NEUROBIOLOGY Our Conference Topic

The conference topic, <u>The Neurobiology of Trauma and Expressive Play Therapies</u>, may seem for some, a departure from the Association's usual conference fare. The subject was chosen as a response to results of a 2010 Needs Assessment completed by members, which indicated an interest by membership in Neurobiology. The Board is pleased that Dr. Sweeney was available.

Neurobiology has been referenced in previous conference presentations dating as far back as 2003, when Dr. Janine Shelby engaged audience volunteers in a lively demonstration of the workings of the brain, in order to provide the context for her presentation, Developmentally Sensitive Posttraumatic Play Therapy for Sexually Abused Children. More recently, the cover story for PLAYTHERAPY magazine, December 2010, was entitled, "Neurobiology of Play Therapy." Author Richard L. Gaskill, EdD,LCP, LCPC, RPY-S made the point that "social and emotional trauma has its greatest impact on the brain region most actively developing at the time of the traumatic experience." He stated, "since the brainstem is the first region of the brain to develop in utero and most rapidly during the first year of life, social and emotional trauma during the first year of life is much more likely to create disorganization to the brainstem than in the cortex."

This informs us that problems such as metabolism, hyper-arousal, or sensory perceptual problems are much more likely for a child traumatized at this age." "Since brain regions respond to specific types of sensory input, intervention strategies must be matched to the brain region affected both in sensory input and the developmental level of the child at the time of the insult." Gaskill said the challenge regarding play therapy for traumatized children is to "create treatments capable of impacting trauma-related symptoms originating from lower brain regions (brainstem and diencephalon.)" He noted that alternative treatments being explored to address persistent, low brain trauma include movement, music, yoga, and sensory awareness.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

For some members, there may be confusion in regards to Dr. Sweeney's presentation. The HAPT brochure states he will address the use of "sandplay" with traumatized children, both "directive" and "non-directive." Some HAPT members are trained in Sandplay. "Sandplay therapy is a form of psychotherapy that attempts to form a connection with the psyche towards a goal of healing. Its founder was the Swiss therapist Dora M. Kalff (1904-1990), who based her theories on the principles of Jungian psychology and on the work of Margaret Lowenfeld" (wikipedia.org/wiki/Sandplay therapy) Recently, the term "sandplay" seems to be used interchangeably with the term "sandtray play" which is used to refer to any therapeutic activity in the sandtray.

Last week, the KARDIAC KIDS had a fundraiser which was organized by one of their own, Punahou Junior, Cara Mukai. It was the 2nd Heal A Heart Concert she organized to help raise money to benefit a support group for families with children born with heart disease and fund a camp, where once a year, these kids, with congenital heart problems get to "feel normal." Apparently last year's concert and associated T-shirt sales raised \$5000.

What was striking, was that this benefit had no big name performers. The Kardiac Kids performed. It appeared that their relatives and friends performed. People from the church where the fundraiser was held, performed. The emcees were Cara's best friend, and cousin, both young people themselves, drafted for the cause. There was one well-known performer present, Roy Sakuma, but he was there to play back-up for his young ukulele student who looked three feet tall. The Kardiac Kid dancers first got together when the desire to dance, and the ability to participate in standard programs did not mesh. So, instead of accepting a no, they formed their own group.

Part of the Heal a Heart program was used to pay tribute to Jacob Jackson, a youth mentor who passed away recently, losing his battle with heart disease. A mainland teen, Jacob, or Chewy as they called him had participated in a local camp as mentor and had made a big impression on the Kardiac Kids. It was difficult to consider that the children on stage, lived with the knowledge everyday that they, or someone they knew, could lose the battle to live. The Kardiac Kids boys performed the well known haka, Ka Mate. This is a dance likely seen by everyone reading this, at least a dozen times or more. A parent noted for the audience however, that there was a difference. For the boys participating, taking off their shirts was an act of courage, because the boys bore scars on their torsos from surgical procedures. Scars which are a source of embarrassment or separate them from other peers. It was a rousing, energetic dance, be assured!

So, the event left one with thoughts about the power of one young person in making a difference, of how faulty hearts may in the end be the strongest hearts of all, how community and family galvanized can work wonders, and how unaware we are of the courage needed by some to do the things we take for granted. There is no way one can feel sorry for these kids. Hope. Courage. And Heart. They have it all.
