Pastor's Corner

Like many of you, I find my mind often turning to the war in Ukraine. The direction my thoughts naturally go is toward praying for the victims ... the people who are oppressed and vulnerable ... the ones displaced or wounded or orphaned and widowed. But there is another side, not nearly as natural, that Christ calls us also to address ... "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." Matthew 5:43-44 I don't know about you, but I ask, "How am I supposed to love Putin?!" The people of Russia are a little easier – I can imagine many wish they weren't embroiled in all this. But what about the ones whom we know are carrying out atrocities?

Jesus says *pray* for them ... that doesn't mean for their *demise*. For Putin, and those like him, it means praying for the following:

*For them to *repent* – as this is the first step for all of us who believe, it must be the first for them as well. This is the "no" we say to the world's lies [like power as a primary goal] and the "yes" we say to God's truth [the way to greatness is service and humility] ... Sometimes, God's judgment (as God's prerogative) is necessary to move a human heart to this point. Eugene Peterson says it well, "In the Scriptures, God's 'arrows' are judgments

aimed at provoking repentance. The pain of judgment called down against evildoers is meant to turn them from their deceitful and violent ways to join our pilgrim way of peace. Any hurt is worth it that puts us on the path of peace" (Long Obedience in the Same Direction, p. 30)

*After we pray for their (and our) repentance, we can pray for wisdom for them – one of the things God's Word tells us the Lord always stands ready to give when sought (James 1:5-8).

*And finally, after asking for humility and wisdom for them, we can pray that God would grant them *righteousness expressed through love and justice*.

As we approach *Holy Week*, and think of the many enemies Jesus faced – enemies who should have believed in him (chief priests, Pharisees, Sadducees, and many more), we can draw perspective and strength to pray for our own enemies by remembering how Jesus acted toward his own – *words*: "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do..." and *actions*: he died for them too, you know – Nicodemus was a Pharisee who finally came out of the shadows, and Paul started out as the Pharisee (Saul), hunting down Christians. Yes, pray for your enemies on Palm Sunday – that those who merely give lip service and empty praise to God would lay down their hearts (and arms) to Christ. Pray for our enemies on Maundy Thursday as we think of those who are going through things like Jesus did that night: ganged up on by a mob ... falsely arrested ... wrongfully tried in a kangaroo court. Pray on Good Friday, as you think of the physical abuse sustained by the vulnerable and the innocent ... in many forms. Pray on Holy Saturday, as the hope of the world is buried in the tomb, for all those bereaved families, who have lost loved ones to violence and corrupt human schemes and agendas. And finally, pray on Easter, with the renewed hope (and evidence) that God really can change the world ... God can make all things new, even the most wicked human heart. With God, all things are possible.

We plan to report the total of the collection, but the response to the overall Presbytery + Synod effort has been very good. Please continue to pray for the application of aid and all those affected in Ukraine.

Praying in the Middle of Senseless Tragedies

When we hear about yet another random act of violence, our first response is usually to pray away the pain or pray that this will never happen again. But how can we pray beyond the fear and shock, beyond the most obvious needs, for the issues of the Kingdom?

Hopefully, some of the following points will be a springboard for your prayers in the wake of tragedies that defy human understanding and are becoming more and more frequent.

Praise

Though it is difficult, start with praise. Focus on God's character.

• Praise God that He is sovereign, that He has ultimate control over it all, and that nothing takes Him by surprise (Is. 45:5-7).

Petition/Intercession

• Ask God to use this situation to bring unprecedented

Al Mulder writes, "We often think of enemies in connection with war: enemies live in other countries and on other continents. But, whether across the ocean, or next to us in our pew, Jesus is calling us to pray for our enemies: the neighbor who throws loud all-night parties, the uncle who is abusive, the kid who bullies your little brother, the boss (or teacher) who has it out for you. We are angry with them. We would like to see them corrected ... punished! And yet Jesus tells us to love them! That doesn't necessarily mean feeling good about them. Like repentance, agape love (the kind Jesus commanded) is not an emotion. It's a combination of decision + action. 90% of the time (if not more), the love word Christ uses suggests action; Jesus is telling us to act in a

loving way toward people who are difficult to love. Jesus even tells us to pray for them. We can talk with God about them and ask God to guide and bless them. We can confess our fears and our anger. We can ask God to show us the image of God in them. We can ask for insight into why they might act as they do." God does not expect us to make friends with people who disrespect us, or to tolerate abuse from them. But as we faithfully pray for them, God will help us think compassionately about them, and begin to act kindly toward them, and even learn to speak truth to them with love and respect.

Consider the woman who had been "caught in the act" of adultery and was brought to Jesus in John 8. Everyone knew she was guilty. They probably also knew that the religious leaders didn't care about her but were just trying to trick Jesus. So how did Jesus respond? Notice how he did *not* respond. He did *not* further shame the woman publicly. Nor did he debate the religious laws of the day. He didn't even ask, "Where's the man who was with her?" Jesus took his time. He bent down and wrote on the ground, even as they kept questioning. When the time was right, Jesus stood up and shifted the focus from the woman to her accusers: "If you are without sin, go ahead and start throwing stones." The woman's accusers drifted away, one by one. And finally, when only the woman remained standing there, Jesus did not shame her further by lecturing her. He simply said to her, kindly and clearly, "Go and live a changed life!" Neighbors can do bad things. A coworker can embezzle thousands of dollars from a local charity. A teenager can get drunk, wreck the family car, and need to get bailed out of jail. How do we respond? If you are without sin, go ahead and feel superior, shun them, put them down! But if we too are sinners, let's do as Jesus did. This is a good practice to continue after Lent, through the season of Easter ... and for the rest of our lives. Lord, teach us your ways. Amen.
