## He rose, the battle's won

"He met his Water-loo!" Have you ever heard this phrase before? If not, it's in reference to one of the greatest commanders in history — Napoleon Bonaparte. His wars and campaigns are studied at military schools worldwide.

He was emperor

of France from 1804 to 1814, and again briefly in 1815. Napoleon dominated European and global affairs for more than a decade while leading France against a series of coalitions in the Napoleonic Wars. He won most of these wars, building a large empire that ruled over continental Europe before its collapse.

His collapse took place in an epic contest — the Battle of Waterloo in Belgium. On June 18, 1815, the French forces under the leadership of Napolean were defeated by the Seventh Coalition and a Prussian Army that was commanded by Gebhard Von Blucher. The forces were also defeated by an Anglo-allied army commanded by the Duke of Wellington. The significance of the battle was simple — whoever was the victor would determine the fate of Europe. Napolean lost. "He met his Waterloo!" This forced Napoleon to abdicate the throne of France.

There was another battle that took place



about 1,800 years before, at Jerusalem. The battle field was Calvary. The leader was Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. Who was He up against — sin, death and the devil. Jesus of Nazareth won this battle — whoever would believe in Him and what He accomplished would be able to reestablish a relationship with God the Father.

The good news about this battle is that you and I did not have to participate; we did not get drafted into it. In fact, if you hear about the battle at Calvary, you do not hear about dead bodies under the cross. There were close to 50,000 that were dead and wounded at Waterloo. On that day called Good Friday, Jesus of Nazareth died along with two other criminals. This Jesus died because of sin that came about because of some people named Adam and Eve. On that Friday, it appeared that Jesus was defeated and that the enemies sin, death and the devil had won.

Then came Sunday morning when Jesus of Nazareth rose from the dead. When it looked as if Jesus had been defeated, He won. He rose. What He accomplished through His rising from the dead is that He had the last laugh; He won the battle over sin, death and the devil. St. Paul said this about the battle:

"But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." — 1 Cor. 15:57

About 14 centuries later, a German named Martin Luther summed up the battle for who was king with this observation: "Jesus Christ, true God... redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won (delivered) me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver, but with His hole, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, in order that I may be (wholly) His own, and live under Him in His kingdom."

This Jesus had said while preparing for His ultimate battle:

"The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel." — Mark 1:15

The battle was fought there on Calvary because that is where Jesus went through hell. He paid for the sins of all the people of the world so that all the people of the world could believe in Him and have everlasting life. When He rose on a day we call Easter, He could

# Still celebrating the Reformation

arly in February, college students from both Peace Lutheran Campus Center, Stevens Point, and Calvary Lutheran Chapel, Madison, gathered at Camp LuWiSoMo in Wild Rose for the annual winter retreat. The weekend was spent building relationships within the body of Christ through various winter activities and indoor games.

The weekend was also a time for faith to grow as the students studied God's Word through a Bible study created by the Rev. Andy Weden surrounding the *Solas* of the Lutheran faith. Though we think of America as an area of the world that already knows of God and His Son Jesus, it's in need now more than ever of that reminder and the evangelical work of God through the body of Christ.

Sola Gratia, or grace alone, was the focus of the first Bible study session and informed students about the foundation of the Lutheran faith. With a firm reminder that human life in its entirety is lived in sin, the students learned that grace is a necessary and unmerited gift from God. God's grace gives us reason to rejoice, as it's a reminder of the burden that Jesus carries on our behalf as He works in our lives each and every day.

Sola Fide, meaning faith alone, brought everyone into a discussion about the origin of our faith in God and its significance. As the Bible conveys, faith is a gift from God that works hand-in-hand with grace — not a matter of choice or acceptance of God. Students go to school to study many things, but Bible studies are a great reminder of a spir-

itual need that is often overlooked and they are the fuel that keeps faith strong.

Lastly, Sola Scrip-

tura, or Scripture alone, convevs the singular importance of God's Word, made into flesh through Jesus Christ. The Word is an unshakable foundation for the Lutheran faith and the way in which God speaks to us today. This study taught students about the importance of remaining in the Word in order to keep God at the center of their lives and, as a result, in the lives of all those they see and speak to each day at school, home, work, and the rest of the world. God's Word is yet another part of our faith that can never be taken away.

As it is written in Eph. 2:8-9:

"For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast."

We are dead in our sin, unable to do a single thing to obtain salvation. But that's when God mercifully steps in with the gift of His son, Jesus

Christ, who died for all.

When asked what we learned and how we would use it upon returning to

school, the general consensus was this: The *Solas* are essential to what it means to be a Lutheran Christian, and

we will put this knowledge to use by sharing our faith with others.

Gatherings like this one are what keep the body of Christ strong and united and demonstrate how God is at work through His children to bring news of His saving grace to all of the earth — even one college student at a time.

## **Good men falling**

He was a man of great valor and popularity. He was a mighty man who ignored his vulnerability ... and Satan took him down.

We have heard the story of King David and Bathsheba. She was a bathing

beauty whom the king could not resist (2 Sam. 11:2-4). The one-night-stand resulted in a pregnancy, and a premeditated murder and cover-up (v.5, 14-17).

In this sad story we find temptation and sin. We find a human tragedy that included sexual sin. It began with a nude female body and a man's corrupt desire. We find a popular playground of Satan. David forgot to flee!

In his book "Stand Firm," Lynn Fredrick shares his story of addiction to pornography and sexual sin — and the freedom found through God's grace. He calls pornography a pandemic. He also shares these challenging facts:

- ► Pornography makes up 30 percent of the data on the internet.
- ➤ Sixty-five to 90 percent of pastors struggle with porn.

Pornography is a powerful addiction. It does not require an external agent to trigger the internal thoughts, though the former can reinforce a deeper corruption. Visual images are planted deep in the brain, but can be easily retrieved.

This is also an addiction that progresses quickly. Recovery is a long journey, and the success rate is low in contrast to other forms of addiction.

The apostle Paul offers sage advice and reinforcement:

"Flee from sexual immorality. All other sins a man commits are outside the body, but he who sins sexually sins against his own body. Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought with a price. Therefore honor God with your body."

- 1 Cor. 6:18-20

Paul's reference to the Holy Spirit is significant. This Third Person of the Trinity is a vital force to overcome such sin and addiction. He is the more powerful agent who fosters transformation, and overcomes Satan.
