My CORPS Decision Jack Bell



Jack's entry into the Corps is not so different but his *three discharges* are special.

Jack was a 1948 high school graduate. The main reason he chose the Marine Corps was because a Master Sgt friend of the family talked him into it. Of course, it was just a few years after the end of WWII and the Master Sgt was undoubtedly a veteran. But since Jack was only 17 years old his family had to sign for him.

But it wasn't the regular Marine Corps but the reserves. It was probably a time when the Corps was still in the wind down of the war years from full numbers. So, he went into the reserves. At that time the reserves didn't go to boot camp, so Jack was sent to Camp Lejeune for two weeks training and then to Little Creek in Virginia for amphibious training. At that time Little Creek was an Army installation.

But in October 1949 Jack got his 1^{st} Honorable Discharge from the Marine Reserves and was inducted into the regular Marines. The Cold War was about to get hot in Korea and the Marines were getting ready.

When Jack, this time, reported to Parris island he showed up in his Reserve herringbone utilities with his PFC stripe on the sleeve. At the time rank on the sleeve was not sew on but inked.

When the DI saw this new Marine with a stripe, he went ballistic. As jack tells it, the DI took his uniform blouse and scrubbed off the stripe almost putting a hole in the sleeve. He was actually issued new utilities soon after and earned that stripe again upon graduation in June 1950.

Jack was soon in Korea as an MOS 0811 Field Artillery Cannoneer. His active duty was supposed to be three years, but they kept him for one extra.

Jack received his 2^{nd} Honorable Discharge from the regular Corps in 1954 and again became an Active Reservist. Four years later, in 1958, Jack left the Reserves with his 3^{rd} Honorable Discharge.

Today Jack in his late 80's still looks great in his Dress Blues with the Marine Veterans Color!

Our Military Will Always Carry the True Burden

At the February Houston-Holicky- Sitter Luncheon Dr. (Sgt) Bruce Heilman made an outstanding presentation. He related his Iwo Jima experience but even more poignantly read the description by another Iwo Jima veteran of the terrible sounds and smells, not simply of battle, but of people - desperately wounded, dying and dead.

These were not just Americans but Japanese as well. Although some in the audience may have similar experiences in other wars, most do not, and the details were carefully graphic. I hope the young Marines from Ft. Lee came away appreciating the heritage they saw and heard from Dr. Heilman and the other veterans.

One of the things this presentation brought home to me is that most of todays Americans have become jaded and stuck in the frame of mind about "War" from a 1940's perspective.

A recent Opinion Column from a syndicated columnist pointed out that both former President Obama and current President Trump have referred to the burden of "Endless War". They were talking about the Middle East, of course, Afghanistan, Syria and Iraq but could have also added wherever American troops, air power and intelligence are deployed to assist against or to counteract hostilities.

The constant conversation among the Politicians, Pundits, the Media and the Press is about how to end these "Wars", how to win the "War", how to achieve an exit "strategy".

What is "War"? War has historically been defined as a state of armed conflict between two or more groups, including states or nations. But there also has been a metaphorical use of the term - "War on Poverty", "War on Drugs", "War on Crime", "Cold War", "Trade War" etc.

The problem with this is that we are not dealing in 1945 terms. War since 1945 has not been the clear-cut issue of overwhelm an enemy, defeat that enemy completely and return to normal at home. It is probably a blessing that we don't have the National Power vs National Power, territory capture and hold or mass destruction leading to surrender.

Leaders need to acknowledge that today's world conflicts (I avoid the "War" word) are not start date/end date, strategic end goal, win vs lose. I also dislike the term "asymmetric" as too sterile and a cop-out for terrorists and criminal groups.

Linking back to Dr. Heilman's presentation: our Marines, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard will deal with the realities and horrors while the politicians and pundits think and talk in terms suited not to 2019 but 1945.

Houston-Holicky-Sitter Luncheon 12 March 2019 Scott Laidig, USMC (Ret.) Author

Scott Laidig is a 1965 graduate of the NROTC program at Ohio State, and served as an infantry platoon leader in 2/4 in Vietnam, 1966-67. He was one of the Magnificent Bastards of the Second Battalion, 4th Marines. Then LtCol P.X. Kelley, the future 28th CMC, was his first Commanding Officer.

After Vietnam he was assigned to Comm School, and subsequently volunteered for Russian language school. He was then assigned to cryptologic billets in Japan, from which he deployed 7 times aboard submarines of the U.S. Pacific Fleet. His first 15 seconds of fame came in Sherry Sontag's book, Blind Man's Bluff: The Untold Story of American Submarine Espionage.

He resigned from the Marine Corps in 1974 and co-founded two DoD-related businesses before retiring in 1997. Scott and his wife Susan recently moved from Montana to North Carolina. He is the author of Al Gray, Marine, Volumes 1 &2.

Not "OLD CORPS"



The Marine Corps continued its experimentation push through the Marine Corps Warfighting Lab, working through new concepts and new technologies that can best set up the Marine Corps to fight a future war involving unmanned systems, cyber and information warfare, artificial intelligence, additive manufacturing and other new technologies.

A year into the Sea Dragon experimentation series, the <u>Marine Corps announced in February</u> it was beginning to implement changes already – fielding small unmanned aerial systems, restructuring the rifle squad to include an <u>assistant squad leader and a tech manager</u>, and drawing up new tactics and procedures for a high-end battlefield. MCWL has two more <u>years of experimentation</u> <u>mapped out</u> for the service.

The Marine Corps has been using a combination of <u>experiments</u>, <u>technology demonstrations</u>, <u>fleet</u> <u>exercises</u> and <u>other training venues</u> to all chip away at the problem of how to make the Marine Corps <u>more lethal</u> in a high-end fight.


