Celebrating Second PlaceWith Pastor Eric

I had a poster in my room when I was a kid that had a runner in the desert alone and following the footprints of another. The caption on the poster said, "Nobody remembers who comes in Second!" This poster haunted me throughout my running career in High School and still does from time to time some decades later. I am a hyper competitive person by nature which is one reason why I have never coached sports. I enjoy healthy competition when it raises everybody's game and I believe that winning at anything involves how you play and who else is a part of the process.

When Jesus invites us into discipleship – "following him" – he sets up some ground rules which include denying self, taking up your cross, and then following. Following Jesus is a way of life which puts you second and the other first. Have you ever heard a football, softball, volleyball rally in which the team and supporters shout "We're number two! We're number two!" Jesus says, "Whoever wants to be first among you must be servant of all." The measure of our success comes in the lifting up of others especially those who are in need because at one time or another we have been that other person to somebody.

Even when we are competing with others what is our higher goal which plugs into the idea of good sportsmanship – we play hard to make the other team better. We play fair to test ourselves and the other team - in this higher goal everyone wins. During John McCain's funeral, both Presidents Bush and Obama said that campaigning against John McCain made them better presidential leaders. I resonate with those statements as a mark of being the disciple of Jesus – at our best we make one another better while accepting "who we are," and "who the other is" at the same time.

Leonard Bernstein, the celebrated orchestra conductor, was asked, what is the hardest instrument to play. He replied without hesitation: "Second fiddle. I can always get plenty of first violinists, but to find one who plays second violin with as much enthusiasm or second French horn or second flute, now that's a problem. And yet if no one plays second, we have no harmony." Maybe we need to play a really awesome second violin in the lives of those around us. Helping other people be their best selves is hard even "cross bearing" when the world says that it should be about you alone. Nobody loses who has friends!

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, who gives everything and more so that we might endure, strive and thrive in a broken world, awaken us daily to the call to follow Jesus and lift up others in love so that we might rejoice in truly winning in all that matter with others along the way, in Jesus' name. Amen.

What do we do now that we know who is in our family group?


We want to thank everyone who has sought out their group members and made some initial contacts! We hope that these introductions continues. Three items are available to help you connect:



Fall 2018: Repentance by Meghan Johnston Aelabouni Repentance is one of the most powerful acts of a person or a church, making possible not only forgiveness but also reconciliation. This three-part Bible study by Meghan Johnston Aelabouni will explore how we as Lutheran Christians understand the role of repentance in our faith, especially as we understand God's grace to be unearned and freely given.

The Rev. Meghan Johnston Aelabouni is a graduate of California Lutheran University and the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. Ordained in 2007, Meghan has served congregations in Illinois and Colorado. She is currently a full time Ph.D. student and mom to three.

September: Session one – Time after time: Turning to God

"Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love." With these words, the prophet Joel reminds us that repentance is nothing to be afraid of—for when we turn to God, we find grace. What does it mean to (re)turn to God with all our hearts, and how do we do it?

October: Session two – If I could turn back time: Turning to others

When Zacchaeus met Jesus, he was moved to give away half of his wealth to the poor and to make amends with those he had defrauded. Why? In the Gospels, Jesus' call to repentance is a call to turn back to the ways of God's reign on earth: justice, peace and mercy for the neighbor and the community. What does repentance look like in our relationships?

November: Session three – Turning points: Turning as the church to the world

The word repentance often refers to an invitation that brings people into the church. But what happens when the church turns outward to the world? When the church has been complicit in abuse, racism, anti-Semitism and other attitudes and practices that lead away from God's reign, what happens when the church repents?

The theme for the October 2018 *Gather* magazine is – Repentance brings us face-to-face with those affected by our actions.

Blood Drive October 9

We count on your support so consider giving blood – A Blood Drive will be at Palestine on Tuesday, October 9 from 3-7 p.m. You may schedule an appointment to donate blood by going online www.bloodcenterofiowa.org or by calling 1-800-287-4903. Previous donors will be contacted by email or phone.

To be eligible to donate, donors must be at least 16 years of age (16 and 17 year old first time blood donors must have a signed parental/guardian consent form). Donors must weigh at least 120 pounds and be in general good health. An ID pre-printed with the donor name is required at registration. Donors are encouraged to eat a good meal and drink plenty of water before donating blood.

How many congregations are working on a fall stewardship program/campaign? As we look around at the browning fields and the harvest of crops, it is a natural time to reflect on God's bounty. Even though fewer and fewer of us live on farms, our connection to the harvest is powerful. We don't survive if it weren't for the cycle of planting, growth, death and harvest. Thank you to the farmers and gardeners among us! If you farm, or if you've paid attention to farm equipment, you will have noticed that the methods for bringing in the crops has changed a lot! I remember my Dad telling stories of hitching up the horses to pull the wagon while he and his father hand picked and husked the ears of corn. When he began farming, he had a four row planter and an open cab tractor. He had a two row combine. Over the years, the size of the equipment and the size of the fields has grown. Now combines pick up to twelve rows, and measures the moisture, yield and other information on its onboard computer!

So too, are the ways in which we collect financial gifts in our congregations. Some of you remember bringing your financial gifts after the harvest was in, as well as chickens and vegetables for the pastor's family during the rest of the year. Now, while many of us still use offering envelopes and checks, we are also using online giving, Simply Giving or other forms of automatic transfers, giving kiosks for those who use debit cards, printed squares in bulletins and newsletters – There are a lot of options!

Any time of year is a good time to reflect on our financial gifts that we bring to God's work through our congregations. After all, we receive God's mercy and grace year round. It can be complicated to think about how much – and how – to give. God calls us to give a tithe, or ten percent, of our income, and more as we are able. But, it doesn't need to be complicated.

Luther and Lutheranism Martin Luther (1483-1546)



Martin Luther was eight years old when Christopher Columbus set sail from Europe and landed in the Western Hemisphere. Luther was a young monk and priest when Michaelangelo was painting the Sistine Chapel in Rome. A few years later, he was a junior faculty member at a new university in small-town

Germany, intently studying the Scriptures, "captivated with an extraordinary ardor for understanding Paul in the Epistle to the Romans."

In these days Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God. "I did not love, yes, I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners, and secretly, if not blasphemously, certainly murmuring greatly, I was angry with God." Then, in the midst of that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures became clear, like a long-shut door opening wide. When he realized that a "merciful God justifies us by faith ... I felt that I was altogether born again and had entered paradise itself through open gates."

What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God's mercy in Christ. As he later wrote, "Faith is God's work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God. This faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing. It is impossible for it not to be doing good works incessantly. Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times."

This discovery set Luther's life on a new course — both his own life and his public service as a preacher and teacher. When a church-endorsed sales team came to the Wittenberg area in October, 1517, Luther was concerned that the promotion and sale of indulgences undermined the promise of God's unreserved mercy in Jesus and the faith that trusts that promise. His 95 Theses or Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences became the first of a lifelong stream of books, sermons, letters, essays, even hymns in which he expressed his confidence in this lifegiving promise from God, the Gospel, and its liberating implications for all of life in church and society. to a generous donation by a local church and through a partnership between LSI and Retrieving Freedom, Max is now the official therapy dog at Bremwood.


