
AT FEATHER LAKE

Feather Lake has been dry most of the time since early April. Since mid-April, we've had it closed due to lack of water. We'll reopen to the public in September.

Prior to its closure, the lake had been open most weekends since September. Many thanks go to our dedicated volunteers who made this visitor season possible: Lois Balin, Lucretia and Eddie Chew, Clarence Cooper, Scott Cutler, Richard Denny, Jane Fowler, Beth, Bob and Diego Garcia, Inga and Joe Groff, Bob Johnson, Carol Moreno, Janet and Mark Perkins, Flora Pittard, Luis Sanchez, Roxanne Schroeder, Ursula Sherrill, John Sproul, and Graciela Woodbury.

One of the surprises this past winter was the return of a beaver to Feather Lake, our first since 1992. We first saw signs of its presence in late January. Throughout February and March, it was busy felling cottonwoods and willows scattered throughout the basin. When the lake went dry, we thought the beaver would leave. We were wrong. Trees keep dropping, and the critter appears to have dug a den in the cove near the fire station.

Want to check out the beaver's handiwork? You'll have a couple of opportunities this summer. Our next workdays are **Sat., June 5** and **Sat., August 7**. For each, the gates will open at 8 a.m., but you can come any time to lend a hand. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.



Audubon at RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK



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Field Trips

The Gila National Forest, June 25 – 27

Spend a refreshing weekend Fri., Sat., and Sun., June 25-27 in the Gila National Forest of New Mexico. You are welcome to arrive there on Friday, June 25, for some afternoon birding, or just show up for our Saturday, June 26 meeting at 11:00 a.m. in the parking lot of the Ranger Station located at the south end of Glenwood, NM. We will camp at Pueblo Park Campground, where Mountain Chickadees, Steller's Jays, and Cassin's Kingbirds are possibilities. In the past we have seen a young Northern Goshawk sitting in a tree as we drove toward the campground.

We will also visit the Luna-Reserve area to look for Lewis's Woodpecker and Pinyon Jay. In



the past Prairie Dogs have been sighted in this area. Our next stop will be Luna Lake for lunch, where we hope to view ducks, such as mergansers, and a Bald Eagle. In Glenwood there is a fish hatchery which attracts Summer Tanagers and some flycatchers. The American Dipper is also on our wish list as this water bird is known to nest on the Catwalk trail.

On the way back to El Paso we will stop at Mangas Springs, N.M. where we may see a nesting Common Black-Hawk and Lincoln's Sparrows.

If you want to stay indoors, there are motels in Glenwood and in Reserve. Please call by June 19 if you are interested in joining this field trip.

Double Sunset, Sat., July 10

We begin at Keystone Heritage Park for this field trip around sunset in El Paso's upper valley on Sunset Drive! By now, many young birds have fledged and are exploring the world around them. Mississippi Kites, which we may also see, usually nest within the upper valley and their young may not have fledged yet. We will also search the thickets along the Nemexas Drain at the west end of Sunset where some exciting summer birds can often be spotted.

Lincoln National Forest, July 23-25

Leave behind El Paso's heat and join us in New Mexico's majestic Sacramento Mountains! Pitch your tent at the South Fork campground (Elevation: 7500 feet), located just above Bonito Lake. Or find motel accommodations at Alto, about 10 miles away, or at Ruidoso, five miles beyond Alto.

Golden-crowned Kinglet

We will be searching for three species of Jays: Western Scrub, Pinyon, and Steller's, and also Mountain



Chickadee, Golden-crowned Kinglet and Mountain Bluebird. A Northern Pygmy-Owl has been heard at the campground in the past. The American Dipper can be found here, so, if you didn't see it near the Catwalk in the Gila National Forest in June, here's another chance! Please call by July 17 if you are interested in this field trip.

Reservoirs in the Valley Saturday, August 7,2010

McNary has been called the best birding location

in the valley east of EI Paso (Lockwood et al 1999) and is a notable haven for northern water birds, such as resident Western and Clark's grebes, Eared Grebes, pelicans, gulls, egrets, cormorants, and many species of ducks. Fort Hancock often has more open mud flats than McNary, and these attract herons and White-faced Ibis. Tornillo is also known for its winter water bird population. Land birds that have been sighted at one or more of these three reservoirs include Harris's Hawk, Northern Harrier, Ferruginous Hawk, Say's Phoebe, Loggerhead Shrike, Pyrrhuloxia, and Lark Bunting. We will have lunch at a rest stop near Tornillo under some towering Cottonwoods.
