Former SRQ Mayor Goes to TV

Former Sarasota Mayor and City Commissioner Suzanne Atwell announced plans for "The Suzanne Atwell Show," a multiplatform content initiative that includes branded Social Media, Digital Videos, and a half hour Public Affairs program, says her press release.

Hosted by Suzanne Atwell, the show will debut in October and provide a venue for "respectful, intelligent discourse on issues, events, and causes that shape the Sarasota/Manatee region."

The mission of the project is to engage community leaders with in-depth interviews and news reports that promote public understanding and context. The Digital and Social Media phase of the project begins June 9, 2017, with the launch of a website, SuzanneAtwell.org, Facebook/ SuzanneAtwellShow, and YouTube/SuzanneAtwellShow. Distribution partnerships for Suzanne Atwell Show programming are being negotiated with Broadcast Television, Cable, and Digital Direct. Final plans are to be announced later this summer.

Suzanne had this to say about the project, "I just felt the time was right to do something like this, whether it be Social Media like Facebook or traditional Public Affairs programming. I want to continue to be involved and work hard to create a trusted destination for truthful debate that hopefully contributes to a better informed and collaborative community."

The show's concept and production are developed and supervised by Executive Producer Steve Sabato. Sabato is a nationally recognized, award-winning media executive with 40 years' experience managing television stations and newsrooms. In addition to content development, and media consulting, he currently writes and reports Editorials on WWSB-TV, the ABC affiliate in Sarasota.

Need Some Ballet During the Summer?

Miss enjoying ballet in the offseason? If so, consider The Sarasota Cuban Ballet School (SCBS). SCBS is having its 2017 Summer Intensive (now in its fourth year), that will run to July 29 at the school's campus on Beneva Road. The Summer Intensive is for young people who have the talent and drive to become professional ballet dancers.

Participants come from all over the world—as near as right here in Sarasota and as far away as Japan—and are selected after a rigorous audition process (either in person or by video). The six-week curriculum includes ballet, pointe, variations, pas de deux, dance conditioning, character, modern, and the history of Cuban ballet.

The program will culminate on July 29 with a 2 p.m. showcase performance of ballet classics and exciting new works. This will be followed by a 7 p.m. performance at the Sarasota Opera House that will feature young dancers as well as professionals who studied with SCBS and are now members of prestigious ballet companies. These professional dancers include special guests Francois Llorente, former soloist of Ballet Nacional de Cuba.
