

It is not a time to be complacent or to think that we are some how not affected by what is taking place so many miles away on the other side of the world. It is a time to be strong in our faith and to call on the God of Heaven and Earth to intervene once again in the affairs of men. Pray for our leaders in the USA and around the world that God will turn the hearts of kings, give wisdom, strength and understanding in them making the best choices possible and in line with His will.

Not only is Israel and it's capital Jerusalem with its "Saturday People" under great danger and assault but also the Christians, the "Sunday People" of the Middle East are suffering great persecution and death. It is a time to stand with Israel as scripture directs and with our brothers and sisters in Christ in whatever manner that the Lord leads us to do. I love to read the commentary section of my *One New Man Bible* (Rev. William Morford, 2011, pg 1790-1791). In my quiet time the other morning I came across the thirteen attributes of God.

It is always helpful to know the Hebrew meaning of the words in the bible as they expound on and give more meaning to the Greek interpretation.

The scripture is Exodus 34: 6,7:

"And the LORD* passed by before him and proclaimed, "The LORD* the LORD* God, merciful and gracious, patient, and abundant in loving kindness and truth, keeping loving kindness for thousands, forgiving iniquity, transgression, and sin, and Who will by no means clear the guilty, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children and upon the children's children, to the third and to the fourth generations."

Why is the Lord's name repeated twice? It speaks of two types of mercy. One; before someone sins, knowing the sins to come, and two; for forgiveness after repentance.

El. God. Lord, Lord is followed by this name symbolizing power.

Rakhoom, Compassionate. The meaning here shows pity, compassion, love and mercy. The punishment for sin is diminished.

Vekhanoon, Gracious. We do not deserve his grace yet He gives it freely. The meaning of this word denotes grace, beauty, charm and loveliness.

Ereck Apayim, Slow to Anger. Aren't we thankful for this one! His anger is slow and patience great for the righteous and wicked alike. He is patient, allowing one who sins time to reflect, repent and change their ways.

Verav Khesed, Abundant in Loving Kindness. My personal favorite! His love is beyond our understanding even to loving His enemies.


VeEmet, Truth. In this scripture loving kindness comes before this word, truth. Why? Because truth is necessary and should be delivered with love.

Notser Khesed Lalpim, "Preserver of Loving Kindness for thousands of generations." This is the kindnesses God's regards as kindness to Him.

Avon, Iniquity. God forgives intentional sin for which we have repented.

VaFesha, Willful Sin. God even forgives a willful sin intended to anger him once we have repented.

Being Equipped for Service

To reach the lost and bring them into the Kingdom of God requires that we return to God's way of building the Church, discarding man's methods with those given us by Jesus Christ who said "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit"

"And Paul went in, as was his custom, and on three Sabbath days he reasoned with them from the Scriptures, explaining and proving that it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead, and saying, "This Jesus, whom I proclaim to you, is the Christ." Acts 17:2-3

We are living in a pluralistic society where opposing worldviews collide and vie to bring others into their way of thinking. We observe relativistic constructs of "truth" along with the rejection of absolutes even within our seminaries, with the rising Emergent Church deconstructing orthodox belief and the Scriptures. But if we cannot truly know what the author's intended meaning is (according to Emergent teachers) the same would also apply to the books written by Emergent authors such as Brian McClaren, Rob Bell and Doug Pagitt. Their own writings cannot stand up to the tests of logic and the methodology they insist on applying to the Scriptures either. Insistence that the reader's interpretation is what determines meaning is absurd and counter intuitive to any thinking person, and is relativism at its worst, totally removing the possibility of objective communication. It is little wonder that those following the teachings of the Seeker Friendly, Church Growth and Emergence movements are so biblically illiterate and have built on shifting sands instead of building on the Rock, who is Jesus Christ.

To reach the lost and bring them into the Kingdom of God requires that we return to God's way of building the Church, discarding man's methods with those given us by Jesus Christ who said "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" in Matthew 2:19 ESV. We make disciples by teaching all that Christ commanded, NOT having them make a decision for Christ and saying the sinner's prayer after going forward in a church service. These are man's creation, not found in the Bible, and the "cheap grace" resulting from such is what has weakened the Church. Telling someone that God has a wonderful plan for their live is a disservice because if one is not brought to the point of knowing they are a condemned rebel standing before the King of the Universe they cannot understand the grace contained in the offer of the Gospel, which is life itself and fellowship with God for eternity. Also, if we cannot expose the short comings of a false worldview held by someone it is difficult to impress upon them the better way which is truth in Christ. This was Paul's method throughout the Book of Acts and we need to return to it for effective evangelism and missions. Preaching salvation by True grace through faith in Christ alone, and teaching others how to walk before our God is our calling, and the Gospel and the Word needs to permeate our own lives.

This brings us to the necessity of apologetics in evangelism and missions, giving a defense of and reason for our faith in Jesus Christ. The Christian faith is not a shutting

down our brain and blindly accepting a list of facts. It is looking at the facts and accepting the truth of them because they explain a worldview which mirrors reality. It is not just a philosophical acceptance of the truthfulness of facts but placing our trust in the Person that the facts portray. As James said in James 2:19 "You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe-and shudder!" In our witness and presentation of the Truth we are showing that the Christian worldview is the only one explaining and matching reality, and the Bible being the only "Holy Book" that is internally consistent and externally provable to match that which is observable. The Bible has been attacked since before the Canon was completed, dissected by unbelievers and academia but never discredited. Not a single so-called error in the Scriptures has held up to investigation, because there are no errors, only faulty understanding by those not accepting the idea and truth of revelation by God. We must learn and have our own beliefs settled in our own mind before attacking Satan's dominion, because the darkness will not concede ground (souls) easily and without a fight. That is why we are told to "Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth..." in Ephesians 6:14. God's Word is Truth. We must be grounded thoroughly in the Word which we swore to uphold and teach in our ordination vows we made before God and man. We must thoroughly believe in the inerrancy of the Word, and learn to wield the Word correctly as this is the main target of the Devil and our only weapon. If Satan can find a chink in our armor he will exploit it, so we as ministers must assimilate the Word into our hearts and lives, and walk according to the Spirit. Then, and only then, can we confidently go out into the world and pull souls from the fire, and disciple them to become effective soldiers in the Kingdom.

With great joy, I am making the LEPC/EPC my denominational home.

My family and faith background is as an evangelical raised by parents who both came from Russian Mennonite backgrounds. From an early age, I was taught to highly value Scripture, hymns, prayer, and a personal relationship with Jesus. Denominational labels mattered less in my family than that the church and pastor taught sound doctrine from the Bible.

Personally, I became a follower of Christ at the age of four in a family Bible study receiving Jesus as my Lord and Savior that evening now many years ago. My call into ministry came on a short-term mission trip to inner-city Denver in 2000. While on this trip, I became so sick that I could not keep water down. Realizing I was fasting, whether I liked it or not, I asked the Lord to speak to me. At that moment, the Holy Spirit brought to mind the words from John's Gospel when Jesus told Peter: "Feed my sheep." This is what I mark as my call into the ministry.

Academically, I hold degrees from Carleton College in philosophy and a Masters in Divinity from Yale University where I taught at the Divinity School as a Teaching Fellow for a year following my graduation there. Also, I completed five units of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) including a unit at a trauma one center and a full year residency at the St. Cloud Veterans' Affairs Medical Center. After the end of my time serving in the VA medical center, I became a Board Certified Chaplain (BCC), and currently serve as a professional chaplain in North Branch, MN with St. Croix Hospice.

On March 28th, 2014, I married Aubree and became a father to her three year old daughter, Naolin. They are truly perfect gifts from my heavenly Father coming after some especially dark days for me. I feel like Job in chapter 42: "The Lord blessed the latter part of Job's life more than the former part" (vv. 12a, NIV). By way of explanation, my gorgeous gals came to me after I survived the ending of my first marriage due to my former spouse's adulteries and abandonment. God used that awful experience to refine me and teach me the power of His good news in the depths of life's valleys.

When I am not busy keeping up with Naolin and Aubree, I can be found lifting at the gym, following the Vikings, sipping coffee, listening to music, or blogging. Recently, the Holy Spirit led me to start a blog as a resource for adultery/divorce survivors from an evangelical pastor's and infidelity survivor's perspective. Not much exists out there from this perspective. My blog is called Divorce Minister: Binding Up The Brokenhearted (www.divorceminister.com). The name comes from following Christ in scorning the shame of the Cross. What the Enemy tried to use to discredit and destroy me, I have decided to use as a vehicle for healing and the Gospel. My wife has joined me in writing on the blog and ministering to those who come seeking such a perspective. In the first month of operation, we had over 10,000 views and have visitors coming to the website from over thirty different countries. I am glad I obediently took this bold step in starting this online ministry.

My excitement in joining the LEPC/EPC comes from many things. First, I appreciate the focus upon Scripture and following Christ. Second, I appreciate the genuine ecumenical spirit of the denomination. And finally, I appreciate how the denomination is very relational and supportive. It feels like family, and I feel like I have finally come home. I look forward to ministering in the denomination for years to come and getting to know my fellow brothers and sisters in Christ.



I worked for the Sate of Wisconsin for over 30, first as a veteran assistant counseling Viet Nam and disabled veterans concerning VA benefits and job training. I retired from State service as a Labor Market Economist.

My ministry:

I am in my eighth year of prison ministry as a volunteer for Campus Crusade for Christ (CRU). I have a co-worker I team-up with. We minister in three state prisons each week. Two of the prisons are maximum security facilities and one is medium security. I do one-on-one pastoral visits, conduct Bible studies, organize discipleship groups, visit terminally ill prisoners in the prison hospice, administer baptisms, communion, and preach at worship services on many Saturdays as well as Sunday mornings and evenings.

I entered prison ministry one day after praying with our pastor about what the Lord wanted me to do in retirement. In a conversation with a brother in Christ, I asked what his ministry with Crusade was about. He said, "Why don't you come and see?" So he arranged to get me a clearance to go with him to one of our maximum security facilities. While there I gave my testimony to a group of 50 prisoners. The following week my brother asked me to take charge of the group, answer questions, and present the gospel. I did, and the Holy Spirit moved seven prisoners to receive Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. I knew the Lord had called me to ministry.

Prior to Prison ministry I cooked at an inter-church soup kitchen for four years and did outreach to the poor of our community, delivering food, directing them to support services, sharing the gospel and praying with them. I also volunteered with the Aids Resource Center for Wisconsin providing companionship for men dying of AIDS.

How I came to know Christ:

After my seminary years I rebelled against my Roman Catholic upbringing. I entered the university after my military service and became fascinated with eastern mysticism and transendtental meditation, spirit guides, and all that accompanied it. I became a Rosicrusian after becoming intrigued with that "ancient mystical order".

After years of bondage to sin, I was sitting alone in my apartment one evening and when I turned on the TV a Billy Graham Crusade was just starting. I listened, he got my attention, he was talking about me. I could hardly believe what I was hearing. I had never heard the Gospel preached, ever, (no, not even in Catholic seminary). I repented, received Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior, went out and bought a Bible and the Holy Spirit has been leading me ever since that

evening. God has been so gracious to me, a wretched sinner. And not only has be washed me, justified me, sanctified me (and He continues to sanctify me), but he called me to be a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and His sacraments! Don't tell me grace isn't AMAZING!!! It just doesn't get any better than this on this side of eternity. Praise God!

The Slippery Slope

Francis Schaeffer (1912-1984) warned for decades of the growing pluralistic climate in the West. He argued, among other things, that without antithesis, truth would fall apart, as indeed it largely has—especially regarding morality. Schaeffer noted how the embrace of the Hegelian dialectic of thesis, antithesis and synthesis, had done so much to undermine truth and absolutes. Schaeffer said "Christianity demands antithesis, not as some abstract concept of truth, but in the fact that God exists and in personal justification" (Schaeffer, 1990:47). If we embrace synthesis, not antithesis, we are left with relativism, pluralism and no absolutes. There no longer remains good and evil, there is only something in-between that is neither. This compromise ethos is also at the heart of the Eastern religions, and to no small degree present in post-modern eclecticism. These pluralists take the middle ground between good and evil, embracing the luke-warmness Jesus specifically warned us of in Revelation 3:15-18.

The concept of antithesis is as basic as creation itself. Consider for example, the God-established dichotomy between light and dark. "Then God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light. And God saw the light, which it was good; and God divided the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness He called Night. So the evening and the morning were the first day" (Gen. 1:3-5; cf., 14-19; Mat. 5:13-19).

Jesus makes very clear that antithesis—the separation of mutually contradictory things—is God ordained. The sin -corruption that so pervades all of creation (cf., Rom. 8:18-22) makes the difference between right and wrong 'grey,' or difficult to clearly and definitively distinguish. Sin-corrupted human beings are not fully able on their own to make such distinctions. This is why God provides His Law. The difference between right and wrong, good and bad, is not then according to man's already corrupt notions, but according to the sinless, incorrupt, transcendent, and perfect understanding of all things that God alone possesses. Apart from God, mankind is completely incapable of identifying the true disparity between right and wrong, good and evil, for mankind is too corrupt to know the difference. This is precisely why God's Laws are not bad, keeping us from having fun, as it were. Rather, knowing right and wrong makes the quality of our lives better, and our relationship with the Creator right and healthy (cf., Psa. 19:7-10).

The pluralist prefers to embrace a non-committal middle ground that is not true nor false, right nor wrong, cold nor hot. It is neither pleasing, nor offensive. It produces neither passion, nor anger. It promotes instead, apathy and disinterest. It is reactive, not proactive: it simply exists -- stale, stagnant and lifeless. It is not pleasing to God, for He and His Kingdom are proactive, truth and mission driven.

Religious pluralism is without question an unholy agenda meant to lull even God's own into moral lethargy. For the Christian the remedy for such a lackluster faith is the fresh embrace of our first love -- Jesus Christ (Rev. 2:4-5). Those

who have fallen into apathy about God and His Word need to put Him back on the throne of their lives, to "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you" (Mat. 6:33). Only when our priorities are set in proper order, does life make any sense.

The present-day call for 'tolerance' and 'political correctness' is pervasive. Any kind of absolute faith commitment or firm doctrinal conviction is ridiculed. Those who embrace 'totalizing concepts' and metanarratives like the Bible are criticized as relics of bygone days. While it is 'OK' to embrace personal beliefs, it is quite another matter to proselytize. It is quite alright for the pluralist to demean those who embrace traditional, conservative views, but to criticize them in return is wholly unacceptable: a double standard to be sure.

Religious dogma is simply not welcome in today's ultra-modern cultural climate—even in many churches, who have succumbed to the spirit of our age (cf., 2Co. 4:1f; Gal. 1:4; Eph. 6:12). Lesslie Newbigin suggests that part "of the reason for the rejection of dogma is that it has for so long been entangled with coercion, with political power, and so with the denial of freedom—freedom of thought and of conscience" (Newbigin, 1989:10). Mindless obedience to church dogma is not healthy for the individual, or for the church. Fideism in metaphysics means giving priority to faith over reason, but in contemporary usage has come to mean an irrational belief in things supernatural. What too often happens is that 'faith' becomes a rote human tradition that is blindly followed.

A true, vibrant faith is one that has been intellectually considered and wrestled with, and then embraced. God has given us reasoning minds so that we can thoroughly consider the intellectual dimensions of the faith, especially in contrast to other religions and philosophical constructs. Pluralists and postmodernists alike cannot endure the so-called intolerance of conservative, orthodox Christianity that stands upon the ancient, apostolic teachings. Such certainty and dogma are for them, unrealistic, unproven, and unworthy of humanity's advance beyond mankind's mythical and superstitious past. They prefer instead something far less certain. "Universalism is thus the *raison d'etre* for the response of openness to religious diversity thought to be required by postmodern thinkers. Total openness and religious relativism spring from an abhorrence of Christian particularism" (Okholm, 1995:83).

Those who endorse religious pluralism also necessarily endorse religiosity that stands upon no absolutes, and no solid ground. Nevertheless, world religions do make different claims, and cannot all be true. By simple, logical necessity, all claims can be false, or some can be true and others false, but not all can be true. G.K. Chesterton said of pluralists: "Tolerance is a virtue of the man or person without convictions" (Chesterton,

in Carson, 2000:331).

The truth is, pluralism is rooted in fear. It means not having to make choices and take stands, to have personal convictions and to live them out before others. Pluralism is the easy way out—the coward's choice—the way of the unconvicted, the spineless, and the apathetic. In contemporary Western societies, one may be considered a fool to believe in the supernatural, but general talk about 'god,' prayer and the like are not likely to stir much commotion. Bring the name Jesus Christ into the mix, however, and the situation quickly changes, because there is no name more controversial and offensive than Jesus Christ (cf., Rom. 9:33): the so-called 'Jesus problem.' While many, including Muslims, will broadly accept Jesus as a moral figure that may, or may not have actually lived, to cross the line into discussing Jesus' own incredible claims stirs controversy.

The problem is, if Jesus actually lived, people must consider his claims, and most people truly do not want to face those questions. It is therefore much easier to take a relativistic and pluralistic stance. It is far easier to discount and ignore the possibility that Jesus existed historically, believing that he is but one of many ancient mythical figures that men still turn for moral guidance. Postmoderns and pluralists truly do embrace and endorse a dream-scape reality, where right and wrong, good and bad do not matter. Right and wrong are personal choices and in the end, it does not seem to matter whether Jesus lived, or not. They care little about what their personal moral choices may mean for others, how their penchants may impact those around them. It is careless and selfish living.

Postmoderns and pluralists twist truth and make history say what pleases them and fits their biased agenda. In spite of this, Jesus did make exclusive claims about himself; claims that others cannot accept (cf., Mat. 11:6; Joh. 15). For example, Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me" (Joh. 14:6; cf., Mat. 28:18; Joh. 10:30; 14:9). The claims Jesus made about himself offended the (Jewish) religious leaders of His day, and have been offending people ever since. Christians ever since have defended their faith as a reality rooted in history, making Christian claims unique among all others. Only Christianity dares to step with both feet into public courtroom of history, to argue the veracity of Christ's claims.



"Money and Stuff"

When Jesus heard this, He said to him, "One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." Luke 18:22

The truth is many of us don't know as much about the Bible as we think we do. That is especially the case when it comes to what God and our Savior had to say about money and stuff. This is why this devotion speaks about money and stuff.

Now, if you're ready to stop reading, please don't. You may be surprised by what the Savior had to say.

First, let me tell you some of the things Jesus didn't say. He didn't say many of the things you can hear coming out of the mouths of TV evangelists. Jesus never had His disciples selling holy handkerchiefs, inspirational incense, or anointing olive oil soap and water taken from the Jordan River.

Nor did Jesus ever tell anybody that if they wanted to have God give them money and stuff they first had to bribe the Lord and get His attention by making a "seed offering." That also means Jesus didn't imply the larger the seed offering the more money and stuff God would be compelled to give.

What foolishness!

God has no need of our money and stuff. In the book of Psalms, God says, "I have no need of a bull from your stall or of goats from your pens, for every animal of the forest is Mine ... and the creatures of the field are Mine ... the world is Mine, and all that is in it" (see Psalm 50).

So, what does Jesus say about money?

The Savior told His followers that money isn't a bad thing: "Just don't let your love for the stuff get in the way of your love for Me and the salvation I bring." In other places, Jesus said not to let family get in the way, or your plans. In that spirit, He told the God-loving rich, young ruler to "sell all that you have, distribute it to the poor ... and come, follow Me" (see Mat-thew 19:21).

It was a request the man could not do because -- although he loved God -- he loved his wealth and lifestyle even more. His is a mistake we dare not repeat as we follow the Redeemer who gave His life for us. We need to keep first things first, and Jesus should always be first. And that, my friends, is an idea which is in the Bible.

"There are times in life when everything seems confusing. As we walk with the Lord we have to maintain a sense of God's goodness, His love and His character to carry us through places where we cannot see or understand. During these times one of the enemy's favorite strategies is to undermine God's goodness to us, defame His character and try to make us believe that we are not loved when in fact we are greatly loved. We are blessed in having God's word to read any time we desire to remind us of these things but it becomes even better when we allow the Holy Spirit to write it on our hearts, instill it into our lives and make it a non- negotiable that God is good. God is of high character. God loves us. It

is settled within us. This is a battle and decision that must be fought and decided once for all to grow in maturity and faith in Him. Then from that solid, immovable position we can fight the good fight of faith.

There was a time in my life when I questioned these particular aspects of God. I grew up being taught the Bible but I was not taught God. I was taught His Word but I wasn't taught Him. There is a huge difference in the two. As an adult I learned God's faithfulness by Him being faithful and my recognizing His faithfulness. Recognizing His faithfulness proves to us that the scripture is true in every day life but also that God is true and God is good.
