13th Sunday Ordinary Year B Mark 5:21-24, 35b-43



“When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered around him, and he stayed close to the sea. One of the synagogue officials, named Jairus, came forward. Seeing him he fell at his feet and pleaded earnestly with him, saying, “My daughter is at the point of death. Please, come lay your hands on her that she may get well and live.” He went off with him, and a large crowd followed him and pressed upon him. While he was still speaking, people from the synagogue official’s house arrived and said, “Your daughter has died; why trouble the teacher any longer?” Disregarding the message that was reported, Jesus said to the synagogue official, “Do not be afraid; just have faith.” He did not allow anyone to accompany him inside except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they arrived at the house of the synagogue official, he caught sight of a commotion, people weeping and wailing loud. So he went in and said to them, “Why this commotion and weeping? The child is not dead but asleep.” And they ridiculed him. Then he put them all out. He took along the child’s father and mother and those who were with him and entered the room where the child was. He took the child by the hand and said to her, “Talitha koum,” which means, “Little girl, I say to you, arise!” The girl, a child of twelve, arose immediately and walked around. At that they were utterly astounded. He gave strict orders that no one should know this and said that she should be given something to eat.”

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A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches, June 27, 2021

As if one miracle wasn't enough, we have a double header of healings today, as Jesus cures not only 1) Jairus' daughter, but also 2) the woman with a 12-year hemorrhage.

I particularly love this gospel reading. As a person who is accused often of easily going off on tangents in conversation or talks, I find good company with Jesus in the reading today because He shows a willingness to follow a good tangent. On his way to Jairus' house, He bumps into a friend and look what happens (a healing that is 12 years in the works). Had Jesus not stopped and taken a moment with the hemorrhaging woman, then we may not have ever learned of her great faith or she been healed! Yet, this reading really shows just how personal and approachable a Savior we have in Jesus. For example, first, we see that Jesus makes house calls! He took the time out to make a trip to Jairus' home to see his daughter. Then as Jesus is interrupted along the way, He took more extra time to speak personally with the hemorrhaging woman. She thought she could pull off a 'grab and go' healing, but Jesus always gives more. He takes a moment to speak with her about true healing. He also demonstrates how a more personal world is good for everyone. I will save it for another day, but we could explore how she had not been receiving any personal care from the physicians treating her for those 12 years previously, (Mark 5:26 even says, "She had suffered greatly at the hands of many doctors and had spent all that she had. Yet she was not helped but only grew worse.") But that would be a tangent, wouldn't it?

Still, I find Jesus' personal touch everywhere in the gospels. As some examples, notice how He gently moves the deaf man away from the noisy crowd before He opens his ears, so the man isn't overpowered by the sudden 'jet engine loud' sounds of the boisterous mob as he starts hearing for the first time (Mark 7:33). Or how about Jesus correcting His apostles who had discouraged children from approaching Him-He says 'let them come to me' (Luke 18:15-17). Or how with every leper, Jesus makes sure to actually 'Touch' them when healing them, so that they discover again the feel of human & personal concern. Jesus always makes it personal!

Two more details from today's gospel display Jesus' deep personal concern for every person. First, notice that He heals (or revives from death) the little girl, by speaking 'a familiar and native spoken language-'Talitha Cum''. Jesus offers a comforting and colloquial address by using the Aramaic dialect, like if we've ever been gently awakened by the soft tones of an endearing and familiar voice during a time of our own recuperation from sickness (Mark 5:41). Also, Jesus customizes His concern for her, by asking about her appetite & commands that she be fed (Mark 5:43). How long had she been bedridden and not eating? Jesus suggests some food be given to her that she may regain her strength. Maybe Jesus suggested her favorite food, like offering 'ice cream after a tonsillectomy' or some sweet pancakes after having fasted for some morning bloodwork at the lab. Jesus knows & understands His sheep personally!

I have to defend proactively that what I am about to say is NOT a Tangent! Really, it adds some helpfully explanatory detail to our meditation on how Jesus always moved smoothly from one encounter to another, tying his interactions and his followers together. Many scenes in the gospels, especially Mark's gospel, can appear extraordinarily 'busy'. Often in Mark, in the middle of some event with Jesus, an interruption appears. Jesus deals with it and then we get back to the initial event. Maybe we can think of such interruptions as 'commercials' but Bible scholars call these side-jobs of Jesus, 'Markan Sandwiches'. It means that often in Mark, different but related stories are sandwiched together. (Was it a memory-recall device of Mark, or Jesus Himself showing how 'inter-related' life is?) One story will begin, and then another is squeezed in, before returning to the main action to finish the first story. Often a single point is being reinforced, or a particular action is being 'framed or contextualized'. A favorite of mine is when Jesus curses a fig tree, then goes to cleanse the Temple, and then returns to find the tree withered up (Mk 11:12-21) signifying the barrenness of the Temple worship, or when Mark tells that chief priest were plotting to kill Jesus, then Jesus is tenderly anointed, and then we hear of even Judas' plot to have Jesus hurt (Mk 14:1-11) like a reminder that there is still gentle moments even in the worst of times. But for your own further study, here is a full menu of Markan Sandwiches, - a whole picnic basket of them!(Mark 3:20-35, 4:1-20, 5:21-43, 6:6-31, 11:12-21, 14:1-11, 14:17-31, 14:53-72, 15:40-16:8) A lot to digest but worth the effort!

Memo from Bishop's Medley's Office

Bishop Medley Reinstates Mass Obligation:

"The general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (including the Saturday/Vigil Mass) is now reinstated (CIC, can. 1247). This takes effect in the Owensboro Diocese the weekend of June 12-13, 2021. This date was chosen because as of June 11, there will be no state-mandated restrictions, including capacity restrictions on gatherings. As has always been the case, those who have a serious reason are exempt from attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2181). This includes those who are ill, have significant health risk factors or care for someone who is immuno-compromised or ill, as well as those who have significant fear or anxiety of contracting the coronavirus in a large group of persons. Nevertheless, these persons should observe the Lord's Day (CIC, can. 1247) and are encouraged to spend time in prayer on Sunday, meditating on the Lord's Passion, Death and Resurrection. Kindly consult your pastor with any specific questions regarding the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation."
