning lights controlled by pedestrians is one option that was discussed. The County Administrator and staff seemed to think that crosswalk warning lights are a possibility and the cost might be funded by the gas tax. The County is cautious about moving forward with other aspects of the Vision Plan until it is confident that the majority of the Hernando Beach residents and businesses are in support. There was also a meeting on February 28, 2020, that involved Jeff Roger's coming to Hernando Beach to meet with business leaders about the Vision Plan. Mr. Rogers and the business leaders support going forward.

The Hernando Beach Vision Plan is still open for creative and innovative suggestions for improvement. There will be a second Hernando Beach Roundtable Meeting on March 19, 2020, from 7:00 - 9:00 PM, at the Coast Guard Building where Barbara Gossett will serve as moderator. This is not an HBPOA driven function but everyone is encouraged to attend.

By-laws Revisions.....Kelly Reeve was invited up to report on the progress of By-laws Revisions. She began her report by elaborating on all the hours and effort that have gone into this process. In spite of the fact that the Board had voted 7 to 1 at the Board meeting on March 2 to wait until the Board had a chance to go over all the proposed revisions before presenting them to the general membership (the Board meeting was already approaching 4 hours), Kelly expressed her opinion that the revisions should go directly to the membership at this juncture. The reactions both pro and con this argument were immediate and the arguments became quite heated. Diane Greenwell wanted the membership to be aware of five points supporting the need for the revisions to be reviewed by the Board:

- Meetings of the By-laws Committee were held knowing there would be no majority.
- Deceptive changes were made after full committee review had taken place.
- There was a deceptive practice of sending multiple copies with the same name to various committee members.
- 4) The full committee had already reviewed and agreed upon changes through Article IX.
- 5) The Ad Hoc committee was dissolved based upon this knowledge.

Finally Pat Cordova stated that the decision of the Board to special meeting on 3/23/20 to afford them the opportunity to review the proposed revisions was a pragmatic one since the Board meeting had already taken nearly four hours (and the Board had yet to that point been given a complete copy of the revisions) and that no one was trying to deny the membership the right to review the revisions and give their input. That process will begin with the next meeting. The reaction to her remarks seemed to indicate that most of the attendees agreed with this approach. Ultimately Sarah Hill moved that the By-laws Revisions will be reviewed by the Board and presented to the membership prior to the next meeting. David Sarkis seconded her motion which

passed with no dissent.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

Resolution No. 2020-001.....Diane Greenwell asked Pat Cordova, Recording Secretary to read the following:

Current Article II, Membership

1. Membership in HBPOA is open to all owners of property in Gulf Coast Retreats, Unit 1 through 8 and Hernando Beach Units 2A through 14B. Members are defined in Article II, Item 3 below.

#### Proposed Resolution No. 2020-0001

Attachment A to amend Article II, Membership

1. All property owners in the geographical area included in the neighborhood designated as Hernando Beach, Fl, by the map attached hereto as Exhibit A are eligible to apply for membership in the HBPOA.

Mike Fulford moved that the Proposed Resolution No. 2020 -0001 be adopted as stated and Kathy Jasper seconded his motion. As part of the discussion, Diane Greenwell explained the need for this sense of urgency for the following reasons:

- 1) January 9, 2020 Minutes reflect that a proposed change to the By-laws Article II, Membership 1. was discussed addressing the current article as not being fair as it is not inclusive of all property owners in Hernando Beach.
- 2) During February we had membership renewals that we had to decline after six years of membership. At a By-laws meeting one Board member felt we had to enforce the current By-laws, while another felt we should try to resolve this without waiting for full By-laws revision.

3) The Board endorsed the change at their March 2, 2020 meeting by a vote of 7-1.

There were varying opinions on doing this now, especially in light of the just-taken vote to allow the Board to review all the proposed revisions before presenting them to the membership and several worthwhile suggestions were made. However, when the vote was called, there were 37 ayes and 14 nays so that the motion passed.

Insurance Quotes.....Diane Greenwell stated that we had intended to discuss the policy and its limits of coverage tonight with the membership; however, due to receipt of a Demand Letter, dated March 4, 2020, from S&T's attorney putting the HBPOA on notice of claims by S&T that a committee chair and members made "unlawful" remarks, "wrongful harassment," stalking," and "tortious interference," the HBPOA has been put on notice and advised to cease interfering and attempting to interfere with S&T's business. The HBPOA must respond within five business days. The Board will be looking into this matter and will keep the membership posted. Mike Fulford added that the company that was offering to sell us liability insurance, upon hearing about the Demand Letter, has withdrawn their offer.
