This past month we received another generous grant to our Post from the Wakerly Family Foundation. As a result of this grant, it was voted on and passed during our last meeting that we extend the annual Ralph F. Wakerly/Western Springs VFW Post 10778 scholarship to a Lyons Township High School student in need from five to 10 years.

He served in the Pacific Theater making beach landing in Guam and Iwo Jima. Stan witnessed the raising of the American flag on Iwo and was wounded in the process.

Remains Found

The most recent report of remains found was announced on May 15, 2015 on ABC (Channel 7) News, and happened to be those of Marine PVT Jack Redman from Watseka, IL. He was reported to have died in November 1943 during the Battle of Tarawa. It's always wonderful when our comrades are brought home, but especially one from Illinois.

The second article is from *Military Officer* dated several years ago—December 2012—and contains the following information:

"The remains of five American airmen who perished when their seaplane went down in the Gulf of St. Lawrence 70 years ago were recovered in July 2012 by U.S. divers. Based in Presque Isle, Maine, the PBY-5A Catalina capsized in rough waters Nov. 2, 1942, near the village of Longue-Pointe-de-Mingan in

eastern Quebec, Canada. Local fisherman rescued four of the nine crew members before the plane slipped under the waves and settled on its back 130 feet down.

The plane remained missing until 2009, when divers with Parks Canada found it while conducting an underwater survey. Summer 2012, the Joint POW/MIA Accounting Command (JPAC) sent a 50 person team, supported by the USS *Grapple* (T-AR-53), to investigate the crash site.

Divers recovered what are believed to be the remains of the lost crew, which were sent to a DNA lab for identification. A large number of artifacts, including aviator glasses, film negatives, an intact Listerine bottle and still readable pages from the crew's log, also were recovered. Experts say the artifacts were so well preserved because of the water's near freezing temperature and the depth of the wreckage, which protected the items from damaging light and oxygen.

'To be able to do this and bring some closure to families is pretty rewarding,' said Dr. Stefan Claesson, a JPAC forensic archeologist, in an interview with *The Canadian Press*. 'As long as we find one remain, it's a success for us. And in this case we have a significant number of remains to bring back home."

Thanksgiving Fun Facts

President George H.W. Bush pardoned the first turkey on Nov. 17, 1989, kicking off this now annual tradition.

It cost \$49.41 to feed a table of 10 Thanksgiving dinner, according to the latest annual American Farm Bureau Federation price survey – a 37-cent increase from 2013.

Feeling sluggish after that big meal? Resist the urge to slump on the couch as **lying down can inhibit digestion**. Instead take a family walk or play with the kids/grandkids outside.

Cube bread for stuffing and leave it on a baking sheet overnight. Stale bread makes the best stuffing.

If a holiday recipe calls for pomegranate seeds fear not. Here are **three steps to seed a pomegranate**:

- 1. Score a circle about 2 inches below the crown with a sharp paring knife. Grip the knob on top of the crown and carefully peel away the skin.
- 2. Score the skin between each section (about 4-6) using membrane as a guide.
- 3. Pull the bulk of the membrane right out. Using both hands pry the sections open. Remove the shreds of membrane that cling to the outside of each section then scoop out the seeds with a spoon.
