Ct. St. Ann's Indian Mission Nominated by Ct.Sts. Anne and Joachim #2638, Fargo

St. Ann's Indian Mission has served the Catholic Parishes of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Reservation since 1885.

Children from Belcourt and four surrounding parishes attend St. Ann's Native American Catholic Elementary School. St. Ann's Native American Catholic Elementary School serves the youth of the Turtle Mountain Reservation in pre-K through 6th grade. The main goal of the school is to educate each child to know and live the Catholic faith, to achieve academic success, and to continue lifelong learning as leaders and learners in their communities.

St. Ann's Mission Church and St. Ann's Native American Catholic Elementary School in Belcourt, ND, have immediate and pressing needs including the buildings and grounds, and lack needed resources as most families live at or are below the poverty level. St. Ann's School provides the children from these families a quality, faith-filled Catholic education at little or no cost to the families, while also providing food for the children while at school, and food to bring home since many of these families go without.

Regarding the financial needs of St. Ann's Mission, Bishop Folda stated: "Despite the challenges they face, St. Ann's Indian Mission continues to be a shining beacon of hope and God-centered stability in the lives of so many who are dealing with poverty and other social issues. Please consider lending a hand..." "Your gift of mercy can be life-changing for a child at St. Ann's School.

<u>Ministry on the Margins</u> Nominated by Ct. Fr. Tracy #2121, Bowman & Ct. St. Cecelia #362, Mandan

"Ministry on the Margins" works with at-risk youth, prison inmates, the homeless, and others who need to encounter God's saving love. This charity was founded by Sister Kathleen Atkinson, a Benedictine Sister from the Annunciation Monastery in Bismarck.

"Ministry on the Margins" is a volunteer based ecumenical ministry committed to supporting those who fall through the cracks during times of transition. Programs are developed by listening to people on the margins and seeking to help them become self-sustaining. "Ministry on the Margins" supports people with basic needs for food, gas vouchers and household items. It serves to provide dignity to people as they try to get back on their feet.

Men and women in prison re-entry are provided with basic need and supportive mentors. It has the only local food pantry open in evenings and on weekends. A coffee house welcomes those who slept in their cars or on the street with breakfast and fellowship. Within the walls of the state prison system and county jail, Sister Kathleen and her volunteers are engaged in Bible studies, RCIA, and other spiritual programs.

The work through "Ministry on the Margins" is a true source of hope for people in physical and spiritual need and an inspirational example of spreading the light of Christ.

<u>The Mission of St. Vincent</u> <u>de Paul (SVdP)</u> Nominated by Ct. St. Mary #268, Devils Lake

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is dedicated to feeding, clothing, housing and healing individuals and families in our community who have nowhere else to turn for help. As important, SVdP provides meaningful opportunities for volunteers to serve their neighbors in need with love and compassion.

Individual conferences provide help

for people's physical, mental, and spiritual needs. By doing this with care and respect, we show them that they matter and they are children of God.

SVdP serves the state of ND. The ND district includes both the Fargo and Bismarck Dioceses.

The State SVdP District needs funding to continue to train future Vincentians, travel throughout the state for pulpit presentations on SVdP (to gain new conferences), provide for leadership training at the regional and national level, assist new conferences with start-up costs and materials, and (in the future if funding is secured) help with start-up costs for Thrift stores. Additionally, SVdP is in the process of training individual Vincentians in a new program designed **help get people out of poverty.** Quality training requires funding which the ND District has little of at this point in time.

Typically 100% of donations to local conferences goes directly to those in need. Administrative expenses are paid for by individual Vincentians through a 'secret collection' at meetings. No Vincentian in ND is currently paid for any position held on the conference or district level. The ND District is in great need of funding sources so that local conferences might continue to flourish, thus meeting a multitude of needs from those in financial difficulty and/or crisis.

Discalaced Carmelite Nun Nominated by Ct. Immaculate Conception #322, Bismarck

Since April 26, 2014 there have been four Discalced Carmelite Nuns living in Hague, ND. This is a cloistered contemplative community. They were invited to come to the Diocese of Bismarck by Bishop David Kagan.

Their life is one of solitude and silence, with constant prayer and penance willingly undertaken for the salvation and sanctification of souls.

They are the only Monastery in the world dedicated to the Holy Face of Jesus. They are also famous for the Brown Scapular.

One of the goals of the community and Diocese is to raise the funds to begin building a Monastery. Mary, Our Mother, Help Us Say "Yes!"

when all the robes are the same length and all are in white shoes. With this being said, I am going to review the ceremonial dress code. Robes are to be worn with dignity and respect. Robes are to be eleven inches from the floor with your shoes on (should be hemmed before vou arrive to convention - not while you are lining up). Your dress must be shorter than your robe (it should not show). White shoes should be worn with robes at all times. The wearing of stockings is optional, if stockings are worn they are to be white or light colored. Robes are to be clean and well pressed. Small earrings, rings, and watches are allowed with robes. Handbags are not to be carried when in procession with robe. Slacks or capris are not to be worn with robes at any time. Bow before entering your pew or at the altar if you are going around to enter the pew from the other side. If we all follow these rules when robed we will have a grand procession.

I am anxiously awaiting the state convention and I hope many of you are as well. Remember not to let your to-do list rule you. Officers please wear your robe with pride and dignity. Hope to see you in Bismarck in May.

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
