

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AT FEATHER LAKE

Here we go again: Feather Lake is still dry and closed to public use. The lake has now been completely dry for 13 of the past 17 months and mostly dry the other 4 months.

From August 2010 to February 2012, a remarkable five Eagle Scout service projects took place at Feather Lake. Even more remarkable, Boy Scouts from a single troop, Troop 4, organized and carried out all five.

Prior to the current drought, Feather Lake enjoyed 4+ years of favorable conditions during which vegetation thrived. Along the inner berm that winds through the lake basin, the lush growth became impenetrable in many places, greatly limiting our ability to use the berm for access when we worked within the basin. At the same time, many non-native salt cedars had popped up along the inner berm following a disturbance event in 2004.

The scouts took on the major task of clearing a trail along the berm and removing the salt cedars. Eagle Scout candidate Evan Longpré got the ball rolling in August 2010. In December 2010, Fernie Espinoza took up the baton. By the completion of Fernie's project, over half the berm was cleared.

In January 2011, the scouts took a break from work on the berm. Under the direction of Christian Savusa, they harvested cottonwood and willow poles at Feather Lake and planted them at the adjacent Feather Lake II. By August, these trees were thriving, but many young salt cedars were also appearing at Feather Lake II. Kyle Volkov led a project to remove those salt cedars and also continue clearing the inner berm at Feather Lake.

Now, just one portion of the inner berm – the densest, most jungle-like portion – remained uncleared. In February 2012, Jonathan Kaplan led his fellow scouts in a final charge. Thanks to the tremendous dedication and hard work of the Troop 4 scouts, we again have access along the entire inner berm. Well done!

A lot of work, but then there is always work to be done at Feather Lake. Our next workday is **Sat., June 2** starting at **8 a.m.** Join us to help with sanctuary maintenance. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. Audubon at RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK






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NEW EDITION OF EL PASO-AREA BIRD CHECKLIST

The 9th edition of our checklist "Birds of El Paso County, Texas and Adjacent Areas" is now available. It continues the evolution and improvement of this publication since the first edition in 1938.

Sincere thanks go to Jim Paton, John Sproul and Barry Zimmer for their dedicated work compiling this new edition. It represents a distillation of their extensive knowledge of El Paso-area birds. Thanks also go to Roxanne Schroeder for her drawing of a Gambel's Quail that graces the cover and to the many contributors whose observations are the foundation for the checklist.

From 1973 to 2003, the number of species on the checklist grew remarkably, from 272 in 1973 (5th edition), to 297 in 1980 (6th edition), to 374 in 1987 (7th edition), to 426 in 2003 (8th edition). The growth reflected in the new edition is more mod-



est: an increase of just 11 species to 437. Our understanding of the El Paso-area avifauna has now grown to the point where the finding of a new species is a very infrequent event.

In the new checklist, 12 species have been added and one – Blue-throated Hummingbird – has been removed from the main list and placed on the hypothetical list. The new species are: Cackling Goose, Anhinga, Purple Gallinule, Iceland Gull, Glaucous Gull, Royal Tern, Parasitic Jaeger, Tropical Kingbird, Couch's Kingbird, Fork-tailed Flycatcher, Blue-winged Warbler and Streak-backed Oriole.

Although there are relatively few new species on the checklist, that doesn't mean the list is only slightly changed from the previous edition. The new checklist includes a number of formatting changes aimed at making it more readable. It incorporates all the applicable taxonomic and name changes since 2003. The seasonal-occurrence bar graphs for many species have changed to reflect either their changed status, our increased understanding of their status, or both.

Six species have seen changes in their breeding status since 2003: Northern Harrier (confirmed, Fort Bliss Ponds, 2007), Cooper's Hawk (attempted breeding, upper valley residential area, 2010), Peregrine Falcon (suspected breeding, Franklin Mts.), Long-eared Owl (confirmed, Rio Bosque, 2007), Acorn Woodpecker (suspected breeding, upper valley residential area), and Varied Bunting (suspected breeding, Hueco Tanks).

The new checklist reflects a wealth of new information. We hope it will add to your knowledge, appreciation and enjoyment of El Paso-area birds. You can view the online version of the new edition (and previous editions) at <u>www.trans-pecos-audubon.org</u>. Hard copies will be on sale at our monthly meetings, at Feather Lake (some day, it will have water again), at community events, and by mail. The price is \$2, plus \$1 for shipping and handling on mail orders.

Celebrate Urban Birds & the 20th year of International Migratory Bird Day Friday, May 4, 2012 from 2:00-4:00 at the EPCC Northwest Library

Cornell Lab eNews Flash LIVE: Red-tailed Hawk Nest

A new nest camera high above a Cornell University athletic field is streaming crystal-clear views of a Red-tailed Hawk nest via the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's All About Birds website. The new camera stream puts viewers 80 feet off the ground and right beside the nest, where they can watch the hawks arrive, see them taking turns incubating the eggs, and compare notes on the two birds—the male has a more golden-tawny face and is slightly smaller than the female, who has been nicknamed "Big Red" for her alma mater.

The nest should be active for at least the next two months, and we hope you'll join us as we watch the young birds hatch and grow. The parents have raised young here for at least the last four years. As signs of spring began to show, the pair began adding sticks and green pine boughs to the nest, and the male started bringing prey, such as squirrels and pigeons, to offer the female. The pair now has two eggs, laid last Friday and on Monday, and we're waiting to see if they lay a third. The birds will incubate for 28-35 days from the date the first egg is laid.

To make sure no one misses out on the early stages of this Red-tailed Hawk story, we've put together a temporary page on our All About Birds website where we invite you to watch these magnificent birds. The site will be live 24 hours a day and the video can be streamed in HD. You can also watch on mobile devices such as smartphones and iPads. A full-featured Bird-Cams site will launch in late April with many more species, including Osprey, Black Vulture, and Great Horned Owl. Enjoy the view! www.allaboutbirds.org/cornellhawks

April 13, 14 and 15, 2012. Lesser Prairie-Chickens

Bitter Lake NWR / Bottomless Lakes State Park

April is the peak time for Lesser Prairie-Chickens' famous displays in their mating areas called booming grounds.



Mark and Janet will arrive Friday and check into a motel in Roswell. We'll do

some local birding and everyone is invited to join us. Saturday morning we will tour Bitter Lake NWR.

Bring lunch and drinks as we'll be out all day. In the afternoon, we'll bird and tour Bottomless Lakes State Park and on Sunday morning we will need to get a very early start to view the Lesser Prairie-Chickens. There is a possibility we won't be able to view them. This will depend on the results of the BLM Prairie Chicken Population Census that the BLM is conducting. The fires last year and the ongoing drought may have affected the population.

If we are not able to view the prairie chickens, we will drive to Carlsbad and bird that area until noon and head back to El Paso. We need to have at least 5 people on the trip or it will be a no-go.

May 25, 26, 27 & 28. Chiricahua Mountains & Southeastern Arizona.

The Memorial Day weekend will see us traveling to the Chiricahua Mountains for great birding. We should see Blue-throated and Magnificent hummingbirds, Sulfur-bellied Flycatchers, Painted Redstarts and Yelloweyed Juncos. Best of all will be the Elegant Trogon.

Let's "Fly" into Action! Audubon's Birdathon 2012!

Birdathon counters are already "in training" in preparation for Birdathon 2012. It all takes place May 5-6.

What is Birdathon, you might ask?

One thing is for sure, it's not your average bird count or fund raiser! Birdathon is unusual and different: a wild weekend of birding and our organization's most important source of income for conservation and education programs.

Birdathon 2012 will benefit the following programs and projects:

CHAPTER OPERATIONS & FEATHER LAKE WILDLIFE SANCTUARY

Scouts, students and adults can enjoy seeing birds up close in a natural habitat. When the lake has water, we have docents on duty to answer questions, provide printed trail guides & lend binoculars.

RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK

Each year, this site along the Rio Grande becomes more valuable as habitat for birds and other wildlife.

AUDUBON TEXAS

Our support helps keep National Audubon's state office an effective voice for birds, other wildlife and their habitats in Texas.

How Birdathon Works

On the weekend of **May 5-6**, our dedicated Birdathon counters will be busy scouring the countryside, trying to find as many bird species as possible, in a single 24-hour blitz. These hardy, energized and intrepid individuals will start early, stay out late, visit varied wildlife habitats and give their eyes, ears and bird knowledge a full workout. Why do they push themselves so hard? For the pleasure of a day in the field, for a test of their birding skills and **most importantly, for a better West Texas environment**.

Each counter will be backed by sponsors who pledge either a given amount for each species seen or a fixed total amount. Most counters will identify 50 to 100 species. A pledge of, say \$0.50 per species for 60 species would result in a contribution of \$30.95% of Birdathon income goes to the programs and projects; 5% to fundraising (printing, paper and postage).
